

9. DISCUSSION (No Action - No Public Comment): Committee/Staff Reports

Community Services Director Cherie Nevin:

- October 18th Storey County Health Fair from 10am-2pm at Pipers Opera House. They have upwards of 20 people committed to coming. United Blood Services will be doing a blood drive that day as well. There will be flu vaccines and others as well.
- Working to schedule a flu and pneumonia shot clinic in Lockwood sometime in September in conjunction with the school.
- We were awarded a Historic Preservation Grant of about \$20,000 to assist St. Mary's Arts Center with some repairs to their front porch and issues with water seeping into the building. It will also help with some seismic study updates to the courthouse.
- We also have a grant in process and are going out to bid soon on the repairs to the roof of the courthouse. We have 24 months to complete the project and hopefully before snow flies we will have it taken care of. The flagpole that has been idle due to disrepair will be removed.
- HAWC will be leaving the Virginia City Community Center as of June 10th. We had a great meeting yesterday with folks from Community Chest, Carson City Health and Human Services, and Healthy Communities Coalition, to discuss seeing what we can do to get healthcare back into Virginia City. There were some very innovative ideas and hopefully we can get that up and running soon.

- The USDA project for the new wastewater treatment plant is moving along well. Hoping to have the notice to proceed by June 12th.
- Six Mile Canyon mitigation grant award is in the mail.
- She and D.A. Maddox have been working on the grant application for the community support grant and should have that for commission approval by July 1st.

DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION (listed as item 13): Approval of resolution 14-399 Recognizing Senior Awareness Month

Sheriff Antinoro: Explained that they have been doing this for a number of years, but usually for a week. They hope to expand it to a month this time. He described a few of the events they have planned to raise awareness of seniors and all that they do.

Resolution 14-399:

A resolution by the Storey County Board of Commissioners recognizing the month of June 2014 as "Senior Awareness Month":

Whereas: Senior citizens are part of the vital fabric that makes up our communities;

Whereas: Senior citizens bring a lifetime of skills and experience as parents, workers, and

citizens that can be tapped to meet challenges in our communities;

Whereas: Senior citizens volunteer over 1.6 billion hours of service to our country every

year and more than half of those volunteer on a regular basis;

Whereas: The senior citizens of Storey County have, by their faithful and loyal devotion to

their responsibilities, demonstrated a dedication to our community and , in so doing, have established for themselves an enviable and enduring reputation for

preserving the rights of seniors and gaining the respect of all citizens.

Now: Therefore, the Storey County Board of Commissioners does hereby proclaim the

month of June, 2014 as "Senior Awareness Month" and does call upon all patriotic, civil, and educational organizations to observe the month by

commemorating Story County Senior Citizens.

DISCUSSION (No Action - No Public Comment): Committee/Staff Reports (Continued)

Comptroller Hugh Gallagher:

- As of Friday we received the \$2,990,200.00 UDSA funding on the Sewer Treatment Plant. \$10,000 had to be taken out for the Wells Fargo closing costs.
- Mr. Gallagher addressed Mr. Phillips' "travesty" comment. The forms provided to us are from the Department of Taxation and are Department of Taxation forms. Consequently, the submission has to be on those forms. We have received approval that our submission for this budget has a clear and is complete, so I'm not sure what "travesty" there is, but I can assure the chairman that this is not one.

Senior Planner/Administrative Officer Austin Osborne:

- June 19th Planning Commission meeting to be held here in the district courtroom will be hearing Comstock Mining's special use permit expansion which will be a substantial expansion of their mining and processing operations. We are in the process of preparing staff reports. Preceding that item will be a request for a zone change from commercial/residential to forestry on a portion of lower Gold Hill that will be in concurrence with the special use expansion.
- We have completed our preliminary review of Master Plan findings and anticipate completion by this time next year.

Sheriff Antinoro:

• The Reno/Tahoe Odyssey Run this past weekend was a success. He explained some changes they made from the previous year and reported no complaints from the public and a positive outlook for the future.

County Manager Pat Whitten:

- On Saturday they attempted to auction the three houses south of the courthouse. The good news is that one sold, but they do still have challenges with the other two. We will discuss it with Bert Bedeau and the Historic District and with Joe Curtis, the current chair, and Mr. McBride who sits on the board on behalf of the county and endeavor to find the best ways to get those houses moved.
- Reminded the public of the cancellation of the meeting for July 15th as noted in the consent agenda.
- Deny Dotson couldn't be here today. This weekend we have the Muck Fest for details call the Visitor's Center at 847-7500 or go to their website <u>www.visitvirginiacitynv.com</u>.
- This Friday is the second in a series of Flashback Fridays.
- Wine walk this Saturday. First Saturday of every month through August. Tickets available on the website and presumably at the event.

Paul Quam, Storey County Liaison to Southwest Gas:

• Last call for the natural gas questionnaire. He explained the effort again and that it is not an attempt to "modernize" the Comstock.

10. BOARD COMMENT (No Action - No Public Comment)

Commissioner Sjovangen:

- I was just seated on the NACO legislative committee for this year and one thing they would like to do is get a list of any possible BDR's from the counties. These would be more on statewide type issues. We will meet, beginning about August or September, every Friday.
- One of the things that we are working on right now is moving tax abatements down to a more local level so that we have a little more control on those.
- I talked to Bruce Breslow last Friday, and Lance Gilman probably already knows that water is probably coming to TRI with some new water rights, so that's good news.
- Under a new section in the NRS, we can now entertain road exchanges with NDOT. They will be within the next two weeks, I think, sending us an instruction booklet. If we want to get rid of a road, like Six-Mile Canyon, we can make application. They said it's very

doable now if we wanted to pick up C Street and turn that into a county thing, we can make a request and they would really like to see us do that, so that's something we should be looking at. I talked to Lyon County about Six Mile and they said "Yeah, and we'll give you a town too."

• This one's not really a biggie for Storey County, but PILT payments are hanging up in the

air again out in congress.

• The Nevada Land Management Task Force report is now available online on the state NACO website. We generated a packet about an inch thick on how to withdraw public lands and how much money we can make managing that land as opposed to BLM and Forrest Service. We will be presenting that to the Nevada Legislature this summer I think in July or August to the State Lands Committee.

State NACO conference this year is in Ely in November right after the election.

• Report from Ron Englebrecht in Mark Twain said that quite a few wells down there that are starting to dry up. I asked him to see if he could help us put together a list of people and places and as much data as we can find on them and we can see if maybe there's a couple dozen of them that are having a problem we might have to consider something on that, I don't know what. I was at one of their meetings last week and they had a show of hands and quite a few hands went up.

Vice-Chairman Gilman:

• Complimented Chairman McBride who attended a hearing with the governor at the Peppermill that was a celebration of sorts for the Zulily company which is completing its building. The news for our county is that it is another 1000 new jobs in TRI. I've had a lot of nice comments about Chairman McBride's presentation. He went on to explain how important that area is to our county.

Chairman McBride:

- When we attend meetings at the EDON or Western Nevada Development District, it keeps being brought to the government's attention that if this teacher's initiative known as the Margins Tax goes through in November, then companies that are on line to come into Nevada are not going to. In addition, some of the businesses that are already set up here will pack up and leave. There is a chance that a business could do 5 or 10 million dollars in revenue, lose money, and still pay tax. It is an *awful* piece of legislation, and we have to keep getting it out there that this could be a job killer for business going forward in Nevada.
- Saturday was the Reno/Tahoe Odyssey and there has been some question as to if it is for profit. They do make money on it, but they also sponsor a charity as well that I believe is the Children's Cancer Network.
- Sunday is "Moms on the Run" sponsored by Pinocchio's. This is to raise money for women who are going through cancer treatment, but not for the treatment itself. All of this money goes directly to the families who need assistance.

Pat Whitten: If you own land within the Historic District, the two remaining houses are extremely well priced (somewhere between \$0-\$10). The cost of moving them is a little more expensive, but please see him if you are interested.

DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION (originally listed as item #12): Approval of resolution 14-398 designating the last day of June in each year be declared "Highlands Safety Day" and authorizing the closure of Lousetown and Cartwright Roads on that day.

Commissioner Sjovangen: There was some question in the past about the homeowners in the Highlands shutting those roads down because they are public. This gives them that ability so they may set up their checkpoints and informs the public well in advance of the event.

Resolution No. 14-398 – A resolution permitting the closing of Lousetown and Cartwright roads the last Saturday of June of each year from 8am to 6pm. Be it hereby resolved by the board of county commissioners, Storey County, Nevada

Whereas, the Virginia City Highlands is a private residential community including all roads; and Whereas, Storey County owns Lousetown road and one mile of Cartwright road; and Whereas, trespassing on private roads in the Virginia City Highlands is a major concern; and Whereas, wildland fire is a major threat in the Virginia City Highlands and surrounding areas; and

Whereas, uncontrolled off road travel in the Virginia City highlands and surrounding areas causes drainage problems

Now therefore, be it resolved that the last Saturday of June each year is declared "Virginia City Highlands Safety Day" and the Storey County Board of Commissioners hereby permits the closure of both Lousetown and Cartwright roads. Lousetown will be closed near its intersection with SR341 and Cartwright near its intersection with SR341. Closures will begin at 8:00AM and end at 6:00PM. Closures will be staffed by the Homeowners associations of the Virginia City Highlands.

Residents of the Virginia City Highlands, visitors of residents, bona fide realtors, all government agencies and commercial vendors having business in the Virginia City Highlands will not be prohibited from entry to the Virginia City Highlands.

The Storey County Sheriff's Office and 474 Fire Protection District may use this closure day for Off Highway Vehicle inspections and providing information to residents.

Be it further resolved, that this resolution shall be effective on the 15th day of June 2014.

Carol Ingalls:

• Premium went down from last year just over \$27,000 due to a change in exposures. (Reduction in the number of law enforcement officers, reductions in some areas that were

- over insured on buildings) Also renegotiations of premiums affected rates for all members.
- Ms. Ingalls went on to describe some of the coverages, services, and the relationship between POOL/PACT and the county.

Pat Whitten described the history of the relationship with POOL/PACT and some of the items insured by them. The one tremendous element is outstanding state of the art human resource support. The premium is large, but it is an incredible organization.

Dale Beach: Would like research done concerning the \$250,000 fire station in Mark Twain that burned down and was replaced by a metal building for \$250,000 that is now owned by the county. Chairman McBride asked Mr. Beach to bring this up at the end of the meeting as it did not pertain to the topic at hand.

Mr. Phillips: In the member coverage summary he noted some corrections.

- NPAIP Membership list The "474 Fire District" is not included on the list.
- "Virginia City Convention & Tourism Authority" should be "Virginia City Tourism Commission"
- Under "Special Districts" there is nothing about Storey County Water & Sewer.
- When the 2014-15 budget was approved, noticeably lacking is a new requirement for a "heart and lung disease form" recently passed by the Department of Taxation.
- The agreement between Storey County and Storey County Sheriffs Employee Association/Operating Engineers Local Union #3 is due to expire at the end of this month. With the next meeting canceled, Mr. Phillips wonders how that will affect the coverage for the county.

Chairman McBride noted that these items should be brought up with the board of directors of Pool/Pact and not with the county commissioners. He also noted that the next meeting is not canceled, but the second meeting in July.

Pat Whitten noted that the board of Pool/Pact is working now with the D.A. to recognize the new Fire District as well as Water & Sewer. We are confident that all entities are covered as they go through the application process.

Staff summary (continued):

During the 2013 Legislative Session, Senate (SB) 272 was introduced to enable the Storey and Washoe County Boards of Commissioners to approve up to two boundary line adjustments in certain specific areas identified within the legislation. During the session, at the April 2, 2013 Storey County Commission meeting, the Board voted 2-0 with Commissioner Gilman abstaining, to approve a position of neutrality on SB 272 contingent upon the bill being amended to separate out the two properties independently and to oppose if not. Subsequent action within the Legislative process via bill amendment did separate out the two properties and each is totally independent of the other. SB 272 passed both Chambers of the Nevada Legislature and has been signed into law by Governor Sandoval.

The Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center owns property situated in both Storey and Washoe Counties that were specifically identified under section 1.5 of SB 272. Last October, project developers, thru their legal counsel, requested the Storey County Commission to consider implementation of that specific section (1.5) covering property they own. It is important to note that this agenda item is for a potential boundary adjustment (BLA) of land specifically identified in section 1.5 which is currently in Washoe County adjacent to the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center. It does not include any property now situated in Storey County that might otherwise be known as "Sunny Hills". At the November 19, 2013 meeting, the Storey County Commission approved by majority vote, with Commissioner Gilman abstaining, to direct legal counsel and staff to discuss the advisability and feasibility of implementing the BLA between both counties provided for in Section 1.5.

Multiple discussions have occurred over the ensuing months between both County's staff's, legal counsel's as well as legal counsel for the property owner and collectively, we have reached a consensus on recommending approval of the BLA as it pertains to section 1.5. Concurrent to these BLA discussions staff, inclusive of our respective Chiefs of both the Storey County Fire Protection District and the Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District, explored mutually beneficial methods to better support and regionally share services in the Truckee River Corridor along Interstate 80 from the Vista Boulevard exit extending east to the Storey/Washoe/Lyon County line inclusive of Wadsworth. The results of these discussions are presented as an Amendment to our existing Cooperative Agreement between both Fire Protection Districts listed on our agenda as item #12 and this should be considered an integral component to our recommendation to approve the BLA.

In summary, the matter has proceeded thru both the Legislative and Local Government staff processes and staff and legal counsel now recommend approval of Storey County Resolution 14-403 consistent with the provisions of SB 272 Section 1.5. Should the Commission approve Resolution 14-403, the boundary line adjustment shall occur only upon similar approval by Resolution by the Washoe County Board of Commissioners. We anticipate their consideration of this matter at their Commission meeting scheduled for the afternoon of June 17, 2014.

AN ACT relating to counties; providing for the revision of the boundary line between Storey County and Washoe County; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

This bill provides for the revision of the boundary line between Storey County and Washoe County upon the adoption of resolutions by the Board of County Commissioners of Storey County and the Board of County Commissioners of Washoe County approving the revision.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:





The purpose of this memorandum is to request consideration by the Board of County Commissioners at their first November meeting of implementation of SB 272 of the 2013 Legislative Session.

Background

SB 272 amended the state statutory provisions in NRS Chapter 243 regarding the common boundary line between Washoe and Storey County. Section 1.5 provides an area currently in Washoe County generally described as north of the Truckee River, south of I-80, east of Mustang and west of Waltham Way be included in Storey County. This area is owned by TRI and is part of the old McCarran Ranch.

Subsection 3.3 provides that this boundary line change will only be effective and implemented if the County Commissioners of both counties approve it by resolutions prior to July 1, 2015. TRI supports the line change and, if approved, intends to pursue the necessary Storey County approvals to develop this land as a portion of Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center.

Please note there are separate provisions of SB 272 regarding a boundary line change from Storey County to Washoe County of a property commonly known as Sunny Hills. The bill allows Commissioners to consider and approve this change separately and independently from the TRI property line change, and TRI's request herein does not include consideration of the Sunny Hills boundary line change.

Representatives of TRI have discussed informally the feasibility of implementing SB 272 with staff from both counties and individually with some Commissioners. Issues that TRI believes are solvable have arisen regarding cooperation between the counties and legal authority for a possible interlocal or other cooperative agreement. TRI believes a preliminary and nonbinding expression of interest by the County Commissioners in having the Storey County District Attorney and staff discuss implementation issues with their counterparts in Washoe

County would be a helpful step to move the process along in considering whether approval of the boundary line change for TRI property is in both counties' best interests.

Request

TRI requests that an item for discussion and possible action be placed on the Board of County Commissioners at the first available November meeting, in order to discuss implementation by approval of Section 1.5 of SB 272.

A resolution may not be necessary, but after the discussion, the Commissioners may wish to consider a motion as follows:

To request the services of the District Attorney's office and authorize county staff to contact and discuss with their counterparts in Washoe County the advisability and feasibility of implementing the boundary line change between the counties provided in Section 1.5 SB 272 of the 2013 Session of the Nevada State Legislature by approval of each county's Board of Commissioners, with the intent that Storey County representatives report back to the Commissioners with a recommendation on approval or disapproval and any terms, conditions or agreements advisable or necessary.

Staff summary (continued):

Mr. Sader's letter of request dated October 23, 2013 well states the intent of this item. It is appropriate that the property owner and their counsel promote this to their own desires with neither County acting as principal agents. It is also hoped that the Washoe County Commission may desire to take a similar approach to facilitate continuation of this process in accordance with SB 272.

It is imperative to note that this agenda item is for a potential boundary adjustment of land currently in Washoe County adjacent to the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center which is situated primarily in Storey County. It does <u>not</u> include any property now situated in Storey County that might otherwise be known as "Sunny Hills".

At the April 2, 2013 County Commission meeting, the Board voted 2-0 with Commissioner Gilman abstaining, to approve a position of neutrality on SB 272 conditioned upon the bill being amended to separate out the two properties and to oppose if not. Subsequent action within the Legislative process via bill amendment did separate out the two properties and each is totally independent of the other. SB 272 passed both Chambers of the Nevada Legislature and has been signed into law by Governor Sandoval.

Staff recommends approval of the above suggested motion as a means to further this part of the process.

The meeting was called to order by the Chair at 9:00 a.m.

2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Chair led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance

3. **DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION:** Approval of Agenda for April 2, 2013

Mark Joseph Phillips commented that listed under the consent agenda are items 8 and 9, two resolutions that are worthy of some discussion before they are approved. Additionally, item 15, the appointments of a Mark Twain Community Advisory Board, this is the first he has heard of this and suggests that it be continued until there is some kind of notice of this Board and their function.

Chairman Sjovangen added that item #38, "DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION: Special Use Permit No. 2013-004 by the Nature Conservancy (McCarran) Applicant is requesting a special use permit in APN 004-092-62, 004-091-77 and 004-091-78 (appox. T20N, R22E, Sections 28, 39, 32 and 33 MDBM)(39° 33′38″N, 119°32′11″NAD) to alter portions of the existing Truckee River channel and abutting floodplain environment to facilitate flood management, water quality improvement, biodiversity and habitat improvement, noxious weed eradication and recreation", will be continued. Mr. Osborne stated the continuation is to the next meeting and the applicant

is agreeable to the continuation. Mr. Whitten stated the next meeting is April 16, 2013 at 2:00 p.m.

6. PUBLIC COMMENT (No Action)

Dale Beach commented that at a previous meeting the Chairman had him thrown out by the Sheriff, which there is probably an incident report for. He continued that the other day he was at a meeting in Carson City, as was Chairman Sjovangen, when people made comments others applauded and it was allowed, here it's not. Mr. Beach continued with issues he has with the budget, in Mineral County there is a guy by the name of Greg Nixon. His classification is Fire Chief and he makes a total of \$45,000.85 per year, which is their total fire budget for labor, wages and benefits. Mr. Beach stated that he has heard from high-up officials in our county that you can't judge one county against another one. He has a general obligation debt comparison made by the State Tax Department. It rated Lander, Lincoln, Mineral, Pershing, Storey and White Pine Counties. Chairman Sjovangen stated that the Board is not interested in any of that and asked him to have a seat.

Mr. Phillips, Virginia City resident, stated that on the 28th of March at 10:00 am the Nevada Mining Oversight and Accountability Commission meet in Carson City with video conference to Las Vegas. Mr. Phillips explained that on the agenda was information regarding the possible degradation of Virginia City as a national historic landmark as a result of mining operations. For the record Chairman Sjovangen spoke under public comment and also present at the meeting was lobbyist Greg "Bum" Hess. Towards the end of the meeting Steven Horsford realized there was not representation from the agency. Chairman Sjovangen stated that was it told Mr. Phillips to sit down. Mr. Phillips submitted the agenda for the meeting to the Clerk. Chairman Sjovangen explained that this Board has no control over those meetings and it is not a topic for

discussion. Mr. Phillips stated there was no one there to represent the public. Chairman Sjovangen repeatedly told Mr. Phillips to leave. Mr. Phillips was escorted from the room by a Sheriff's Deputy.

Chairman Sjovangen asked that the meeting be placed into recess at 9:11 am.

The Chair called the meeting to order at 9:12 am.

Nicole Barde, Virginia City Highlands resident, addressed the Board stating Mark Phillips may be a pest to you but what Mark brings up is not wrong. How he does it may be wrong but when you throw him out it is an insult to every resident of this county, we have a right to be heard. She continued that you are elected to listen to us, you cannot rule by force. Chairman Sjovangen asked her to sit down, she stated she would not. Ms. Barde added these comments are on record and this is not right, we should not be treated this way.

Chairman Sjovangen stated that Mr. Phillips was removed because he was not in compliance with the law. He is talking about something this Board has no authority over. It has nothing to do with this Commission or this County. It is a waste of time and that is why he is not allowed to speak. General public comment is for disseminating general information.

Dale Beach commented on how the people are being ran over by County Management, the county looks like it is set up to serve and manage 150 people instead of 4,030. We want to be treated just like everyone; there is no easy way to do business with Storey County. Now he has a new friend, the Comptroller and he sends him documents, he writes to Commissioner Gilman and gets nothing back. He wants to know why Jana Seddon is getting \$1,000.00 more than other people that are supposed to be set by State. Chairman Sjovangen responded that the question will probably be answered once we get into the budget portion of the meeting. Mr. Beach asked that he be told when to ask his questions. He can't hear sitting anywhere out there. Chairman Sjovangen commented that we recognize that the acoustics are not the best in here. Mr. Beach asked if he could bring Mr. Phillips back into the meeting. Chairman Sjovangen replied that he does not want him in here. His whole intent is to create a public spectacle. Mr. Beach added we all want to be treated fair.

Mr. Whitten stated that this item was put on at the request of Nevada Assemblyman Jim Wheeler and former Assemblyman Tom Grady. There is a bill before the Nevada Legislature that once again confirms the core the rights that Nevadans believe in, the constitutional right to bear arms. If approved copies will be sent to the various people listed within the resolution.

Item 9 from Consent Agenda: Possible approval of Resolution 13-371 supporting Congressman Mark Amodei's bill before the Unites States Congress (H.R. 1167), also known as the Restoring Storey County Act which conveys surface rights to approximately 1745 acres of land potentially claimed by the United States Government.

Mr. Whitten stated that late last fall Congressman Amodei introduced a bill that was known as the Restoring Storey County Act, it simplicity and elegantly attempted to solve title cloud issues in Virginia City, Gold Hill and a small portion of Mark Twain. BLM has historically asserted some type of surface interest in the previous listed areas. Working with Congressman Amodei's staff and former Commissioner Hess we were able to carve out a very narrow piece of land in the Gold Hill area, attempting to avoid as many of the controversial issues, such as mining, as we may have and encompassed Virginia City and 6 parcels in Mark Twain. That bill went nowhere;

Congressman Amodei's staff asked if we wanted to reintroduce it, our answer was yes. Mr. Whitten explained that in essence right now any property owner wishing to clear these title clouds with BLM would need to individually seek out an act of congress conveying the property from the federal government to the individual. This bill gives those lands, if passed by Congress, to Storey County and it would be the County's attempt to covey the titles out to the individual land owners. He has been working with Jana Seddon and Jen Chapman to develop a streamline procedure to allow the title to be properly transferred into the property owner's name. Mr. Whitten has been asked what the cost will be for individual land owners to buy their land back, at this stage in the game his best answer is \$14.00, the recording fee. This resolution is supporting Congressman Amodei's efforts to help us.

Commissioner Gilman asked if the title would pass to Storey County for the properties listed in the bill. Mr. Whitten explained that individual owners already have some interest; this would take any interest that BLM claims away. Any reported interest by the federal government would be deeded over to Storey County, followed by a deed to the current property owner. Commissioner Gilman asked if maps with parcel numbers have been produced. Mr. Whitten responded that we have, however are not in a format yet to be made public. It is currently being cleaned up by GIS. Commissioner Gilman asked if it would be prudent to wait until the final map is available. Mr. Whitten responded respectfully no, this is a tool that Congressman Amodei's needs to get the bill passed. The zone has been negotiated months ago. Commissioner Gilman added that he is generally in favor of this motion however he is concerned that there has not been a map provided.

Chairman Sjovangen stated that right now Congressman Amodei needs all the help he can get. This is the second attempt to get the bill passed. Commissioner Gilman commented that we still do not have maps, to which Chairman Sjovangen responded that we do. Mr. Whitten explained that we do have maps, but he is not confident down to the individual parcel level, we know the target area. The maps themselves are in the provided public packet. Commissioner Gilman stated this is an important clean-up for our community; he would be more comfortable with a map or listing of the properties in question.

Assessor Jana Seddon addressed Commissioner Gilman's concerns regarding the map. She explained that she has been working with GIS for almost two years trying to get our parcel data updated. The issue with the current map is that it is lacking the current updates to parcel numbers and owners. By next week the complete map should be available.

Commissioner Gilman asked if a parcel list will be attached to Congressman Amodei's bill or is it presented as "parcels to be determined." Mr. Whitten explained yes and no, we have identified them as township, range and sections, not the individual parcels. Chairman Sjovangen added that BLM has reviewed the current map and is comfortable with boundaries submitted.

11. DISCUSSION (No Action): Committee/Staff Reports

Assessor Jana Seddon:

- 1. Reported that her office has been actively working with GIS to get the map previously discussed updated and ready to go. It is a very important issue for the County. Working on having another pictorial fly done for the county, has been a huge success.
- 2. Getting ready to do new construction appraisals.

Commissioner Gilman asked if the maps submitted for Congressman Amodei's are primarily for Virginia City and Mark Twain or are there other areas that have been identified. Ms. Seddon explained the maps cover Virginia City, portions of Gold Hill and 6 parcels in Mark Twain. Commissioner Gilman commented that in TRI and other areas there are many strips between parcels that BLM claims, there is a broader cleanup plan that could be implemented. Mr. Whitten responded that initially we attempted to include much more property in this bill, everything owned by the federal government. We were repeatedly told no, Congressman Amodei wants to keep this very simple, land bills can take years to get through Congress. Once this bill is passed we have the option to go back for a second bill and include the property referred to by Commissioner Gilman. We will go back for round two after we get round one done.

Emergency Management Director Joe Curtis:

- 1. Comstock Community Television will soon be providing emergency notifications to the subscribers due to participation in a FEMA supported grant. The system is continuing to evolve and make significant process.
- 2. On May 4th there will be four counties, Carson, Lyon, Douglas and Storey, emergency exercises in conjunction with the Comstock Mining Company, Inc. The scenario will involve a cyanide leak. A grant was obtained from the state to fund the exercise.

Communications Director Dave Ballard:

1. Obtained a grant to purchase software for our computer added dispatch system. Working with GIS to get some of the mapping up and running. This will allow dispatch to push information out to first responders and allow them to see what the dispatchers are seeing. Should be up and running in the next month. The department is getting ready for the summer season.

Fire Protection District Chief Gary Hames:

1. Stated that he has heard Mineral County compared to us several times now and would be happy to answer that in the depth should this Board like. There are a couple of similarities that have never been brought out. Hawthorne is the primary area within Mineral County; Hawthorne has a large military presence and a separate fire department. That separate department is run by Day and Zimmerman; they have probably a third more staff than we do. So when you look at the global picture with how Mineral County is composed it is important to compare apples to apples. He would be happy to sit down with Mr. Beach anytime and discuss this. It's not really fair when you include Day and Zimmerman who serves the army base.

- 2. Thanked Vice-Chairman McBride for sitting on the Battalion Chief hiring board late last week. Commissioner Gilman will be sitting in on the interview panels next week. It has been narrowed down to two candidates; Chief Hames feels we can't go wrong with either candidate.
- 3. The EMS billing position has been filled by Darcy McMillin, she will be starting next week and is going to be very, very busy as call volumes are starting to pick up for the season.
- 4. Seasonal advertising is done, we received about 20 applications and will be interviewing in the next couple of weeks, with a tentative start date of May 1st.
- 5. Received a grant for \$250,000.00 from the Division of Forestry for a 3 person crew. The crew will be falling dead trees over the winter, trail clearances, assist with Community Clean-Up Week and clear around 40 residences in the Mark Twain area, 12 being vacant nuisance issues. The funding includes the purchase of a chipper; our grant match is \$140,000.00 in in-kind labor.
- 6. We are moving forward with the consolidation of the Station 73 in Mark Twain into Lyon County Station 38.
- 7. The Every 15 Minute Program is moving along extremely well. Department Head and School District participation has been phenomenal.

Public Works Director Mike Nevin:

- 1. At the last meeting the Board approved the letter of intent with the USDA for proposed funding for the waste water treatment facility in Virginia City. Late Friday afternoon the local office in Carson City received notification that the funds have been released and we are going to move forward.
- 2. Had interviews for the custodial maintenance position, have narrowed it down to two individuals. He hopes to have a decision by the end of the day and have the person online in the next couple of weeks.
- 3. There was some vandalism at the Mark Twain Park last week, someone shot up the slide at the park. Will be making some minor repairs to keep it in use.

Community Development Director Dean Haymore:

- 1. He informed the Board that Stacey lost her mother last week and Diane is taking care of her mother. He thanked Pat for lending Susan and Donna is coming in to help. Our condolences go out Stacey from her Storey County family.
- 2. They have started repairs in Gold Hill on the road through an agreement between Comstock Mining, Inc. and NDOT.
- 3. Yesterday the company he has been working with out of Chicago closed escrow on 700 USA Parkway. He also received plans for the grading and the property, which is scheduled to being within 40 days. Plans went out for contractors to bid on a 450,000 square foot logistics facility.
- 4. MARS is taking the Dell Building and will be converting it over to a logistics center. Several additional companies are moving with one expanding their pit modular system.
- 5. He has been working with Comstock Mining, Inc. to do some expansions.

Commissioner Gilman thanked him for the reports that have been coming out of his department on the current activity within Storey County. Mr. Haymore added that we are working to sublease space in the county owned building in TRI. The Royal Sierra building may be undergoing expansion and improvements as well. Commissioner Gilman added that the big news is that the market is starting to pick up.

Administrative Officer/Senior Planner Austin Osborne:

- 1. The master plan workshops are moving forward may be looking at establishing a sub-committee to hold micro workshops. Updating the existing plan not gutting the current plan, to bring it current.
- 2. On May 16th in Lockwood there will be a meeting of the Planning Commission at which time a presentation will be given on the Truckee River Flood Management Project. Mr. Osborne will follow the meeting with a master plan workshop.
- 3. Hugh Roy Marshall will be issued an underground mining permit for a small operation at the Sutro Tunnel.

Comptroller Hugh Gallagher:

1. The quarterly financial statement format was approved by the Department of Taxation and the first and second quarters are on the website. The third should shortly follow.

County Manager Pat Whitten:

- 1. It is required by NRS that the final budget hearing be held on May 20th, he was advised this morning by our Clerk that there is the potential for a jury trial to commence on the same day. We are planning consolidate the budget hearing with the normal commission business, and look at holding the meeting at Piper's Opera House.
- 2. Expanding the county family by two people and they are not related to anyone on staff in any way that he can tell.
- 3. Free Dump Day is scheduled for May 4th. Jeff Wood stepped up the plate for community clean up.
- 4. For decades many of us have dreamed about getting natural gas, we have resident here in town that would like to be our utilities analyst. Paul Kvam has many years working with the Public Utilities Commission and is extremely well versed in the process. Looks like the most viable route would be through 6 Mile Canyon.
- 12. **DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION:** Presentation by Onetta Fanlo of A and H Insurance regarding possible renewal of Storey County employees' benefits plan, including medical, dental, vision and life insurance. Discussion will also include an update on changes to taxes, fees and related policies imposed by the State of Nevada for the upcoming year.

Ms. Fanlo gave a brief overview of the presentation she provided the Board at the previous meeting. She was able to negotiate a 9.9% rate increase for the county with the same 3 plans being offered as the year before. There are benefit fairs scheduled for tomorrow and Thursday to cover the plans with the employees and address any concerns.

Vice-Chairman McBride asked if next year, with the Affordable Health Care Act changes, will the current plans still be available to us or are we going to be forced into something else. Ms. Fanlo explained that due to the county being considered a large employer we will have a lot more options available to us, including the ones we currently have.

Motion: Approve the acceptance of the insurance renewal as presented by Ms. Fanlo, **Action:** Approve **Moved by Vice-**Chairman McBride **Seconded by** Commissioner Gilman

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (**summary:** Yes=3)

13. **DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION:** Authorize the County Manager to execute documents required to enroll in and provide benefits as provided for under the National Association of Counties (NACo) Dental Discount Program.

Mr. Whitten stated that this looks to be a great program that caught all of our attention while we were at the Legislative Conference in Washington DC last month, particularly Vice-Chairman McBride.

Vice-Chairman McBride explained that the program is being offered by the National Associate of Counties (NACo). We currently participate in the prescription program that is offered by NACo, they are now offering a dental program. Unlike the prescription program the dental program does charge a fee to those that are enrolled. The fees are very low and afford you the ability to visit the dentists that are participating in the program and receive a 20%-50% discount for services rendered. Vice-Chairman McBride explained that we will work with Community Chest and the senior centers to provide the program for those who do not have currently have dental insurance. This does not cost the county anything to participate as we are members of NACo. He explained this isn't insurance it is a discount program. Mr. Beach and Mr. Prosser, from the audience, asked questions regarding the program. It was explained that all Storey County residents are eligible to participate.

Mr. Whitten added that it takes approximately 2 months for all the material to be made available and the program become active in Storey County.

Motion: Approve to authorize the County Manager to execute documents required to enroll in and provide benefits as provided for under the National Association of Counties (NACo) Dental Discount Program, **Action:** Approve **Moved by** Commissioner Gilman **Seconded by** Vice-Chairman McBride

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (summary: Yes=3)

14. **DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION:** Direction to staff regarding legislation or legislative issues proposed by legislators, by Storey County or by other entities permitted by the Nevada State Legislature to submit bill draft requests, or such legislative issues as may be deeded by the Chair or the Board to be of critical significance to Storey County. Specific legislation will include but not necessarily be limited to S.B. 272 where an official position of either opposition or neutrality will be requested based on possible text amendment.

Mr. Whitten informed the Board that the generic nature of this item is that we are frequently asked to express how the county may feel about various bills before the state legislature. Historically those have generally been left up to himself or senior staff. On this particular bill there are a number of issues and things to be determined. As early as tomorrow we may be

asked by the legislature where we stand on this item. The areas involved are the Sunny Hills within Storey County and

Mr. Hess provided an overview of SB 272, the bill refers to a land swap that we can do with Washoe County. There are reciprocal caveats to the bill; one being that the boards of both county commissions must approve any transactions. The primary areas involved are the Sunny Hills project, 1,100 acres within Storey County and TRI property that lies between the river and I80. Basically the committee is looking for one of three positions; neutral, oppose or approve. There are still a few things that the bill needs. We have had some changes and amendments to the bill. The bill still needs an amendment stating that each property can be swapped individually, not all properties have to go at once. The bill is scheduled to be heard tomorrow morning.

Chairman Sjovangen commented that going back to the whole Corde Vista thing this would be roughly west of that area, just on the north side of the Highlands. His opinion is that at this point we would probably want to go in neutral until we get all the Highlands folks together. Looking at the map it appears that the Sunny Hills Subdivision would come pretty close to Lousetown Road, it doesn't take a lot of imagination to see that the people will be in the Highlands on their quads riding around. On the other end of this is the River District and they may want to weigh in on it also. Mr. Hess added that the 300 acres that we would want is currently in Washoe County, with all of infrastructure right there. Regarding the 1,100 acres that abuts the Corde Vista project, we have told the developers that it is your sell to the Highlands residents. It has to take reciprocal votes from both Boards.

Ms. Barde, Highlands resident, asked the Board that wasn't one of the issues with Corde Vista water. She asked that if we swap land with Washoe County isn't water still going to be an issue. Chairman Sjovangen explained that they will have to bring in their own water. Ms. Barde added that there are always two issues with the Highlands, one being people coming in on our property and the major issue, water. She doesn't know that the Highlands are going to go for this. Mr. Hess stated that the developers know that they are coming up against the Highlands folks and it's going to be a tough sale. Mr. Hess explained that in the past we have attempted to do this without the legislature being involved.

Mr. Whitten commented that it is sad that the property on I80 would go undeveloped. We would love to see it developed in Storey County as it is in a prime location.

Commissioner Gilman excused himself from the table and the item as he is a principal in the TRI properties, he feels it is inappropriate from him to take a position or participate in the vote.

Mr. Hess stated that we are working with Vince Griffith to insure that the surveyed locations in the bill match the surveys on file with the Recorder. He reiterated that there is language that still needs to be added in the bill and should be included in the vote today. Mr. Whitten added a position of opposition at this stage would kill the bill, he would advocate for either a position of neutrality or a third option that was recently presented, no position. There is too much that still needs to be determined. He still has some concerns regarding a change in the definition to Washoe County but not to Storey County. He would like to meet with the LCB to bring some

clarification to the issue. At this time he would recommend no position. Mr. Hess commented that if the appropriate language is not added to the bill than we would want to oppose it because at that point it becomes an anti-Storey County bill.

Mr. Garret Gordon addressed the Board. He represents Sunny Hills in this project; he is a land use/zoning lobbyist and attorney. Mr. Gordon stated the bill does currently include both properties and to give enabling authority to the counties. On behalf of Sunny Hills he is aware that he has a lot of work to do. A technical amendment should be ready tomorrow stating that both properties don't have to go, it doesn't have to be all or nothing. Mr. Gordon stated he looks forward to working with this commission and the Highlands residents.

Ms. Barde asked what the next step is in this. Meaning will the public have a voice or a vote in what happens next. Chairman Sjovangen stated that this is moving the bill forward in the legislature. Ms. Barde asked if there was a timeline for this. Mr. Gordon added that the bill just gives the commissions the ability to make the swap if they choose. There is a date in the bill of June 30, 2015, if nothing happens by this date than the ability to swap land terminates. Ms. Barde asked if there are milestones now and between the 2015 date to keep it moving. Mr. Gordon explained the process through the legislature; nothing will change until this board approves a resolution. Ms. Barde asked that this item be put on a ballot for all of the citizens to vote on and to see how this affects our master plan. Mr. Hess stated that there will be plenty of public hearings held on this, very similar to Blake Smith's deal. Mr. Whitten added that an advisory question is a great idea; the latest a question can be put on the ballot is September 2014.

Commissioner Sjovangen stated that this is the first time this bill has been exposed to the public and this is the beginning of a long process. Additional discussion was held regarding the needed amendments and process through the legislature. Mr. Gordon stated that Washoe County took no position on the bill at their meeting, but subject to having the language put in there that it is either or. He and Mr. Hess are willing to add that at tomorrow's hearing. Mr. Whitten added that subject to verification from LCB staff that the TRI properties are included as well. Ms. Barde clarified that the two pieces are not yoked in any way. Mr. Gordon responded that he completely understands that one deal may happen without the other, it is a guarantee that the bill will read that way.

Mr. Whitten stated that this item can remain on the agenda throughout the legislative session to allow the Board to discuss the changes and progression of the bill with Staff at future meetings.

2. Staff Summary: In order to provide immediate services within the proposed boundary line adjustment between Washoe and Storey County; within the East Truckee Canyon only, our cooperative agreement must be amended. This amendment provides for automatic aid throughout the canyon from Vista to Storey/Washoe/Lyon County line; joint staffing of Fire Station #75 (TRIC station); sharing of apparatus, stations and equipment; and, joint communications updates.

The SCFPD has always enjoyed a very close day-to-day relationship with the Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District. This agreement will only enhance and improve upon what is already a very positive joint response plan along the East Truckee Canyon corridor. It also facilitates interest in Washoe County's potential approval of the Boundary Line Adjustment as provided for in Section 1.5 of Senate Bill 272 approved and enacted into law during the 2013 Legislative Session.

AMENDMENT TO COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

THIS AMENDMENT ("Amendment") amends that certain Cooperative Agreement between TRUCKEE MEADOWS FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT (TMFPD) and STOREY COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT (SCFPD) dated July 1, 2012 ("Agreement"). The defined terms in the Agreement shall have the same meanings when used herein. Except as amended hereby all provisions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect. The parties agree to amend, modify and supplement the Agreement as follows.

- 1. Special Service Territory. SCFPD agrees to provide assistance, including Advanced Life Support, on an automatic aid basis, to TMFPD in an area of Washoe County within the East Truckee Canyon from the Vista Exit of I-80 on the west to the Lyon County boundary line on the east, including all areas of Wadsworth within TMFPD territory. No assistance provided by SCFPD to TMFPD in this area shall be considered Assistance by Hire, regardless of the extent or duration of the assistance provided.
- 2. Station #75. SCFPD Station #75, 1705 Peru Drive, McCarran, Nevada 89434 has capacity to be jointly staffed in the future by personnel of SCFPD and TMFPD. Joint staff will delay or eliminate the need for TMFPD to build a fire station in the area specified in Section 1 above, and reduce operating costs for TMFPD to provide service to said area. TMFPD, at its election in its sole discretion, shall have the right to provide personnel to occupy with SCFPD personnel Station #75. SCFPD shall not charge rent for TMFPD's use of Station #75 and SCFPD shall pay all other costs of station operation (e.g., utilities, maintenance, repair, etc.). SCFPD shall supply all work vehicles, equipment and materials required for personnel from both SCFPD and TMFPD at Station #75. SCFPD shall have supervision and control of its personnel, and TMFPD shall have supervision and control of its personnel. TMFPD and SCFPD shall have equal input on Station #75 operation issues.
- 3. <u>No Termination</u>. The provisions of this Amendment cannot be modified or terminated without the agreement of TMPFD, in its sole discretion, the provisions of Section 24 of the Agreement notwithstanding.
- 4. <u>Communications</u>. The Storey County Communications Department will provide the necessary equipment and facilities to improve communications between SCFPD and TMFPD which may include 800 MHz or VHF repeaters or other such equipment deemed necessary on Pond Peak. Such equipment is intended to facilitate communications within and along the Interstate 80 corridor. The additional equipment will be provided by Storey County Communications Department at no cost to TMFPD, including all ongoing operational costs. The Parties will meet to determine the most cost efficient means and methods in which to facilitate joint emergency communications.

Cooperative Agreement Between Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District and Storey County Fire Department ***\!

In accordance with NRS 277.045, this Cooperative Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into between the Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District on behalf of itself and on behalf of the Sierra Fire Protection District ("TMFPD"), and Storey County Fire department (SCFD), all fire districts formed under NRS Chapter 474. At times herein the parties may be referred to as "agency" or "agencies." This Agreement is effective upon approval and execution by all agencies.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, each of the above-named entities maintains and operates fire/rescue organizations within their respective jurisdictions, and TMFPD and the Sierra Fire Protection District are now consolidated for operation purposes administered by TMFPD; and,

WHEREAS, on occasion each agency experiences fires or other emergencies of such a magnitude or simultaneous number that assistance of other fire response organizations would be beneficial in addressing the emergencies; and,

WHEREAS, it is deemed in the best interests of the public and citizens of the affected jurisdictions that TMFPD and SCFD provide both automatic aid and mutual aid to the other as set forth herein; and,

WHEREAS, the agencies hereto desire to enter into this cooperative agreement pursuant to NRS 277.045 to provide for the circumstances and procedures under which each agency will provide assistance, both Mutual Aid and Automatic Aid, in responding to fire and other emergencies when requested by the other party; and,

NOW THEREFORE, based upon the foregoing recitals which are incorporated by this reference, the agencies mutually agree to provide fire suppression equipment, facilities and personnel to each one other under the following terms and conditions:

1. Definitions - The following definitions shall have the meaning ascribed to them:

- a. Agency Representative This person serves as the point of contact for the responding or requesting agency and has been delegated authority to make decisions on matters affecting that agency's participation at the incident.
- b. Annual Operating Plan The parties will meet annually, to prepare an annual operating plan (AOP). This AOP will include current rates for use of the Department's equipment and personnel, list of principal personnel, and any other items identified in this agreement.
- c. Assistance by Hire Assistance by hire is the provision to provide fire suppression or support resources to the other party on a reimbursement basis. All reimbursement shall be based upon rates established in the AOP.

- d. Automatic Aid Automatic aid means both parties are automatically dispatched, without a specific request, to an incident occurring in a designated area.
- e. Mutual Aid Mutual aid may be provided in the event of a specific request for assistance as set forth below.
- f. Requesting Agency The agency which experiences an incident in which assistance, whether mutual aid or automatic aid, is sought shall be known herein as the Requesting Agency.
- g. Responding Agency The agency providing assistance, whether through mutual aid or automatic aid, shall be known herein as the Responding Agency.
- 2. Request for Mutual Aid. When it is believed that mutual aid is necessary, a request for assistance shall be made by the most expedient manner possible. Both agencies shall provide a telephone number or telephone numbers to the other agency which should be used when requesting assistance from the Responding Agency. It is mutually agreed that either party may operate on the other parties' radio frequency.
- 3. Mutual Aid Resource Determination. The Battalion Chief for the Responding Agency shall determine whether it has sufficient resources available to provide mutual aid and respond to the request for assistance. If the Responding Agency has resources available to respond to the request for assistance, the Responding Agency will furnish the Requesting Agency fire fighting equipment, personnel and facilities. Neither agency is obligated to reduce the level of resources available in the responding jurisdiction below that deemed reasonably necessary to provide the residents of the Responding Agency's jurisdiction with fire suppression services.
- 4. Automatic Aid. The parameters of Automatic aid and the attendant response areas are set forth in AOP. The AOP may be modified by mutual agreement of the Fire Chiefs for the parties provided that the revisions are signed by the Fire Chiefs or duly authorized designee and provided to the respective County Clerks before they are effective.
- 5. Communications. In both mutual and automatic aid situations, the operating frequency will be designated by the Requesting Agency's dispatch center. It will be identified at the same time the request for assistance is made by the Requesting Party. All communications will be to the requesting dispatch center on the designated frequency.
- 6. Incident Management. Any mutual or automatic aid extended under this Agreement is done with the express understanding that personnel of the Requesting Agency shall remain in charge at the incident for which aid is requested unless the command of an incident has been transferred to another agency or to an incident management team. Pursuant to this authority, the Requesting Agency, the agency which has command or the incident management team, may direct and supervise the personnel and equipment provided by the Responding Agency through the operation of this Agreement.
- 7. Mutual/Automatic Aid. Mutual aid and automatic aid shall be provided without expectation of reimbursement for the first (24) twenty-four hours from the time of

response. All mutual or automatic aid provided beyond (24) twenty- four hours will be considered assistance by hire.

If reimbursement is available as a result of a declaration of disaster, grant, and/or cost recovery, reimbursement for personnel, apparatus and support equipment shall cover the entire time of commitment, beginning from the time of initial dispatch from the Responding Party's home base, to the time of return to the home base. Events that are cost recoverable and/or payable through State or Federal Funding, or from third parties determined responsible shall be reimbursable. All reimbursement shall be based upon rates established in the AOP.

- 8. Assistance by Hire. Assistance by Hire is the provision of fire suppression resources, by one Agency to another, on a reimbursement basis. Except for mutual and automatic aid, all requests for fire suppression assistance shall be assistance by hire. Any resources provided by a Responding Agency, and not specifically ordered by the Requesting Agency, shall be considered a voluntary contribution. Agencies to this agreement will provide current Assistance by Hire rate schedules and updates when rates change. The rates will be posted and updated in the AOP.
- 9. Incident Management Teams. Salary, benefits, overtime, and transportation for department personnel assigned to an Incident Management Team that is utilized by the Requesting Agency to manage their incident, through delegation of authority, will be considered assistance by hire.
- 10. Equipment. The Responding Agency is responsible for the operation, service and maintenance of their equipment during incident operations on the jurisdiction of the Requesting Agency. The Requesting Agency shall be responsible to pay or reimburse for damages in excess of normal wear and tear, and shall replace or reimburse items lost, damaged or destroyed, except for damage that occurred as a result of negligence by the Responding Agency. Replacement or reimbursement to the Responding Agency by the Requesting Agency will occur within 90 days of receipt of an invoice documenting such equipment.
- 11. Incident Report. Upon request, the Responding Agency to a mutual aid incident shall provide the Requesting Agency with an incident report within (20) twenty working days following completion of the incident.
- 12. Worker's Compensation. For the limited purpose of the exclusive remedy set forth in NRS 616A020, both parties shall be deemed to employ jointly a person who is an employee of either party and sustains an injury by accident or occupational disease while participating in the matter for which assistance was requested. However, for the purpose of providing insurance benefits pursuant to NRS 616A through NRS 616D and NRS 617 each party shall provide such benefits to its own employees at its own expense. The parties waive any indemnification provision with respect to such industrial injuries or occupational diseases.
- 13. Independent Agencies. The parties are associated with each other only for the purposes and to the extent set forth in this Agreement, and in respect to performance of services

pursuant to this Agreement, each party is and shall be a public agency separate and distinct from the other party and, subject only to the terms of this Agreement, shall have the sole right to supervise, manage, operate, control, and direct performance of the incident under this Agreement. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed to create a partnership or joint venture, to create relationships of an employer-employee or principal-agent, or to otherwise create any liability for one agency whatsoever with respect to the indebtedness, liabilities, and obligations of the other agency or any other party.

- 14. Hold Harmless. The parties will not waive and intend to assert available remedies and liability limitations set forth in Chapter 41 of the Nevada Revised Statutes. Contractual liability of both parties shall not be subject to punitive damages. To the fullest extent of Chapter 41 of the Nevada Revised Statutes, each party shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend, not excluding the other's right to participate, the other party from and against all liability, claims, actions, damages, losses, and expenses, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees and costs arising out of any alleged negligent or willful acts or omissions of the indemnifying party, it officers, employees and agents. The indemnifying party shall not be liable to hold harmless any attorney's fees and costs for the indemnified party's chosen right to participate with legal counsel.
- 15. Third Party Beneficiaries. This Agreement is not intended to create or be construed to create any right or action on the part of any person or entity not signatory to this Agreement, nor create the status of third party beneficiaries for any person or entity.
- 16. Integration and Modification. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties and such are intended as a complete and exclusive statement of the promises, representations, negotiations, discussions, and other agreements that may have been made in connection with the subject matter hereof. Unless otherwise expressly authorized by the terms of this Agreement, no modification or amendment to this Agreement shall be binding upon the parties unless the same is in writing and signed by the respective parties hereto.
- 17. Severability. If any provision contained in this Agreement is held to be unenforceable by a court of law or equity, this Agreement shall be construed as if such provision did not exist and the non-enforceability of such provision shall not be held to render any other provision or provisions of this Agreement unenforceable.
- **18. Assignment.** Neither party shall assign, transfer or delegate any rights, obligations or duties under this Agreement without the proper written consent of the other party.
- 19. Public Records. Pursuant to NRS 239.010, information or documents may be open to public inspection and copying. The parties will have the duty to disclose unless a particular record is made confidential by law or a common law balancing of interests.
- 20. Proper Authority. The parties hereto represent and warrant that the person executing this Agreement on behalf of each party has full power and authority to enter into this

Agreement and that the parties are authorized by law to engage in the cooperative action set forth in this Agreement.

- **21. Governing law; Jurisdiction.** This Agreement and the rights and obligations of the parties hereto shall be governed by, and construed according to, the laws of the State of Nevada.
- 22. Ratification. This agreement shall become effective upon ratification by appropriate legal action by the governing bodies of the parties as a condition precedent to its entry into force and shall remain in full force and effect for <u>five years</u>, unless revoked by either party without cause, provided that a revocation shall not be effective until 90 days after a party has served written notice of revocation to the other party.
- 23. Amendment. The parties may amend this agreement at any time by an endorsement made in writing and approved by the Storey County Fire department fire board and the fire boards of both the Truckee Meadows and Sierra Fire Protection Districts.
- 24. Termination. The Agreement may be terminated by mutual consent of both parties or unilaterally by either party without cause upon 90 days written notice. The parties expressly agree that this Agreement shall be terminated immediately if for any reason any party's funding ability supporting this Agreement is withdrawn, limited, or impaired. This Agreement will be reviewed by the parties every other year to determine if any modifications are necessary.
- 25. Notices. All notices or other communications required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given when delivered personally by hand, or by telephonic facsimile with simultaneous delivery by regular mail, or mailed certified mail, return receipt requested, postage repaid on the date posted, and addressed to the other party at the following addresses:
