- One of the Fire Department's fire personnel has been sent to fight fires in Alabama as a heavy
 equipment operator. Per agreements that are in place, reimbursement to the fire department
 comes from whichever agency requests assistance for personnel and equipment.

County Manager Whitten on behalf of Public Works Director Jason VanHavel:

- Opening bids were received for the remaining phase of the sewer project. All bids exceeded the County engineer's estimate of \$10 million. Funding will come from 75% USDA grant and 25% low interest loan.
- Farr West Engineering has requested the project be put out for re-bid. Bid opening date will be July 7th in hopes to have this on the July 18th Commission agenda with a notice to proceed on September 11th.
- The Gold Hill portion of the project may be revised saving approximately \$5 million. The leach field and potentially the septic system would be improved.
- Fair West Engineering handles the announcement and receipt of bids and has reached out to several known contactors.

• James Deane, IT Director, thanked all department heads and staffs, for the diligent compliance with the County's IT protocols in terms of passwords, malware, etc. James and the IT group are recognized for their diligence based on the weekend's historic attack on the internet. The County was not affected.

The budget will be reviewed once it is understood what the County has to have. Hopefully there won't be a need to look at a tax.

Commissioner McGuffey:

- SB57 Storey County V&T Bill A Bill to change the V&T Reconstruction Board from nine to
 five members, and to replace seats with Directors of Tourism from Carson City and Virginia
 City. This bill has passed and is on the way to be signed by the Governor. This will enable the
 County to gain control of the funding, give control of marketing to the Tourism Director, and
 take the train from running in the red.

- The focus for jba Consulting will be to look at fire protection engineering, industrial hygienist, and chemical engineering.
- This group will provide all information to the County needed to answer these questions and be comfortable with the project.
- jba serves as a consultant the County pays jba as a vendor. The (project) owners will reimburse the County.

General Fund Revenues: Increased approximately \$454,000 over the tentative. At the time of the tentative, the County had not received final ad valorem, sales tax, real property transfer tax, and centrally assessed figures from the Department of Taxation.

- Final figures indicate centrally assessed to be about \$300,000 more than originally thought.
- There was a minor adjustment in Tesla reimbursements.
- A new line item Service Department Fees has been added. A fee for all vehicles worked on by the service department.
- The revised Revenue budget is \$13,773,617.

General Fund Expenditures:

- Clerk/Treasurer: Budget reduced \$102,429. \$100,000 for voting machines moved to Captial Outlay.
- District Court: Reduced \$56,700 in Professional and Public Defender Services.
- Genetic Testing: No change
- Drug Court: No change
- Recorder: Reduced \$9,689 in Health Insurance and Professional Services-ADS.
- Assessor: Reduced \$22,772 due to employee retirement.
- Technology: No change
- Buildings & Grounds: Salaries for the Director and Assistant Director readjusted to different funds. An increase of \$8,916 over tentative.
- Pool & Parks: Reduced \$3,558 in salaries and health benefits.
- Service Department: Reduced \$21,064 in salaries and health benefits.

• Roads: The usual \$300,000 transfer from the General Fund will not be made this year as there are funds left in the current year's budget. If there is a need for additional funding, it can be provided.

Mr. Gallagher continued with review of the General Fund.

- Equipment Acquisition Special Revenue Fund: Funded by property taxes and centrally assessed. There are capital outlay and debt service expenditures. Reduced \$12,725.
- Commissioners: Salaries and benefits reduced \$28,361.
- Administrative: Salaries and benefits reduced \$36,485.
- Health & Human Services: Benefits reduced \$206.
- Planning: Salaries and benefits reduced \$5,269.

This concludes the General Budget. The expense tentative budget was \$15,270,314; the final budget being submitted is \$13,762,648. There was a negative \$1,950,697 at the tentative. The final is \$10,969 on the plus side.

County Manager Whitten: The "benefits negotiating team", including LP Insurance, Austin Osborne, Jessie Fain, with participants from various departments, were able to negotiate an increase of only 6.71 percent. This is a major factor in the overall bottom line.

Chairman McBride: Almost every department had budget increases over the last year. Centrally assessed funds are difficult and not known until the end of the fiscal year, making it difficult to budget.

This year it is down about \$150,000 from the year before. Taxes on the revenue side are up a bit – offsetting the \$150,000 – allowing department heads to increase budgets where necessary to meet contractual obligations with the various unions.

Congratulations to Mr. Gallagher and his team, this is an arduous, lengthy task.

Motion: I move to approve 2017-2018 General Fund Final Budget for the items noted by Comptroller Hugh Gallagher to the Department of Taxation, including the Special Revenue Fund for Equipment Acquisition, Action: Approve, Moved by: Vice Chairman McGuffey, Seconded by: Commissioner Gilman, Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote, (Summary: Yes=3)

Mr. Gallagher: Special revenue funds to be addressed:

• Indigent Medical: Has a 10 cent ad valorem rate provided by NRS, Indigent Persons. No change from tentative to final budget.

 Indigent Accident: Governed by NRS 244.160 stating, "The Board of County Commissioners shall have power and jurisdiction in their respective counties to take care of and provide for the indigent sick of the county in such a manner only as is or may be provided by law." No change from tentative to final budget.

Capital Project: Budgeted expense is \$1,550,200 versus revenues of \$93,733. There is a
beginning fund balance of approximately \$2.2 million. No change from tentative to final.

• Infrastructure: Receives ¼ cent option sales tax. Budgeted revenue is \$315,000, with \$1 million in expense. Beginning fund balance is \$773,100. No change from tentative to final.

• Stabilization: Revenues are accepted from the General Fund; expense budget is \$200,000. The beginning fund balance is \$800,000. Mr. Gallagher would like to see the fund balance increase to \$1.5 million. No change from the tentative.

- TRI Payback: Created by an agreement for a public/private partnership between Storey County and the Tahoe Regional Industrial Park. There are agreements for amounts of funding the County receives from within the park this is the revenue. There is an amount for expenses the County is allowed to have. The net is paid to the public/private partner at a rate of 35%. This fund was established to stay ahead and currently there is approximately \$2 million in that fund. Consequently, funds transferred in from the General Fund, Equipment Acquisition, and Fire Department have been reduced by about one-half from \$1.5 million to \$751,000. This leaves an ending fund balance of \$1,271,563.
- VC Rail Project: This fund was established for the building of tunnel 6 including land purchases - there is an ending fund balance of \$28,014. This bond is still in effect. There are no changes from the tentative to the final budget.
- Federal & State Grants: The County is expecting approximately \$496,000 in grants and anticipate spending the same amount. There is some over-lap with grants that follow year to year.
- Virginia City Tourism Commission: Salaries and benefits reduced \$23,585. \$327,070 is the anticipated ending fund balance.

- Information technology and communications infrastructure needs to be addressed.
- The Legislature is still in session, so un-funded mandates are unsure.
- There is always the possibility of a Special Election in November.



- 4. Waltham / Patrick Interchange Needs to undergo a redesign for an alternate exit for TRI Center.



- SR 431 Enhanced speed signage with speed indicators coming into Virginia City on both ends.
- SR 341 Left turns on Carson St are a safety concern along with the speed of vehicles during the commute.
- Painted Rock Bridge is too low for the new Fire and Emergency response vehicles

Once validated, our planning department will vet these issues along with state priorities and coordinate into the State's Long Range Transportation Plan.










CRASHES BY DAY OF THE WEEK





DRIVER AGE RANGE







Evaluation of water-level decline and aquifer properties in the Virginia City Highlands and Highland Ranches Volcanic Rock aquifer system, Storey County, Nevada

BACKGROUND

The Virginia City Highlands and Highland Ranches (VC Highlands) is a rural housing development established along the ridge of the Virginia Range in Storey County, Nevada (fig. 1). The surface topography of the highlands area is variable, with property parcels developed over a 1,000 ft range of altitude in an 18 square-mile area. Paired with the varying topography is a large range of domestic well depths, from 75 to 1,175 ft of total depth below land surface. Approximately 1,400 residents exclusively rely on domestic wells for water supply and driller reports indicate wells are completed within fractures of volcanic rock.

PROBLEM

The U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) currently monitors water levels annually in two domestic wells in the VC Highlands (fig. 1). Recent analysis of water levels indicates a rapid and substantial decline in the water-table at these two sites. Between 1997 and 2016, water levels declined approximately 50 and 165 ft near the center of development in the VC Highlands. Due to the limited measurement frequency and close proximity of the monitoring well locations, the extent of the declining water-table is unknown. However, analysis of the State of Nevada Division of Water Resources (NDWR) well log database indicates 103 of 623 domestic wells (17 percent) have been deepened or replaced, indicating water-level declines are more widespread and represent a significant cost burden to homeowners in the area (fig. 1).

Well logs from NDWR indicate recently completed wells depths are deepening through time, likely in response to the declining water table. For example, domestic wells completed prior to 1997 had an average depth of 225 ft, and wells completed after 1997 have increased to an average depth of 375 ft. Verbal communication with residents in the VC highlands has indicated that deepening or replacement of domestic wells for some residents may be financially unrealistic and have opted to contract with private water-services for the delivery of potable water. The condition of domestic wells must be disclosed in real-estate sales in Nevada, potentially impacting property values for residents with dry wells.

The fractured volcanic rock aquifer in the VC Highlands represents the least understood aquifer system in Nevada and the Basin and Range physiographic province (Planert and Williams, 1995). Communities within the Basin and Range province generally rely on groundwater from basin-fill or carbonate aquifers for domestic supply. Currently, there is limited knowledge on properties and conditions of volcanic aquifers, the role they play within context of other aquifer systems, or their characteristics as domestic water supply throughout the Basin and Range

province. This project will assist the VC Highlands community and Storey County officials by monitoring and determining the properties of the fractured volcanic aquifer system.

OBJECTIVE

The objectives of this study are to: 1) monitor and estimate the water-level trends in the VC Highlands, 2) develop a water-table and water-level change map to quantify spatial and temporal water-level change, 3) characterize the fractured volcanic rock aquifer(s) hydraulic properties, and 4), estimate localized recharge potential from Lousetown Creek. These objectives will benefit Storey County officials and residents by collecting data necessary to understand the properties of groundwater and provide information that will aid in future management decisions in the VC Highlands and will help to improve our understanding of volcanic rock aquifer systems within the Basin and Range physiographic province.

RELEVANCE AND BENEFITS

This study will contribute to the USGS mission by increasing understanding of surface-water/groundwater interactions and their effect on water availability in a common hydrographic setting. The study is consistent with the USGS core mission of a Water Census of the United States (U.S. Geological Survey, 2007). Specifically, this study meets 3 of 5 strategic science directions of the Water Census mission. This study will contribute to: a better understanding of the status of freshwater resources and how they are changing; a more precise determination of water use for meeting future human, environmental, and wildlife needs; and, identifying how freshwater availability is related to natural storage and movement of water. This study will also provide the data necessary for county managers, stakeholders, and residence to assess the effects of water-resources management and planning decisions in the VC Highlands. Knowledge obtained from this study will contribute to better understanding of properties and nature of volcanic rock aquifer systems and their relation to water resources and ecologic systems within the Basin and Range aquifer physiographic province.

APPROACH

A five-year project is proposed to monitor VC Highlands groundwater, surface water, and precipitation during potentially variable climate conditions. In the first year of the project, a water-level monitoring network (network) will be established with willing residences in the VC Highlands. Subsequent years will focus on collecting aquifer properties and creating water-level change maps. Results of the study will be published in a USGS Scientific Investigations Report (SIR) at the end of the study period. The project approach to accomplishing the listed objectives are provided below:

Water-level Network

The network will be designed to represent groundwater conditions in the volcanic rock aquifer underlying the VC highlands both spatially and by well depth open to varying fracture zones. The network will consist of a combination of discrete and continuous measurements in the study area. Storey County has already obtained permission from approximately 30 residents for the USGS to monitor water-levels for the discrete network. Water-level measurements will be made at a monthly frequency from July to October, 2018 to identify static water-level conditions and wells suitable for longer-term monitoring, and will then be transitioned to a quarterly basis for the duration of the project. The discrete network will be scaled to efficiently monitor fractured rock aquifer(s) in the VC Highlands. The continuous network will consist of multiple

observation wells (2-5), preferably not being used for domestic supply, instrumented with pressure transducers. Pressure transducers will record water-level change at 15 minute frequency intervals. The data will be quality assured with bi-monthly measurements and downloads. Transducer data will be published to the web and aid in community outreach of the project. All water-level data will be available to the public via the USGS NWISweb.

Accurate water-level altitudes are necessary for the comparison of water-level measurements in varying topography, and are required for the development of a water-table map. Accurate altitudes of wells in the groundwater network will be surveyed using a differential GPS system according to USGS guidelines (Rydlund and Densmore, 2012).

Water-Level Change Map

Water-table and water-level change maps will be documented and published in the SIR. The water-level change maps will be developed in a geographic information system (GIS), with the use of geo-statistical interpolation techniques (Hutchinson and others, 2011). Additional water-level change over time will be estimated by comparing measured water-levels with historic water levels measured by the USGS and reported in drillers logs.

A water-level potentiometric map completed by (Koltermann, 1984) will be digitized and georectified to difference the water-level maps from 1983 and 2018 to quantify water-level change for the past 35 years. Interpolated water-level surfaces will be differenced to estimate change in the water-table and aquifer storage. Water-level change in areas of 1, 10, and 40 acre parcels with domestic wells will be evaluated to characterize water level trends by parcel size.

Aquifer Properties

Aquifer properties and characteristics will be evaluated to provide understanding of the properties controlling groundwater movement and storage. On an opportunistic basis, borehole geophysics will be collected with a Mount Sopris Matrix System ®, and MGXII data logger provided by the USGS Office of Geophysics. The project will use available volunteer well(s), no wells or boreholes will be drilled by this project. Geophysical data will be collected from replacement domestic well(s) by lowering the Mount Sopris Matrix System down the open well borehole. The geophysical sensor will be configured with multiple sensors to provide detailed information of aquifer properties (table 1). The geophysical data will be used to characterize fracture networks and estimate local aquifer properties. Aquifer properties over a larger area will be evaluated with 3-5 aquifer tests and made available on the *USGS Nevada Water Science Centers Aquifer Test webpage*. The estimate of aquifer hydraulic properties will be made from either single or multi-well drawdown tests. Single well aquifer tests will be analyzed using the Cooper-Jacob method (Cooper and Jacob, 1946) prógrammed in the aquifer-test analysis spreadsheet developed by Halford and Kuniansky (2002).

Surface-Water and Spring Monitoring

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


Figure 1. Location of monitoring and deepened domestic wells near Virginia City Highlands, Storey County, Nevada.

Lousetown Creek is the main ephemeral stream flowing through the central VC Highlands during winter and spring precipitation and runoff (fig. 1). Sharp (1974) concluded the Comstock fault may be the controlling influence on the location of Lousetown Creek and seepage from Lousetown Creek may contribute the majority of groundwater recharge through fractured areas (Koltermann, 1984). Lousetown Creek will be monitored with two flume installations for the duration of the project. The flumes will be used for differential gaging to identify loss in flow between gage locations. Loss in flow indicates seepage or infiltration that may reach the watertable as recharge. Additionally, precipitation event based measurements will be made in drainages to quantify the runoff in the area. Discrete discharge measurements at spring locations will be completed on a bi-annual basis.

Precipitation

Precipitation is currently collected at two weather stations located on the western side of the VC highlands (fig. 1). Due to potential rain shadow effects and precipitation gradient with altitude and possible limitations associated with measurement of snow precipitation, additional precipitation measurements sites will be expanded to the central and eastern side of the study area at two to four locations. Precipitation will be measured at varying elevations using bulk precipitation gages. The gages will be located at volunteer residences for the duration of the project. Weather station and bulk precipitation gage data will be used to estimate the total annual precipitation in the VC Highlands for each of the years of the study.

QUALITY ASSURANCE

All field data collected as part of this project will be managed according to USGS Nevada Water Science Center Data Management plan (USGS, 2010). Water level data will be collected and processed in accordance with Nevada Water Science Center (NVWSC) and USGS quality assurance/quality control protocols, plans, and policies. Aquifer-test analysis will receive colleague review and approval by the NVWSC groundwater specialist prior to being submitted for bureau approval. Aquifer tests analysis reporting will be done according to USGS Office of Groundwater technical memo 2009.01 (https://water.usgs.gov/admin/memo/GW/gw09.01.html). The Scientific Investigation Report will be peer-reviewed and will follow USGS fundamental science practices. The project will undergo a minimum of annual review by Nevada Water Science Center management and technical specialists. Additionally, the USGS will provide

quarterly progress reports to Storey County and will provide a project update at least once annually to stakeholders through public meetings.

DATA MANAGEMENT PLAN

Explicit data management and quality assurance activities are described throughout this proposal. In accordance with the NVWSC data management plan (USGS, 2010) and USGS fundamental science practices, all data associated with the project will be stored in appropriate, publically accessible, USGS databases and clearinghouses, including the USGS NWIS database. Reviewed and approved data and relevant GIS datasets and metadata not released through USGS NWIS will be made available online through ScienceBase or other appropriate USGS geospatial data clearinghouses.

PRODUCTS

The project will produce quality-assured/quality-controlled data available through the USGS NWIS database and/or as data releases through ScienceBase. The data will be accessible to the cooperating agencies and the public on the USGS Water Data for the Nation website (USGS, 1998 and 2012). Approved aquifer tests will be published on the NVWSC Aquifer Test website https://nevada.usgs.gov/water/AquiferTests/. A Scientific Investigations Report (SIR) will be made available to the public through the USGS Publication Warehouse (https://pubs.er.usgs.gov/).

PROJECT SCHEDULE

The 5 year study is planned to start in July, 2017 and be completed by the end of June, 2022. Quarterly progress reports will be sent to Storey County and annual stakeholder presentations will be given in the VC Highlands community. Table 1 below provides a general timeline for the major tasks of the study.

ORDINANCE NO. 17- 275

Summary

Ordinance 17-275 is being proposed to address medical and recreational marijuana zoning issues in Storey County by clarifying that medicinal and recreational marijuana are included within the scope of the marijuana uses prohibited by Storey County Code section 17.12.100(B), by expanding the scope of the marijuana establishment and medical marijuana establishment uses prohibited in all zoning districts and to conform the County's regulation of marijuana paraphernalia with the requirements of the Taxation and Regulation of Marijuana Act.

<u>Title</u>

An ordinance amending zoning provisions in Storey County Code Title 17 to clarify that the prohibition on the use of property for the sale, cultivation, dispensing or display of marijuana includes medical and recreational marijuana, expanding that prohibition to include prohibitions on medicinal marijuana establishment uses, and recreational marijuana establishment uses, removing the prohibition on the sale <u>er-display</u> of marijuana paraphernalia to persons over the age of 21 years or use of marijuana by persons over the age 21 years and providing for other matters properly related thereto.

WHEREAS, Storey County Code §17.12.100(B) prohibits the use of property within all zones for the purpose of the sale, display, dispensing or cultivation of marijuana; and,

WHEREAS, Storey County has denied an application for a business license for a medicinal marijuana dispensary on the ground that it is not an allowed use under SCC §17.12.100(B); and,

WHEREAS, this denial has resulted in two lawsuits being brought against Storey County on the grounds that sale, display or use of medicinal marijuana is not prohibited by SCC 17.12.100(B); and,

WHEREAS, on November 8, 2016, the voters of the State of Nevada passed Nevada's Initiative to Regulate and Tax Marijuana, (Question 2) to be cited as the Regulation and Taxation of Marijuana Act (Act) and codified in NRS Chapter 453D, thereby allowing the sale, transport, display, process, cultivate, possess and use of recreational marijuana under limited circumstances; and

WHEREAS, disputes may arise as to whether SCC §17.12.100(B) applies to the sale, display or use of recreational marijuana; and

WHEREAS, Storey County desires to clarify that the Storey County Code applies to all types of marijuana regardless of whether it is characterized as medicinal, recreational or any other type of marijuana; and,

WHEREAS, NRS 453D.100(2)(D) allows a locality to adopt and enforce local marijuana control measures pertaining to the zoning and land use for marijuana establishments; and,

WHEREAS, NRS 453D.210(5)(e) provides that the Department of Taxation shall approve a license for a marijuana establishment unless the locality in which the proposed marijuana establishment will be located affirms that the proposed marijuana establishment will be in violation of zoning or land use rules adopted by the locality; and,

WHEREAS, NRS 453A.350 requires that all medical marijuana establishments comply with all local ordinances and rules pertaining to zoning, land use and signage; and,

WHEREAS, Storey County desires to further expand its prohibition on the use of land within all its zoning districts to include all types of marijuana establishments and medical marijuana establishments; and,

WHEREAS, marijuana and medical marijuana are federally prohibited; and,

WHEREAS, the Act provides that notwithstanding any other provision of Nevada law and law of any political subdivision of Nevada, it is not unlawful and shall not be an offense or be a basis for seizure or forfeiture of assets for persons 21 years of age or older to manufacture, possess, use, transport, or purchase marijuana paraphernalia, or to distribute or sell marijuana paraphernalia to a person who is 21 years of age or older; and,

WHEREAS, Storey County desires to conform its ordinances with the requirements of the Act uses of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia;

Now therefore the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Storey, State of Nevada does ordain:

SECTION 1

Section 17.10.030 is hereby amended by adding the following definitions:

"Marijuana" means all parts of any plant of the genus Cannabis, whether growing or not, the seeds thereof, the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and every

<u>compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or resin. "Marijuana" does not include:</u>

(a) The mature stems of the plant, fiber produced from the stems, oil, or cake made from the seeds of the plant, any other compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the mature stems (except the resin extracted therefrom), fiber, oil, or cake, the sterilized seed of the plant which is incapable of germination; or

(b) The weight of any other ingredient combined with marijuana to prepare topical or oral administrations, food, drink, or other products.

"Marijuana establishment": means: (1) a marijuana cultivation facility, (2) a marijuana testing facility, (3) a marijuana product manufacturing facility, (4) a marijuana distributor, (5) a retail marijuana store, and (6) a facility or organization from which a person may obtain marijuana and marijuana related products. The facility or establishments identified in subparts 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 above are further defined in NRS 453D.030, the Regulation and Taxation of Marijuana Act, which definitions are hereby incorporated.

"Marijuana paraphernalia" means any equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are used, intended for use, or designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repacking, storing, or containing marijuana, or for ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing marijuana into the human body.

"Medical marijuana establishment" means: (1) an independent testing laboratory to test marijuana or marijuana products, (2) a cultivation facility for marijuana, (3) a facility for the production of edible marijuana products or marijuana-infused products, (4) a medical marijuana dispensary, (5) a facility or organization otherwise from which a person may obtain medical marijuana and medical marijuana related products, or (6) a business or organization conducting any combination of the above. The facilities or establishments identified in subparts 1, 2, 3 and 4, above are further defined in NRS Chapter 453A which definitions are incorporated herein.

SECTION 2

Section 17.12.100 is hereby amended as follows:

17.12.100 General provisions for all zones.

This section applies to all zones unless otherwise stated:

A. Noise, smoke, odor, gases, weeds, or other noxious nuisances must be controlled so as not to become objectionable, or adversely affect the properties in the vicinity, and must not be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare.

B. Marijuana

- 1. Uses involving the sale, display, dispensing, <u>or</u> cultivation, <u>er use</u> of marijuana, <u>regardless of whether the marijuana is for medicinal, recreational or any other purpose</u> or illegal drugs or paraphernalia commonly used or associated with the use of marijuana or any illegal drug, such as glass pipes, water pipes, reach clips, bongs, etc., <u>is</u> prohibited <u>and also is recognized by this ordinance as prohibited by federal regulation.</u> Accessory items related to the use and sale of legal tobacco products such as rolling papers, rolling machines, tobacco pipes and pipe maintenance items are not considered "drug paraphernalia" unless they are associated with the above prohibited items.
- 2. The sale or display of items intended for use as marijuana paraphernalia to persons under the age of 21 years is also a prohibited use.
- 3. Medical marijuana establishment, as defined in SCC §17.10.030 and by Nevada Revised Statute Chapter 453A Medical Use of Marijuana, is a prohibited use. Medical marijuana establishment uses are unlawful and are prohibited as an allowed use, special use, accessory use, or temporary use within all zoning districts
- 4. Marijuana establishment, as defined in SCC §17.10.030 and by NRS Chapter 453D, the Regulation and Taxation of Marijuana Act, including any subsequent amendments or regulations is a prohibited use. Marijuana establishment uses are unlawful and are prohibited as an allowed use, special use, accessory use or temporary use within all zoning districts.




Figure 12.9: The diagram shows where merchandise and other items may and may not be displayed. The diagram does not apply to signs and advertising devices which are regulated pursuant to Chapter 17.84, Signs and Billboards.

- C. Where a commercial business is allowed, a special use permit is required for the display, sale, barter, or trade of items associated with a business outside of a permanent building, except for permitted temporary uses and farmers markets. A business may not display items for sale or conduct any business on the public right-of-way (see Figure 12.9) or between the public traveled way and building. Recessed door openings and thresholds may be used to display items for sale or trade and conduct business.

- D. Incidental hotel uses. Any hotel may contain business uses that are customarily conducted in conjunction with and incidental to the hotel. Unless the business uses are otherwise permitted in the use district in which the hotel is situated, every public entrance to the business must be from a lobby, a hallway, or other interior portion of the hotel. No sign or other advertising material of the incidental hotel use may be placed outside of the hotel, except for as allowed by Chapter 17.84, Signs and Billboards.
- E. Outdoor lighting, including for private and public uses, must comply the regulations of Chapter 8.02, Outdoor Lighting.
- F. Access ways are defined by Section <u>17.12.090</u>. The access way for commercial building fronts abutting the public right-of-way are the door openings or the thresholds located at the building front.
- G. A special use permit is required for all natural resources river and waterway restoration, wetland creation, and water restoration and recycling.
- H. Up to four dogs and two pot-belly pigs more than twelve weeks of age are allowed in any zone. A special use permit is required to exceed this number. A minimum of ten acres is required to obtain a special use permit for this use. This restriction does not

apply to the A agriculture zone. (Ord. No. 15-269, § I, 10-20-2015; Ord. No. 12-244, § I, 12-4-2012)

Cooperative Agreement Between Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District and Storey County Fire District

In accordance with NRS 277.045, this Cooperative Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into between the Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District on behalf of itself (TMFPD), and Storey County Fire District (SCFD), both of which are fire districts formed under NRS Chapter 474. At times herein the parties may be referred to as "agency" or "agencies." This Agreement is effective upon approval and execution by all agencies.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, each of the above-named entities maintains and operates fire/rescue organizations within their respective jurisdictions; and,

WHEREAS, on occasion each agency experiences fires or other emergencies of such a magnitude or simultaneous number that assistance of other fire response organizations would be beneficial in addressing the emergencies; and,

WHEREAS, it is deemed in the best interests of the public and citizens of the affected jurisdictions that TMFPD and SCFD provide both automatic aid and mutual aid to the other as set forth herein; and,

WHEREAS, the agencies hereto desire to enter into this cooperative agreement pursuant to NRS 277.045 to provide for the circumstances and procedures under which each agency will provide assistance, both Mutual Aid and Automatic Aid, in responding to fire and other emergencies when requested by the other party; and,

NOW THEREFORE, based upon the foregoing recitals which are incorporated by this reference, the agencies mutually agree to provide fire suppression equipment, facilities and personnel to each one other under the following terms and conditions:

1. **Definitions** - The following definitions shall have the meaning ascribed to them:

- a. Agency Representative This person serves as the point of contact for the responding or requesting agency and has been delegated authority to make decisions on matters affecting that agency's participation at the incident.
- b. Annual Operating Plan The parties will meet annually, to prepare an annual operating plan (AOP). This AOP will include current rates for use of the Department's equipment and personnel, list of principal personnel, and any other items identified in this agreement.
- c. Assistance by Hire Assistance by hire is the provision to provide fire suppression or support resources to the other party on a reimbursement basis. All reimbursement shall be based upon rates established in the AOP.
- d. Automatic Aid Automatic aid means both parties are automatically dispatched, without a specific request, to an incident occurring in a designated area.

- e. Mutual Aid Mutual aid may be provided in the event of a specific request for assistance as set forth below.
- f. Requesting Agency The agency which experiences an incident in which assistance, whether mutual aid or automatic aid, is sought shall be known herein as the Requesting Agency.
- g. Responding Agency The agency providing assistance, whether through mutual aid or automatic aid, shall be known herein as the Responding Agency.
- 2. Request for Mutual Aid. When it is believed that mutual aid is necessary, a request for assistance shall be made by the most expedient manner possible. Both agencies shall provide a telephone number or telephone numbers to the other agency which should be used when requesting assistance from the Responding Agency. It is mutually agreed that either party may operate on the other parties' radio frequency.
- 3. Mutual Aid Resource Determination. The Battalion Chief for the Responding Agency shall determine whether it has sufficient resources available to provide mutual aid and respond to the request for assistance. If the Responding Agency has resources available to respond to the request for assistance, the Responding Agency will furnish the Requesting Agency fire fighting equipment, personnel and facilities. Neither agency is obligated to reduce the level of resources available in the responding jurisdiction below that deemed reasonably necessary to provide the residents of the Responding Agency's jurisdiction with fire suppression services.
- 4. Automatic Aid. The parameters of Automatic Aid and the attendant response areas are set forth in AOP. The AOP may be modified by mutual agreement of the Fire Chiefs for the parties provided that the revisions are signed by the Fire Chiefs or duly authorized designee and provided to the respective County Clerks before they are effective.
- 5. Communications. In both mutual and automatic aid situations, the operating frequency will be designated by the Requesting Agency's dispatch center. It will be identified at the same time the request for assistance is made by the Requesting Party. All communications will be to the requesting dispatch center on the designated frequency.
- 6. Incident Management. Any mutual or automatic aid extended under this Agreement is done with the express understanding that personnel of the Requesting Agency shall remain in charge at the incident for which aid is requested unless the command of an incident has been transferred to another agency or to an incident management team. Pursuant to this authority, the Requesting Agency, the agency which has command or the incident management team, may direct and supervise the personnel and equipment provided by the Responding Agency through the operation of this Agreement.
- 7. Mutual/Automatic Aid. Mutual Aid and Automatic Aid shall be provided without expectation of reimbursement for the first (24) twenty-four hours from the time of response. All mutual or automatic aid provided beyond (24) twenty- four hours will be considered assistance by hire.

If reimbursement is available as a result of a declaration of disaster, grant, and/or cost recovery, reimbursement for personnel, apparatus and support equipment shall cover the entire time of commitment, beginning from the time of initial dispatch from the Responding Party's home base, to the time of return to the home base. Events that are cost recoverable and/or payable through State or Federal Funding, or from third parties determined responsible shall be reimbursable. All reimbursement shall be based upon rates established in the AOP.

- 8. Assistance by Hire. Assistance by Hire is the provision of fire suppression resources, by one Agency to another, on a reimbursement basis. Except for mutual and automatic aid, all requests for fire suppression assistance shall be assistance by hire. Any resources provided by a Responding Agency, and not specifically ordered by the Requesting Agency, shall be considered a voluntary contribution. Agencies to this agreement will provide current Assistance by Hire rate schedules and updates when rates change. The rates will be posted and updated in the AOP.
- 9. Incident Management Teams. Salary, benefits, overtime, and transportation for department personnel assigned to an Incident Management Team that is utilized by the Requesting Agency to manage their incident, through delegation of authority, will be considered assistance by hire.
- 10. Equipment. The Responding Agency is responsible for the operation, service and maintenance of their equipment during incident operations on the jurisdiction of the Requesting Agency. The Requesting Agency shall be responsible to pay or reimburse for damages in excess of normal wear and tear, and shall replace or reimburse items lost, damaged or destroyed, except for damage that occurred as a result of negligence by the Responding Agency. Replacement or reimbursement to the Responding Agency by the Requesting Agency will occur within 90 days of receipt of an invoice documenting such equipment.
- 11. Incident Report. Upon request, the Responding Agency to a mutual aid incident shall provide the Requesting Agency with an incident report within (20) twenty working days following completion of the incident.
- 12. Worker's Compensation. For the limited purpose of the exclusive remedy set forth in NRS 616A020, both parties shall be deemed to employ jointly a person who is an employee of either party and sustains an injury by accident or occupational disease while participating in the matter for which assistance was requested. However, for the purpose of providing insurance benefits pursuant to NRS 616A through NRS 616D and NRS 617 each party shall provide such benefits to its own employees at its own expense. The parties waive any indemnification provision with respect to such industrial injuries or occupational diseases.
- 13. Independent Agencies. The parties are associated with each other only for the purposes and to the extent set forth in this Agreement, and in respect to performance of services pursuant to this Agreement, each party is and shall be a public agency separate and distinct from the other party and, subject only to the terms of this Agreement, shall have

the sole right to supervise, manage, operate, control, and direct performance of the incident under this Agreement. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed to create a partnership or joint venture, to create relationships of an employer-employee or principal-agent, or to otherwise create any liability for one agency whatsoever with respect to the indebtedness, liabilities, and obligations of the other agency or any other party.

- 14. Hold Harmless. The parties will not waive and intend to assert available remedies and liability limitations set forth in Chapter 41 of the Nevada Revised Statutes. Contractual liability of both parties shall not be subject to punitive damages. To the fullest extent of Chapter 41 of the Nevada Revised Statutes, each party shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend, not excluding the other's right to participate, the other party from and against all liability, claims, actions, damages, losses, and expenses, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees and costs arising out of any alleged negligent or willful acts or omissions of the indemnifying party, its officers, employees and agents. The indemnifying party shall not be liable to hold harmless any attorney's fees and costs for the indemnified party's chosen right to participate with legal counsel.
- 15. Third Party Beneficiaries. This Agreement is not intended to create or be construed to create any right or action on the part of any person or entity not signatory to this Agreement, nor create the status of third party beneficiaries for any person or entity.
- 16. Integration and Modification. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties and such are intended as a complete and exclusive statement of the promises, representations, negotiations, discussions, and other agreements that may have been made in connection with the subject matter hereof. Unless otherwise expressly authorized by the terms of this Agreement, no modification or amendment to this Agreement shall be binding upon the parties unless the same is in writing and signed by the respective parties hereto.
- 17. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is held to be illegal, invalid, or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the parties shall, if possible, agree on a legal, valid, and enforceable substitute provision that is as similar in effect to the deleted provision as possible. The remaining portion of the Agreement not declared illegal, invalid, or unenforceable shall, in any event, remain valid and effective for the term remaining unless the provision found illegal, invalid, or unenforceable goes to the essence of this Agreement
- **18. Assignment.** Neither party shall assign, transfer or delegate any rights, obligations or duties under this Agreement without the proper written consent of the other party.
- 19. Public Records. Pursuant to NRS 239.010, information or documents may be open to public inspection and copying. The parties will have the duty to disclose unless a particular record is made confidential by law or a common law balancing of interests.
- 20. Proper Authority. The parties hereto represent and warrant that the person executing this Agreement on behalf of each party has full power and authority to enter into this

Agreement and that the parties are authorized by law to engage in the cooperative action set forth in this Agreement.

- 21. Governing law; Jurisdiction. This Agreement is entered into in the State of Nevada and the rights and obligations of the parties hereto shall be governed by, and construed according to, the laws of the State of Nevada.
- 22. Ratification. This agreement shall become effective upon ratification by appropriate legal action by the governing bodies of the parties as a condition precedent to its entry into force and shall remain in full force and effect for five years from the last signature placed hereon, unless revoked by either party without cause, provided that a revocation shall not be effective until 90 days after a party has served written notice of revocation to the other party.
- 23. Amendment. The parties may amend this agreement at any time by an endorsement made in writing and approved by the Storey County Fire District fire board and the fire board of both the Truckee Meadows
- **24. Termination.** The Agreement may be terminated by mutual consent of both parties or unilaterally by either party without cause upon 90 days written notice. The parties expressly agree that this Agreement shall be terminated immediately if for any reason any party's funding ability supporting this Agreement is withdrawn, limited, or impaired.
- 25. Notices. All notices or other communications required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given when delivered personally by hand, or by telephonic facsimile with simultaneous delivery by regular mail, or mailed certified mail, return receipt requested, postage repaid on the date posted, and addressed to the other party at the following addresses:

- -When an incident does not provide subsistence for assistance-by-hire personnel per diem at the federally established regional or CONUS rate shall apply in accordance with GSA per diem rates at www.gsa.gov Documentation in the form of receipts must be provided for reimbursement.

2017 OPERATING PLAN for COOPERATIVE FIRE PROTECTION AGREEMENT between the

STOREY COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

and USDA, FOREST SERVICE HUMBOLDT-TOIYABE NATIONAL FOREST

and USDI, BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT CARSON CITY DISTRICT

This Operating Plan (OP) is entered into by and between Storey County Fire Protection District hereinafter referred to as the District; United States Department of Agriculture, Forest Service (USFS), Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest, hereinafter referred to as the Forest Service; and the USDI, Bureau of Land Management, Carson City District, hereinafter referred to as the BLM. Forest Service and BLM jointly will be referred to as the Federal Agencies. Collectively, all will be referred to as Parties. This OP becomes attached to and made part of the cooperative fire protection agreements listed above.

The Parties agree to the following:

A. PURPOSE:

The purpose of this OP is to define operating procedures and responsibilities within the framework of the above referenced Cooperative Fire Protection Agreement.

B. GENERAL PROVISIONS:

The District is primarily responsible for all hazard response, prevention, structure suppression and wildland fire suppression occurring to property within their jurisdictional boundaries. These structures and lands protected by the District are intermingled or adjacent to lands protected by the Federal Agencies.

Local fire District personnel responding to incidents on BLM lands must:

- be 18 years of age or older;
- have and use the required personal protective equipment (PPE) found in the *Interagency Standards for Fire and Fire Aviation Operations* ("Red Book" Ch. 7) or equivalent; and

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 have a basic level of wildland fire training. The National Wildfire Coordinating Group (NWCG) course S-190 and S-130 are recommended, both courses can be modified to fit local needs.

The Federal Agencies have the responsibility for prevention, protection and suppression, including direct and indirect perimeter control, of wildland fires on federally administered lands, and on adjacent or intermingled State and private forested/range lands as identified through written agreement in the Cooperative Fire Protection Agreement between signatory agencies dated 2016. The Federal Agencies will not assume responsibility for structure fire suppression and/or protection that is the legal jurisdictional of another entity (State, County, Local, Tribal or property holder). The Federal Agencies are not responsible for fighting structure fires. However, the Federal Agencies may assist in providing structure protection, but not structure suppression. Such activities will be limited to the exterior of structures, and only when such actions can be accomplished safely and in accordance with established wildland fire operations standards.

The mission and intent of this agreement is to provide for cooperation by the Parties in the wildland fire management (prevention, detection and suppression of wildland fires) and in all-hazard emergency events, conduct support function activities as requested by other Parties, to the extent the provision of such support is properly authorized.

- 1. The mutual aid period for the purposes of this OP shall be up to 24 hours unless specified otherwise (i.e., cost share agreement).
- 2. All assistance beyond the 24 hours shall be assistance-by-hire and will be billed retroactively for the full period from the time of initial dispatch.
- 3. For the purpose of this OP, fire engines (all types), water tenders (all types) and initial attack overhead are understood by the Parties to be mutual aid resources. All other resources, personnel and equipment are assistance by hire including personnel assigned to recognized incident management teams. Aircraft and hand crews and their associated support costs are considered assistance by hire.
- 4. On multi-jurisdictional incidents a cost share agreement shall be developed, documented and signed. Incidents within the mutual aid period not utilizing assistance by hire resources do not require a cost share. See Exhibit G for cost share agreement template.
- 5. No Party to this agreement will be required to deplete its own fire protection resources, services and facilities to the detriment of its fire protection responsibilities.
- 6. Participation of District resources is encouraged on local, geographic and national incident management teams, as well as single resource assignments. Payments of personnel will be in accordance with Exhibit E rates.

All resources provided by District for suppression activities on the federal jurisdiction fires during the "off season" will be considered assistance-by-hire. This period is October 15 to May 15 each year.

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For any "off season" federal fires to be considered for assistance-by-hire reimbursement, the District must:

- Contact the Sierra Front Interagency Dispatch Center immediately, and provide a verbal size-up of the incident upon arrival of the initial attack Incident Commander (IC).
- Furnish the Protecting Party a written incident report within ten (10) days. A sample fire report is included as Exhibit F.
- Ordering of resources beyond the initial response will be coordinated with the federal duty officer.

All billings for fire assistance during this period of time will be billed directly to the appropriate federal agency.

C. AGENCY CROSS NOTIFICATION OF FIRES:

Fires will be reported as follows:

Fires occurring on or threatening lands inside the boundaries of the District will be reported immediately to agency of jurisdiction dispatch center.

Fires occurring on or threatening lands of federal ownership will be reported immediately to the Sierra Front Interagency Dispatch Center (SFIDC).

Initial size up report will be provided to the appropriate dispatch center as soon as possible.

The initial fire report shall include, if available, the following information:

- 1. Fire Name
- 2. IC's Name
- 3. Location (lat & long and general or common name location)
- 4. Present size (in acres)
- 5. Spread Potential
- 6. Resources needed, increase or decrease response

D. ANNUAL COORDINATION MEETING:

A coordination meeting between the District and the Federal Agencies will be held as needed annually by April 1st. This meeting will review the past year of cooperative assistance and revise the OP, as needed. All exhibits will be reviewed, updated as needed, and attached to the OP as part of the annual review. Parties to this agreement will communicate preseason to identify critical resources areas (i.e., critical wildlife habitat, etc.).

Maps which identify each of the Parties' jurisdictional boundaries will be exchanged and updated annually and provided during the coordination meeting. This is critical in establishing an understanding of responsibilities, unprotected areas, overlap areas, and mutual aid areas.

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Exhibits A and B identify each of the Parties' jurisdictional boundaries and shall become part of this OP. It is preferred that maps be produced in a GIS format.

E. COMMUNICATIONS/FREQUENCIES:

Each Party to this agreement agrees to maintain up-to-date list of telephone numbers for each principal emergency contacts.

Each agency that is signatory to this Operating Plan is permitted to use each other's frequencies during the emergency activities or training to contact resources of the cooperators in conjunction with the communications plan for the incident. The communications plan may be a formal document, as in the case of an incident command team deployment or it may be an informal verbal agreement made on the ground by the Incident Commander(s) and/or Agency Representative. Use of frequencies is permitted in "narrowband" and VHF mode only. Federal Communications Commission procedures will be followed when operating radio(s) on any Party's frequency.

When multi-agency or a rapidly expanding incident occurs, the use of VFIRE frequencies for the tactical channel is mandatory to ensure common communications on the fire ground. Weather warnings, emergency broadcasts, tactical changes etc. will be transmitted over the command frequency to all units on the scene.

Pre-identified incident communication protocols will be established and followed (e.g., frequencies plans, points of contacts, and interoperable radio hardware).

See Exhibit D for a current list of frequencies and repeater locations.

F. OPERATIONS:

Rapid dispatching of personnel and equipment to fires is primary to both Parties. It is critical that dispatch organizations have clear direction and understanding of procedures. It is equally important that initial attack resources understand their roles and responsibilities, and those of the other agencies. It is highly recommended that all Parties to this document attend annual Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) or similar reviews. Personnel shall be familiar with the following:

1. When one Party requests assistance for purposes other than mutual aid or initial attack from the other, reimbursement may be provided. Standards for qualifications, training, and physical fitness as set in the National Wildfire Coordinating Group (NWCG) PMS 310-1 "Wildland Fire Qualification System Guide" or National Incident Management System (NIMS) Certification Standards are required. At the time of the request, the Supporting Party will identify the person in charge of responding resources.

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- a. During initial action, all agencies (federal, state, local and tribal) accept each other's standards. Once jurisdiction is clearly established, then the standards of the agency(s) with jurisdiction prevail.
- b. Prior to the fire season, federal agencies should meet with their state, local and tribal agency partners and jointly review the qualification/certification standards and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) that will apply to the use of local, non-federal firefighters during initial attack on fires on lands under the jurisdiction of a federal agency. Each Party will advise the other of applicable cross training opportunities for personnel.
- 2. Personal Protective Equipment: All fire personnel assigned to fire line suppression duties on an uncontrolled wildfire incident will wear NWCG approved or equivalent appropriate PPE.
 - Additional PPE as identified by local conditions, material safety data sheet (MSDS) or Job Hazard Analysis/Risk Assessment (JHA/RA) (i.e. specialized leg protection/chaps during chain saw use) may be required.
- 3. Before fire suppression efforts begin all fire fighters will be briefed.
- 4. The Parties agree to operate under the concept defined in the National Incident Management System (NIMS) including the Incident Command System (ICS). Unified command should be used whenever multiple jurisdictions are involved, unless extraordinary circumstances dictate otherwise.
- 5. The Incident Commander (IC) or unified command shall establish a command structure communications plan and incident objectives, identify and make hazards known, and name the incident (if necessary). All resources on scene and arriving will have the incident name provided to them. The Incident Commander will be identified as "Incident Command or IC". The IC shall inform the servicing dispatch center with the incident name, and provide to dispatch their name and agency position title (i.e., Elko Battalion 35).
- The IC or designee will order and track all resources through a single point. Once unified command is established, the interagency dispatch center will become the single point of ordering.
- 7. It shall be the policy of all Parties to release a Supporting Party's personnel and equipment from emergency duties as soon as practical and mutually agreed upon between the IC and the Supporting Party.
- 8. Each Party will make available and familiarize their officers with the contents of this OP.

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- 9. Sierra Front Interagency Dispatch Center will coordinate the use of aircraft resources. The District may order air tanker, helicopter, or observation flights through the interagency dispatch center, but the operational phase will remain under the direction of the incident IC. The District will provide mission objectives, geographic coordination, and hazards in the area (power lines, houses, etc.). Any aircraft not ordered by the Parties to this agreement is limited to operations on private lands, and incident personnel will not have any operational control. It is imperative that District who has non-federal aircraft responding inform the interagency dispatch center. A review of aerial coordination procedures (e.g., frequencies, Fire Traffic Area (FTA)) will be part of the annual coordination meeting agenda. The Federal Agencies will not pay for aircraft that are not approved for federal use. All aviation resources and associated support ordered will be considered assistance-by-hire, and therefore always billable.
 - a. <u>Air Operations:</u> Wildland fire aviation includes a variety of aircraft and operations. Helicopters are used to drop water, transport crews, reconnaissance, infrared, and deliver resources to the fire line. Fixed-wing aircraft include smokejumper aircraft, air tactical platforms, Single Engine Airtankers (SEATs), large airtankers (LAT), and very large airtankers (VLAT). These aircraft play a critical role in supporting firefighters on the ground.
 - b. <u>Pilot and Aircraft Approval:</u> All pilots and aircraft involved with aviation suppression operations over Federal Lands will be approved and/or carded for their specific mission(s) by Office of Aircraft Services (OAS) or United States Forest Service (USFS).
 - c. Boundary Issues: The requirement for increased management and coordination is due to the possibility of two or more agencies/cooperators conducting simultaneous, uncoordinated aviation operations within those areas which would unknowingly put the responding aerial resources within close proximity to one another, placing aircraft and crews at risk. Airspace boundary plans should be employed in areas where this occurs. Any agency conducting aerial operations within a "neutral air" corridor or zone (ten mile width) will immediately notify the adjoining agency/cooperator of such operations. This is accomplished to and from dispatch offices prior to the commencement of operations and when operations cease. Agency aircraft will establish contact on the assigned air-to-air frequency. Should contact not be made, the contact air-to-air frequency will be "Air Guard" 168.625 MHz (TX tone 110.9). Examples of aviation operations include fire reconnaissance, fire suppression missions, special aviation projects, resource management flights, helicopter logging, etc.
 - d. <u>Airspace De-confliction:</u> Airspace de-confliction is a term used to describe the process of reducing the risk of a near mid-air collision or TFR intrusion by sharing information regarding flight activity with Department of Defense military units, general aviation and other agency aviation programs. Airspace de-

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confliction will occur for both emergency and non-emergency aviation activities by contacting the local federal dispatch center.

- e. <u>Temporary Flight Restrictions (TFR):</u> In order to enhance safety during an incident or project, the FAA may be requested to issue a Notice to Airmen (NOTAM) to pilots; these could be either a Temporary Flight Restriction (TFR) or a NOTAM (L) or NOTAM (D).
- f. <u>Fire Traffic Area (FTA):</u> The Incident Commander or designee will monitor the assigned Air to Ground frequency assigned to the incident.
- g. At no less than twelve nautical miles from the incident, all aircraft will establish radio communication with the incident before entering the Fire Traffic Area. If positive radio communication is not established, aircraft must hold at seven nautical miles.
- 10. All Parties will coordinate fire restrictions or closures due to weather or fire severity where practical.
- 11. <u>General Cooperative Activities:</u> All protection units will, to the extent possible, provide fire prevention programs, inspections, and enforcement as necessary to adequately address fire issues in their Direct Protection Areas/jurisdiction. In addition, units are encouraged to undertake joint prevention activities in areas of mutual interest whenever practical.

12. Information and Education:

- a. Joint Press Releases: Parties should develop joint press releases on cooperative fire protection issues/incidents to ensure that the interests of all affected agencies are adequately addressed.
- b. Smokey Bear Program: Parties should cooperate in the coordinated delivery of Smokey Bear program in direct protection areas.
- c. Local Education Program: The use of interagency teams to conduct local educational programs is encouraged to facilitate improved public knowledge of the mission and responsibilities of all the cooperating agencies.
- d. Fire Prevention Signs: Coordination and placement of fire prevention signs should be used in order to prevent duplication of effort or sending mixed messages. This is especially important for fire danger rating signs.

13. Cause and Origin Investigations:

a. Each Party will be responsible for cause and origin investigations within the boundaries of their jurisdictional areas. If multiple jurisdictions are affected by the same wildland fire, the jurisdiction in which the suspected origin is located

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will serve as the lead for the investigation. Any Party may request assistance from Agencies outside the suspected origin jurisdiction.

- b. For multi-jurisdictional incidents the lead Agency must invite all Parties' appropriate fire investigation personnel to work jointly with the lead Agency to determine the fire cause and origin, whether the fire was human caused, and if human caused whether it was the result of negligence or intentionally set.
- c. Where the cooperating agency is federal, appropriate federal law enforcement and/or fire investigation personnel will assist the lead agency in making those assessments.
- d. For all fire trespass/arson matters, cooperating agencies will provide fire investigation reports, cost figures and cost documentation to the lead agency.
 - i. Costs include, but are not limited to, fire suppression, natural resource damages, emergency stabilization, and rehabilitation.
 - ii. Cooperating agencies will provide an estimate of these costs to the lead agency within 60 days of the fire being declared out.
- 14. When one Party to this Agreement takes initial action on a fire in another Agency's jurisdiction, every effort will be made to protect the area containing the origin of the fire and protect evidence that may be pertinent to identifying the fire cause. Information generated from investigation of the origin of the fire and other information concerning incendiary fires, etc. will be shared with all Parties to increase probability of prosecution and/or cost recovery.
- 15. Wildland Urban Interface The operational roles of the Federal Agencies as partners in the wildland urban interface are wildland firefighting, cooperative prevention and education. Structural fire suppression is the responsibility of State, Local or Tribal governments.
- 16. Federal Agency firefighters who encounter structure, vehicle, or landfill fires during normal wildland suppression duties, or who are dispatched to such fires due to significant threat to adjacent agency protected lands/resources, will not engage in direct suppression action. Structure protection (not suppression) activities will be limited to exterior efforts, and only when such actions can be accomplished safely and in accordance with established wildland fire operations standards. For the current Great Basin Community and Structure Fire Protection Guidelines see Exhibit H.
- 17. Emergency Medical Responses Federal Agency personnel are not funded, trained or equipped to respond to medical emergencies. Under no circumstances will Federal Agency resources be dispatched for medical emergencies.

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G. SHARING FACILITIES:

<u>Administrative/Training:</u> Sharing of facilities for the purpose of training is beneficial for all agencies to this agreement; therefore there will be no charge for the use of Agencies' facilities for training.

<u>Incidents:</u> Agencies to this agreement agree that the use of facilities will be free for the first twenty-four hours (24) for incident support. After 24 hours facilities will be rented to the other agency. Facilities such as fire stations and work centers are not designed to support the large numbers of personnel involved in incidents. Bases and camps need to be established if the incident goes beyond initial attack and/or a large number of personnel is required by the incident.

H. PROTECTION ORGANIZATION & RATES:

See the Agency Rate Tables in Exhibit E.

I. COST SHARE:

Cost share agreements must be easily understood and correspond to agency cost accounting/tracking methods in order to facilitate the billing process. Jurisdictional agencies should implement a method to track costs that occur outside of the cost share period (e.g., assign resources new incident order numbers and establish new agency-specific accounting codes).

A cost share agreement will be developed on the basis of one or a combination of the following four criteria:

- 1. Initial Attack Agreement (mutual aid)
- 2. Acres Burned
- 3. You Order, You Pay (YOYP)
 - a. A unified ordering point is required and agencies agree to who will order which resources.
 - b. On-incident support costs may be split by the percentage of agency requested resources.
 - c. Off-incident support costs are paid for by the ordering unit.
- 4. Cost Apportionment

Fire cost tracking and accountability (i.e. air tanker and helicopter drop numbers and location) should be established and maintained early during initial attack.

An after-action fiscal review may be conducted at the request of any Party.

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<u>Cost Shared Items:</u> The following is a list of items that are typically cost shared in multijurisdiction incidents. This list is not all-inclusive. Costs associated with, and incurred by, incident generated resource orders are typically shared.

- Aircraft Costs Aircraft (fixed and rotor wing) and associated retardant and personnel costs.
- b. Equipment Costs Emergency equipment used to support the incident.
- c. Incident Cache Costs Cache costs may include refurbish, replacement, resupply, and labor costs.
- d. Incident Rehabilitation Costs Rehabilitation activities of assigned incident personnel to mitigate further damage to improvements and land occurring from direct suppression activity can be included in cost sharing, e.g., minor fence repair, dozer line, erosion control.
- e. Initial Attack Resource Costs Initial attack resource costs are included in determining the cost-share percentages and in deriving actual incident costs. In a cost-share incident, the provisions in the Cooperative Agreement associated with this OP for initial attack assistance at no cost do not apply.
- f. Off-Incident Support Sites Mobilization, demobilization, rest and recuperation sites, etc., usually serve multiple incidents and are typically not ordered for a specific incident. The incident cost share agreement usually will not address cost sharing of these sites. Incident agencies should establish separate cost share agreements for these items.
- g. On-Incident Support Costs Costs incurred for services supplied within the incident, e.g., shower units, catering units, commissary units, cache supplies and materials.
- h. Personnel Costs Costs of assigned incident personnel including the IMT, crews, casuals, etc.
- i. Transportation Costs Costs associated with movement of resources to and from an incident.
- j. Administrative Surcharge (Indirect Charge) The Parties to this agreement will not charge each other an Administrative Surcharge/Indirect Charge. Resources obtained via external agreements which include an administrative surcharge are allowable.

Non-Cost Shared Items: The following lists items that are typically not cost shared:

- a. Accountable Property Accountable and/or sensitive property, as defined by each agency, that is purchased by the agency and becomes property of that agency.
- b. Administrative Overhead Costs Costs of agency personnel, support, and services not directly assigned or ordered by an incident. These include normal operating expenses such as basic utility costs, buildings and facilities rent, administrative support, and personnel. These costs are usually agency-specific, unless addressed in master or cost share agreements.
- c. Claims Costs Responsibility for tort claims or extraordinary settlement costs will be addressed through a separate agreement between agencies.
- d. Move Up and Cover Costs Includes additional costs over and above base salary of "backfilling" agency personnel to meet agency-specific staffing requirements.

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e. Post-Incident Rehabilitation Costs - Costs incurred to rehabilitate burned lands, such as seeding, check dam construction, and archaeological mitigation.

Final Cost Determination: Costs will be determined by using agency financial records.

Transfer of Responsibility Procedures: When Incident Management Teams (IMTs) are rotated, the departing team must brief their counterparts on all cost sharing agreements and documentation to date, and provide copies of these documents. If there is a change in the Agency Administrators or representatives the departing Agency Administrators shall brief and provide copies of any existing cost sharing agreements and documentation to the incoming Agency Administrators to ensure the incoming Agency Administrators have a clear understanding of all the decisions and agreements used to develop the final cost share percentages and conditions that will be used to generate the final cost share agreement.

Wildland Fire Protection Program (WFFP). If the District is covered under a WFPP agreement with Nevada Division of Forestry (NDF) and the incident falls under that agreement, NDF will be a signatory Party on the cost share. The District is required to notify NDF Duty Officer of any wildland fire within their jurisdiction that may require a cost share agreement. NDF will assume an active role in the development of cost share agreements.

J. COMPENSATION FOR SERVICES:

This portion of the OP establishes standard payment rates and billing procedures for equipment and personnel used for the purpose of this agreement.

It is understood that no Party is entering this plan to make a profit from assisting the other, but rather, developing a method of recovering legitimate expenses. Every effort will be made by the Parties to minimize costs.

- 1. Within Mutual Aid Period: No billing will occur for expenses with the mutual aid period except for the resources identified as assistance-by-hire.
- 2. Resources working beyond Mutual Aid Period: The Supporting Agency will bill the Protecting Agency for actual costs incurred for assistance provided and identified as reimbursable. Resources exceeding the mutual aid period will be billed retroactively for the full period from the time of initial dispatch.
- 3. <u>Incident Billing Documentation</u>: Federal, State and Local cooperators should receive an OF-288, Emergency Firefighter Time Report for each resource assigned to the incident. Resources are to ensure that OF-288s are complete and accurate prior to demobilization from the incident. Incident agencies are not to submit OF-288s to the agency payment center on behalf of the federal (excluding Forest Service AD employees), State or Local cooperators. (Note: On smaller local incidents, an SF-261, Crew Time Report, signed by an incident supervisor will suffice in place of an OF-288.)

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OF-286, Emergency Equipment Use Invoice, shall not be completed by the incident agency for federal, state and local cooperator vehicles (including rental vehicles) nor should any type of equipment invoice be submitted to the Protecting Agency payment center on behalf of the federal, State or Local cooperators. Supporting Agencies will bill the Protecting Agency for vehicle use based on work time recorded on the OF-288 using the guidelines below.

It is recommended that District resources utilize Exhibit I when checking in with Finance personnel at an incident to avoid confusion regarding which forms are required to be completed for District resources.

Non-Billable Items: The following items are NOT considered billable by the Parties:

- a. Agency overhead personnel performing agency specific duties and not assigned to the incident
- b. Non-expendable accountable property
- c. Interest and indemnities payments
- d. Agency specific Burned Area Emergency Rehabilitation (BAER) beyond suppression damage rehab
- e. False Alarms with the exception of assistance by hire resources and their associated supporting costs
- f. Administrative Surcharge/Indirect Charges

<u>INDIRECT COST RATES - COOPERATIVE FIRE PROTECTION</u>. When indirect cost rates are applied to federal reimbursements, the Parties agree to the following:

- 1. If the payment recipient has never received or does not currently have a negotiated indirect cost rate, they are eligible for a de minimis indirect cost rate up to 10% of Modified Total Direct Costs (MTDC). MTDC is defined as all salaries and wages, fringe benefits, materials and supplies, services, travel, and contracts up to the first \$25,000 of each contract.
- 2. For rates greater than 10%, the payment recipient shall provide either an applicable negotiated indirect cost rate agreement (NICRA) from a cognizant Federal agency, or an indirect cost rate summary in a format that clearly defines the indirect cost rate and MTDC.
- 3. The payment recipient must maintain adequate documentation to support the methodology and computation of the indirect cost rate. Documentation must be made available to the Federal agency upon request.

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4. Failure to provide adequate documentation supporting the indirect cost rate could result in disallowed costs and repayment to the Federal agency.

Billable and Shareable: Associated Costs Not On Resources Orders – There are associated costs that both State, District and Federal Agencies incur in providing resources to an incident. Personnel, equipment, supplies or services provided by a supporting agency and essential to filling the resource order, which are necessary and reasonable, shall be considered as reimbursable as Assistance-by-Hire. While, on the surface, they are not ordered "by and for the incident," they are necessary to mobilize ordered resources or acquire services for the incident and are valid charges (i.e. mobilization of crews, equipment contractors, etc.). These associated costs that are a result of the incident are considered to be an added cost to the agency. These activities may not be "documented" on a resource order and will be billed using agency specific financial system reports. Examples include, but are not limited, to:

- a. Dispatchers
- b. Airbase Costs Includes salaries, travel expenses, retardant and supplies associated with the airbase in support of the incident.
- c. Warehouse/Cache Includes local and regional cache personnel and associated transportation costs when performing activities in support of the incident.
- d. Mobilization Centers Includes personnel performing activities within a mob center in support of the incident. These mobilization centers are established by agencies to support the incident.
- e. Travel Per Diem/Transportation Costs Includes mileage and lodging/meals and incidental expenses incurred while enroute to/from the incident or not provided at the incident. These expenses shall not exceed the published General Services Administration (GSA) allowable rates. Exception: Those instances where the GSA lodging rate (excluding room taxes) cannot be obtained shall be documented and copies of the documentation shall be provided with the billing invoice.
- f. Temporary Incident Payment Center Activity Includes personnel performing activities in support of the incident, which may include salaries, travel expenses, supplies and temporary facility rental.
- g. Agency Support Cost Covered Under Specific Labor Agreements Includes cost of lodging/per diem and related mileage to and from the incident.
- h. Personnel Backfill Backfill coverage for shift firefighters assigned to fire stations is billable to the incident. Reimbursement will not be provided for both the "backfill" resource and resources mobilized to an incident for the same time period (i.e., Only one type of resource may be billed per day either the backfill resource or the incident resource. Occasionally, more than one person may be required to fulfill an agency's backfill shift requirement. In those cases, no more than 24 hours per day will be billed for the backfill resources.).
- i. Invoice Preparation Includes actual charges by agency staff for the preparation of incident billing documents/packages.
- j. Correction Officers All time for State correction officers will be fully

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reimbursable. Base pay and overtime is reimbursable if there is no back fill. If the Department of Corrections back fills then only overtime for the correctional officer and backfill is reimbursable.

k. Compensated Days off at End of Incident - It is agreed that employees of the Parties to this Agreement shall at all times be subject only to the laws, regulations, and rules governing their employment, regardless of their employing agency, and shall not be entitled to compensation or other benefits of any kind other than that specifically provided by the terms of their employment.

4. Billing Submission:

On fires where costs are incurred pursuant to the terms of this agreement, the Supporting Agency shall submit a bill or estimate for reimbursement as soon as possible, but not later than 180 days after the fire is declared out. If final costs are not known at that time, an estimated amount will be provided to the Protecting Parties. Contested items will be resolved by the Parties signatory to this Operating Plan. If consensus cannot be reached, those items of concern will be elevated to the next higher level of management for resolution. Payment shall be made to the Supporting Party within 90 days after receipt of the billing invoice.

Billing deadlines set forth herein are intended to encourage prompt billing. Failure to meet these timeframes shall not be construed as a release or waiver of claims for reimbursement against the other Party.

Should additional costs be identified after a "final" billing has been issued, a supplemental bill may be issued if agreeable to applicable Parties.

Federal Agency Billings:

Submit bills to the District whenever the District is the protecting agency and billing is appropriate. If the District is covered under a WFPP agreement with Nevada Division of Forestry (NDF) and the incident falls under that agreement, billings will be submitted to NDF for payment.

- e. <u>State Fires (Out of State)</u>: Submit all billings for state fires outside the state of Nevada to the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest.
- 5. Billing Content: A separate bill will be submitted for each fire. Bills will be identified by fire name, location, jurisdictional unit, and appropriate order number, and will be supported by adequate documentation and broken down by categories if

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required by a cost share agreement. Billings for fire suppression assistance will not include administrative overhead or other costs not supported by a resource order or other supporting documentation. Documentation in support of the billing will include:

- a. Invoice, including:
 - i. Cooperator name, address, phone number, and agency financial contact.
 - ii. Agreement number.
 - iii. Incident name, incident number and financial accounting code.
 - iv. Dates of the incident covered by the billing.
- b. Summary cost data for the amount being billed. Use costs reports generated by the agency to support the billing whenever possible.
- c. Copies of resource orders and other supporting documentation (i.e., WildCAD). Receipts should be in the form of photocopies.
- d. Copies of applicable cost share agreements.
- e. Cost share split report (if applicable)
- 6. Payment Due Dates: All bills will have a payment due date 90 days after date of issuance.



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



Upon demobilization from an incident, personnel shall be provided an approved and signed Emergency Firefighter Time Report (OF-288). On smaller incidents, a Crew Time Report (SF-261), signed by the incident supervisor shall suffice. No equipment invoice should be provided at the incident. See Exhibit I. Exhibit I should be presented to the incident upon check in.

Vehicles and equipment obtained under the Federal Excess Property Program (FEPP) will only be reimbursed for maintenance and operating costs.

Portal to portal pay provisions will be acceptable when Department personnel have been designated entitlement to portal to portal pay by their home agency.

Equipment is not included in portal to portal pay provisions. Equipment paid on an hourly basis per the rate schedule will be reimbursed for actual hours of work performed by the operator. Mileage will be reimbursed per the rate schedule where applicable. Federal, State and local agency equipment rates listed in the rate schedule are considered "wet" and operating costs (such as fuel) should be factored into the rate schedule. Fuel, oil and other operating supplies provided at the incident are billable by the incident agency. Operating supplies for rental vehicles are reimbursable and may be billed to the incident agency.

COMMUNITY AND STRUCTURE FIRE PROTECTION

Guidelines for the Great Basin 2014

Background

Protection of structures and communities is a shared partnership between the home and landowners and their fire agencies. Structure and community protection is high risk and a large cost center for all fire agencies. Clarification on what, how and where we will accomplish our structure protection roles and responsibilities must be identified. There needs to be a common expectation among all agencies and the public on how structure protection will be handled within the Great Basin.

With the increased growth in the wildland urban interface, fire agencies do not have the capability to protect all structures. The goal is to support communities and structures that can survive the effects of a wildland fire without intervention.

All fire agencies have primary responsibility for fire suppression within their respective protection areas. A strong initial attack commensurate with risk is the primary objective on all wildfires managed for suppression objectives. Fire agencies have a responsibility to attempt to prevent a wildland fire from spreading into areas where there are structures, and to assist local fire agencies in protecting communities and structures from the advancing wildland fire.

Leaders Intent

Our first and foremost intent is to keep our firefighters and the public safe. Secondly, once that safety can be ensured, then we will aggressively work toward keeping the wildland fire away from structures and communities. Our strategies and tactics will be based on that intent. Protecting structures from fire will not be possible in every situation. Risk to firefighters, fire behavior and availability of resources will dictate the strategies that will be used.

When there is a need to engage in structure protection, we will ensure that we are taking safe, appropriate, and reasonable tactical actions for which we are trained and equipped. Those

actions will be cost effective. State and federal agencies will limit the use of tactics such as gelling, wrapping, and extensive hazardous fuels modification.

Unified Efforts

Fire agencies may have a shared responsibility for wildland fire and structure protection within the scope of their state laws, agreements and operating plans. Agency Administrators will discuss with their partners roles and responsibilities, what capabilities each party has, how the parties will interface with each other, and how responsibilities for costs will be addressed. Agency Administrators will provide leaders intent for structure fire protection. Incident management organizations will engage local government agencies (fire District/Departments, law enforcement, disaster services, etc.) in the planning of strategies and tactics for community and structure protection.

There are areas in the Great Basin where there is no local fire agency. Through established agreements and authorities, the wildland fire protection agencies may have the responsibility to protect structures from wildland fire. Landowners have the responsibility to determine whether there is a local fire agency that provides structure fire protection.

It is important for GBCG members to:

- Partner with communities, home and landowners to identify what actions can be taken
 to mitigate potential wildland urban interface losses, and identify financial and
 technical assistance opportunities.
- **Identify** how the parties will work together when the wildland fire impacts another's protection or jurisdictional responsibility.
- Establish agreements and/or local operating plans to identify roles and responsibilities prior to the wildland fire.

Capabilities

Wildland fire agencies have no capability or responsibility to do structure fire suppression. Some local fire agencies may have limited capability within their own areas of jurisdiction to respond to a wildland fire. It is important to understand what capability they do have and if they have options to reach out to others such as mutual aid, to enhance that capability.

Definitions

The following are defined:

Wildland Fire Protection: Protecting natural resources and municipal watersheds from damage from any fire that occurs in the wildland. State, tribal and federal forestry or land management and some local government agencies normally provide wildland fire protection.

Structure Protection: Protecting a structure from the threat of damage from an advancing wildland fire. This involves the use of standard wildland protection tactics, control methods, and equipment, including fire control lines and the extinguishment of spot fires near or on

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the structure. The protection can be provided by both the rural and/or local government fire District/Department and wildland fire protection agencies.

Structure Fire Suppression: Interior or exterior actions taken to suppress and extinguish a burning structure or improvement associated with standard fire protection equipment and training. This is the responsibility of local government entities; however there are areas where there is no structural fire agency in place.

This supersedes any prior Community and Structure Fire Protection guidelines developed by NRCG or GBCG.

NRS 354.624 Annual audit: Requirements; designation of auditor; scope and disposition; dissemination; prohibited provision in contract with auditor.

- 1. Each local government shall provide for an annual audit of all of its financial statements. A local government may provide for more frequent audits as it deems necessary. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, each annual audit must be concluded and the report of the audit submitted to the governing body as provided in subsection 6 not later than 5 months after the close of the fiscal year for which the audit is conducted. An extension of this time may be granted by the Department of Taxation to any local government that submits an application for an extension to the Department. If the local government fails to provide for an audit in accordance with the provisions of this section, the Department of Taxation shall cause the audit to be made at the expense of the local government. All audits must be conducted by a certified public accountant or by a partnership or professional corporation that is registered pursuant to chapter 628 of NRS.
 - 2. The annual audit of a school district must:
- (a) Be concluded and the report submitted to the board of trustees as provided in subsection 6 not later than 4 months after the close of the fiscal year for which the audit is conducted.
- (b) If the school district has more than 150,000 pupils enrolled, include an audit of the expenditure by the school district of public money used:
 - (1) To design, construct or purchase new buildings for schools or related facilities;
 - (2) To enlarge, remodel or renovate existing buildings for schools or related facilities; and
- (3) To acquire sites for building schools or related facilities, or other real property for purposes related to schools.
- 3. The governing body may, without requiring competitive bids, designate the auditor or firm annually. The auditor or firm must be designated, and notification of the auditor or firm designated must be sent to the Department of Taxation not later than 3 months before the close of the fiscal year for which the audit is to be made.
- 4. Each annual audit must cover the business of the local government during the full fiscal year. It must be a financial audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in the United States, including findings on compliance with statutes and regulations and an expression of opinion on the financial statements. The Department of Taxation shall prescribe the form of the financial statements, and the chart of accounts must be as nearly as possible the same as the chart that is used in the preparation and publication of the annual budget. The report of the audit must include:
- (a) A schedule of all fees imposed by the local government which were subject to the provisions of \underline{NRS} 354.5989:
- (b) A comparison of the operations of the local government with the approved budget, including a statement from the auditor that indicates whether the governing body has taken action on the audit report for the prior year;
- (c) If the local government is subject to the provisions of NRS 244.186, a report showing that the local government is in compliance with the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 244.186; and
- (d) If the local government is subject to the provisions of <u>NRS 710.140</u> or <u>710.145</u>, a report showing that the local government is in compliance with the provisions of those sections with regard to the facilities and property it maintains and the services it provides outside its territorial boundaries.
 - 5. Each local government shall provide to its auditor:
- (a) A statement indicating whether each of the following funds established by the local government is being used expressly for the purposes for which it was created, in the form required by NRS 354.6241:
 - (1) An enterprise fund.
 - (2) An internal service fund.
 - (3) A fiduciary fund.
 - (4) A self-insurance fund.
 - (5) A fund whose balance is required by law to be:
- (I) Used only for a specific purpose other than the payment of compensation to a bargaining unit, as defined in NRS 288.028; or
 - (II) Carried forward to the succeeding fiscal year in any designated amount.
- (b) A list and description of any property conveyed to a nonprofit organization pursuant to NRS 244.287 or 268.058.
- (c) If the local government is subject to the provisions of NRS 244.186, a declaration indicating that the local government is in compliance with the provisions of paragraph (c) of subsection 1 of NRS 244.186.
- (d) If the local government is subject to the provisions of NRS 710.140 or 710.145, a declaration indicating that the local government is in compliance with the provisions of those sections with regard to the facilities and property it maintains and the services it provides outside its territorial boundaries.

- 6. The opinion and findings of the auditor contained in the report of the audit must be presented at a meeting of the governing body held not more than 30 days after the report is submitted to it. Immediately thereafter, the entire report, together with the management letter required by generally accepted auditing standards in the United States or by regulations adopted pursuant to NRS 354.594, must be filed as a public record with:
 - (a) The clerk or secretary of the governing body;
 - (b) The county clerk;
 - (c) The Department of Taxation; and
 - (d) In the case of a school district, the Department of Education.
- 7. After the report of the audit is filed by the local government, the report of the audit, including, without limitation, the opinion and findings of the auditor contained in the report of the audit, may be disseminated by or on behalf of the local government for which the report was prepared by inclusion, without limitation, in or on:
- (a) An official statement or other document prepared in connection with the offering of bonds or other securities;
 - (b) A filing made pursuant to the laws or regulations of this State;
- (c) A filing made pursuant to a rule or regulation of the Securities and Exchange Commission of the United States; or
 - (d) A website maintained by a local government on the Internet or its successor,
- without the consent of the auditor who prepared the report of the audit. A provision of a contract entered into between an auditor and a local government that is contrary to the provisions of this subsection is against the public policy of this State and is void and unenforceable.
- 8. If an auditor finds evidence of fraud or dishonesty in the financial statements of a local government, the auditor shall report such evidence to the appropriate level of management in the local government.
- 9. The governing body shall act upon the recommendations of the report of the audit within 3 months after receipt of the report, unless prompter action is required concerning violations of law or regulation, by setting forth in its minutes its intention to adopt the recommendations, to adopt them with modifications or to reject them for reasons shown in the minutes.

The applicant requests a use variance allowing a previously permitted non-conforming use to remain in-place under its existing ownership conditions. The proposed use subject to the variance request is outdoor storage of inoperable motor vehicles and auctioning of those inoperable vehicles at portions of subject property located at 4086 Peru Drive, McCarran (Tahoe-Reno Industrial

Center), Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-071-16.

1. Background & Analysis

A. <u>Site Location and Characteristics</u>. The property is located at 4086 Peru Drive in the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center and is approximately 15 acres. The majority of the site has been graded to be relatively level. The property contains an office building, two equipment sheds and a paved parking area. Surrounding land uses include commercial warehouses/office buildings (Zulily, U.S. Ordinance) to the north, vacant private land to the east, technology warehouse (Switch) to the south and private vacant land and land owned by the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center to the west. This property and the surrounding property are zoned I-2, Heavy Industrial.

The subject property is located within the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center. Land located within this area is subject to the provisions in the 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance; the 2015 Storey County Zoning ordinance does not apply to this area.

B. Background. The use on the property began in March 2008. Originally, the use on the property was to be an auto auctions facility, a use that was permitted by Storey County without the need for a public hearing. In 2008, this property was a remote location and development of any properties in Northern Nevada was minimal due to the economy. Since 2008, the auto auction use has remained, but the storage of vehicles has intensified. Vehicles are being stored at the site longer in connection with delays associated with court proceedings or litigation where vehicles may be needed for evidence purpose or where delays are incurred in obtaining titles from applicable state agencies. As the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center has grown in more recent years, more surrounding properties have been developed and the impact of long-term vehicle storage has been identified by adjacent property owners.

Following up on the concerns of adjacent property owners, County staff reviewed the 2008 approval and identified that additional screening of the vehicle storage yard was originally required and hadn't been installed. The applicant has since added evergreen trees (large and small) along the fence line, along with slats in the chain-link fencing, to provide screening of the vehicle storage yard. This has reduced the view into the storage yard from public areas.







C. Proposed Use/Variance Request. In 2008, the applicant was permitted at the subject property to construct a facility for the outdoor storage of inoperable and wrecked motor vehicles. The vehicles are stored at the subject property pending auction, at which time bidders (usually salvage companies) purchase them and transport them from the premises. Most of the vehicles arriving to the subject property are sold within 90 days or less. Some of the vehicles, however, are involved in motor vehicle accidents for which criminal and insurance investigations remain in process. Those vehicles remain stored at the subject property for up to three years or until the investigations are completed. At that time, those vehicles are also sold at auction by the applicant and are removed from the premises.

Storage of inoperable vehicles is not listed as a permitted use in the I2 Heavy Industrial Zone which applies to the subject property. Auction Houses are included on the "List of Similar Use Types for I-2 Heavy Industrial Zone at Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center" and are permissible. Storage of Operable Vehicles is also listed as a permissible use; however, the majority of the vehicles at this site are not considered operable and this use definition does not apply. Inoperable vehicle storage is a listed use for I-2 zoning with an I-S Special Industrial Zone overlay, but the I-S overlay is not located at this particular property.

County planning staff, the applicant, and the Storey County District Attorney's Office collaborated to develop a viable plan in which to remedy the permitted non-conforming situation. Accordingly, the applicant was directed to submit a request for a use variance allowing the previously permitted non-conforming use to remain in-place under its existing ownership conditions and pursuant to stipulations set forth later in this staff report. In summary, those stipulations include the following general parameters:

- (1) The area of the existing inoperable vehicle storage on the site must not be enlarged from that condition existing at the time of the variance application;
- (2) Landscaping and screening that was required at the time of permitting, but which was not maintained by the applicant, must be replaced and otherwise remedied;
- (3) The proposed use variance must not be transferrable to successors, and it must only apply to the business at the subject property. Any change in ownership of the business and/or property must render the use allowed by the variance null, and the subject property and any business conducted thereon must be made conforming to the applicable county codes.

2. Compatibility and Compliance

A. <u>Compatibility with surrounding uses and zones</u>. The following table documents land uses, zoning classifications and master plan designations for the land at and surrounding the proposed project.

B. Variances. The 1999 Storey County Code 17.60 Variances states that a Variance to the provisions of its ordinance title may be granted by the Storey County Board of County Commissioners with action by the Storey County Planning Commission where by reason of exceptional narrowness, shallowness, or shape of a specific piece of property at the time of enactment of the regulations, or by reason of exceptional topographic conditions or other extraordinary and exceptional situation or condition of the lot or parcel, the strict application of the regulations enacted under this ordinance would result in peculiar and exceptional practical difficulties to, or exceptional and undue hardships upon the owner of property.

Section 17.60.010 goes on to state "Such relief from the strict application of the regulations of this ordinance, however, may only be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without substantially impairing the intent and purpose of any ordinance or resolution and under such conditions as the board may deem necessary to assure that the general purpose and intent of this ordinance will be observed, public safety and welfare secured and substantial justice done."

The use of the property as an auto auction facility and outdoor storage of inoperative vehicles began in 2008 with approval by Storey County. The large expanse of stored vehicles has been visible to adjacent properties and the public right-of-way in the past. With the improvements to the fencing and landscaping to provide screening of the vehicles from view, the use of the property is now screened significantly from the prior condition.

The use on the site has evolved since originally approved in 2008 by Storey County. The applicant states the long term storage of vehicles has to do with delays associated with court proceedings or litigation where vehicles may be needed for evidence purpose or where delays are incurred in obtaining titles from applicable state agencies, many of which are out of the applicant's control. Because permits were granted originally for the auto auction use on the property, and the substantial investment the applicant has made installed to fencing and landscaping to screen the use, staff is supportive of allowing for the variance to let the applicant continue the use as it stands at the time of this associated application. This variance prohibits the expansion of the operation and this variance requires the property be returned to an allowed use once the property changes ownership or the associated business license expires or becomes inactive. This

variance, as conditioned, will be applicable only to this business and non-transferrable to any future businesses at this site.

C. Storey County Zoning Code. The subject property is located within the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center pursuant to a development agreement between Storey County and the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center, LLC. Land located within this area is subject to the provisions in the 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance; the 2015 Storey County Zoning ordinance does not apply to this area. The existing development complies with the parcel size, setbacks, loading area and building heights identified in Chapter 17.37 of the 1999 Storey County Code for I-2 zoning.

Chapter 17.12.100 General Provisions states

- "(A). Noise, smoke, odor, gases, or other noxious nuisances shall be controlled so as not to become objectionable, or adversely affect the properties in the vicinity, and shall not be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare.
- (B) All open storage, including inoperative automobiles, shall be enclosed by a suitable structure or planning strip not less than six (6) feet high. Storage of lumber, cola, or other combustibles shall be located within the lot parcel not less than ten (10) feet from the boundaries of any lot line."

With the recent modifications to the fencing and landscaping, the property has demonstrated conformance with these requirements. The property is consistent with all other design requirements outline in Chapter 17.12.

D. Conformance with the 2016 Storey County Master Plan. The 2016 Storey County Master Plan describes McCarran as a "prime location in which further industrial development can be expected to occur" and as an area "highly suitable for high-intensity...industrial uses" (Chapter 3, p. 84). Section 3.5.7 Goal 2 of the master plan encourages the diversification of commercial and industrial uses in the area by attracting high-technology and commercial uses in addition to distribution and manufacturing. Chapter 7 states that Storey County strives to diversify and expand the local job base; recruit new businesses to industrial centers; maintain regulations that promote industrial uses in the county; continue to update standards for industrial growth in industrial centers; and promote development within the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center by facilitating efficient and straightforward permitting processes.

The auto auction use was existing at the time the 2016 Master Plan was developed. The proposed variance to the use will allow for the facility to have long term storage of inoperable vehicles. The proposed use does not appear to conflict with any elements or adjacent specific plans in the 2016 master plan.

3. Findings of Fact

A. <u>Motion for approval</u>. The following Findings of Fact are evident with regard to the requested Variance when the recommended conditions of approval in Section 4, Recommended Conditions of Approval, are applied.

- (1) This is a use variance for the purpose of allowing a previously permitted non-conforming use to remain under its existing ownership conditions. The subject use under this variance is outdoor storage of inoperable motor vehicles and auctioning of those inoperable vehicles at portions of property located at 4086 Peru Drive, McCarran (Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center), Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-071-16. The use variance with conditions set forth by its approval is the most appropriate manner in which to remedy a previous action while preserving certain rights and property interests of the applicant at the subject property.
- (2) The subject property is located within the 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance I-2 Heavy Industrial zoning. The existing auction house use was approved by Storey County in 2008. The auction house use has evolved to include storage of inoperative vehicles. The long term storage of vehicles has to do with delays associated with court proceedings or litigation where vehicles may be needed for evidence purpose or where delays are incurred in obtaining titles from applicable state agencies, many of which are out of the applicant's control.
- (3) That because of special circumstances applicable to the subject property, including shape, size, topography or location of surroundings, the strict application of the zoning ordinance would deprive the subject property of privileges enjoyed by other properties in the vicinity or under identical zone classification.
- (4) That the granting of the Variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of substantial property rights of the applicant.
- (5) That the granting of the Variance will not, under the circumstances of the particular case, adversely affect to a material degree the health or safety of persons residing or working in the area of the subject property and will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or materially injurious to property or improvements in the area of the subject property.
- (6) The proposed Variance is in compliance with all Federal, Nevada State, and Storey County regulations.
- (7) Under the special circumstances applicable to the subject matter, the use variance does not appear to conflict with the Storey County Master Plan for the area.
- (8) The applicant obtained permits in 2008 for the original auto auction use on the property. The existing use of the land is non-conforming with the regulatory zone for the subject property. The applicant has made a substantial investment in the property to install fencing and landscaping to screen the use from adjacent properties. This use variance serves to remedy the hardship that the applicant may endure with a revocation of the issued permits, and it serves to reduce adverse impacts on adjacent properties through implementation of

- screening, placement, current ownership limitation, and other considerations to the subject property and use.
- (9) This variance prohibits the expansion of the operation and this variance requires the property be returned to an allowed use once the property or associated business licenses changes ownership or the associated business license expires or becomes inactive.

4. Recommended Conditions of Approval

- A. <u>Purpose</u>. Variance No. 2017-008 is for the purpose of allowing a previously permitted non-conforming use to remain in-place under its existing ownership conditions. The subject use under this variance is outdoor storage of inoperable motor vehicles and auctioning of those inoperable vehicles at portions of property located at 4086 Peru Drive, McCarran (Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center), Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-071-16.
- B. <u>Compliance</u>. The Variance must comply with Storey County Codes, and submitted plans and reports, as approved.
- C. <u>Null and Void</u>. If the Variance is not exercised within 12 months of the date of approval, unless additional time is granted by the Board with action by the Planning Commission, based upon consideration of the specific circumstances of the project, then without further action, the Variance will be null and void and no non-conforming development activity may be made on the property except on the granting of a new Variance.
- D. Hold Harmless. The Applicant/Property Owners agree to hold Storey County, its Officers and Representatives harmless from the costs and responsibilities associated with any damage or liability, and any/all other claims now existing or which may occur as a result of this Variance.
- E. <u>Permits and Expiration</u>. The Applicant shall apply for all Storey County permits, as applicable, within 12 months from the date of Board approval for this Variance, and continuously maintain the validity of those permits, as appropriate, or this approval will become null and void.
- F. <u>Taxes Paid</u>. The Applicant must show the Planning Department evidence that all property taxes on the land are paid to-date before obtaining the variance approval letter.
- Screening. The Variance Holder shall maintain all existing fencing height surrounding the entire subject property in which storage of inoperable vehicles occurs and landscape screening of the entire south, east, and north boundary of the subject property. All fencing shall be the same as existing at the time of the variance application including the height, design, color and slats. Any alterations or proposed changes shall be reviewed and approved by Storey County and the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center architectural review committee prior to changes occurring. Any damage or deterioration to fencing

(including slats) shall be replaced immediately. All trees shall be properly irrigated by an automated drip-system and otherwise maintained in good health. Any trees damaged, diseased, and dying shall be promptly replaced with a similar type and size tree as the tree that died and was removed. Any modifications to the type or size of tree shall be reviewed and approved by Storey County prior to the changes occurring. The trees and their irrigation systems may remain in-place and are not subject to removal at such time that this variance becomes null and void.

Allowed Outdoor Storage.

- (1) The area of outdoor storage of inoperable vehicles shall not extend beyond what currently exists at the time of application for this variance as evident by the aerial photograph contained in the variance application file and Appendix 1 hereof. No inoperable vehicle may be stored outside of the parameter fence/screen.
- (2) All inoperable vehicles must remain in-tact and not dismantled. There shall be no outdoor storage of separated vehicle components or other similar type materials.
- (3) All inoperable vehicles shall be stored at ground level. No vehicle may be stored or stacked upon the top of another, or stored upon racking or otherwise above ground level.
- (4) Any shipping container or cargo container must be stored at ground level and not stacked or otherwise stored above another. Such container(s) remaining on-site for longer than 30 days must be entirely painted beige or other light earth tone color. All shipping containers must be fully enclosed and their doors shall remain closed except for short periods while being accessed.
- (5) One 10 yard or smaller dumpster may remain on the premises. No other dumpster or open rubbish container storage is allowed.
- (6) Inoperable recreational vehicles, semi-tractor and trailers, and other highprofile vehicles must be stored toward the west central area of the property and away from the perimeter.
- (7) Inoperable vehicles may be stored outside of an enclosed building for up to 90 days. The vehicles by that time must vacate the premises. Up to 10 of the inoperable vehicles may be stored for a longer period. Inoperable vehicles may be stored within a fully enclosed building indefinitely.
- (8) Outdoor storage of any materials not described or not allowed by this variance is prohibited.
- I. <u>Transfer of Rights</u>. This variance shall apply to the record owner(s) of the subject property and to the Variance Holder (Insurance Auto Auctions) only and applies to the land located at 4086 Peru Drive as described in the variance approval letter.

Enlargement of the land under this address shall not expand, relocated, or otherwise change the boundaries of the uses allowed by this variance. Any change of business owner, lapse in Storey County business license, or change in property ownership shall render this variance null and void. The null variance shall not be subject to renewal or a request to the Board and/or Planning Commission for renewal. The uses allowed by this Variance remain recognized as non-conforming with the Storey County Code.

- J. Compliance Review. If Storey County staff recognize non-compliance with the conditions of this Variance permit, Staff may schedule a public meeting with the Storey County Planning Commission to discuss compliance with the conditions of approval. The presentation will disclose evidence of any known failure to comply with the requirements. If a violation is found to have occurred, the staff report shall explain what measures, and to what degree of expediency and success, the Permit Holder employed to remedy any violation. The Planning Commission may recommend a show-cause hearing to the Board of County Commissioners if one or more violations to the conditions are found. Alternatively, the Planning Commission may require the applicant to provide subsequent public compliance reports at six month or twelve month intervals.
- K. Non-Compliance Show-Cause. Storey County may refer this Variance permit to the Board of County Commissioners for show-cause hearing for revocation based on reasons listed in this section. The continuance of uses of this revoked Variance permit is a violation of Storey County Code Title 17 Zoning and will be punishable as provided for therein or other applicable codes. The Variance may be referred to show-cause for the following reasons: (a) failure to comply with the Variance 2017-008 conditions, or federal, and county regulations, without appropriate remedy; (b) any misrepresentation made in the application for the variance or in other official documents, or amendments thereof, submitted to a federal, state, or local agency; (c) failure to provided notice to the County on violations, disasters, notices of decisions, and other such correspondence from federal, state, and local agencies as required in the Variance.

5. Public Comment

As of June 6, 2017, Staff has not received any comments from the public.

6. Power of the Board

At the conclusion of the hearing, the Board must take such action thereon as it deems warranted under the circumstances and announce and record its action by formal resolution, and such resolution must recite the findings of the Planning Commission upon which it bases its decision. The decision of the Planning Commission in the matter of granting the Special Use Permit is advisory only to the Board of County Commissioners and that governing body must consider the report and recommendation and must make such a decision thereon as it deems warranted.

7. Proposed Motions

This section contains two motions from which to choose. The motion for approval is recommended by staff in accordance with the Findings of Fact under Section 3.A of this report. Those findings should be made part of the approval motion. A motion for denial may be made and that motion should cite one or more of the findings shown in Section 3.B. Other findings of fact determined appropriate by the Planning Commission should be made part of either motion.

A. Recommended motion for approval

In accordance with the recommendation by staff, the Planning Commission, the Findings of Fact under Section 3.A of this report, and other findings deemed appropriate by the Board, and in compliance with the conditions of approval, I (county commissioner), move to approve a use variance allowing a previously permitted non-conforming use to remain in-place under its existing ownership conditions. The proposed use subject to the variance request is outdoor storage of inoperable motor vehicles and auctioning of those inoperable vehicles at portions of subject property located at 4086 Peru Drive, McCarran (Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center), Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-071-16.

B. Alternative motion for denial

Against the recommendation by staff, and the Planning Commission, but in accordance with the Findings of Fact under Section 3.2 of this report, and other findings deemed appropriate by the Board, I (county commissioner), move to deny a use variance allowing a previously permitted non-conforming use to remain in-place under its existing ownership conditions. The proposed use subject to the variance request is outdoor storage of inoperable motor vehicles and auctioning of those inoperable vehicles at portions of subject property located at 4086 Peru Drive, McCarran (Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center), Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-071-16.



Request:

The applicant requests an Amended Special Use Permit to convert an existing diesel fuel production facility to a renewable plant-based oil feedstock diesel fuel production facility. Modifications to the existing facility include installation of hydrotreatment process unit, hydrogen reformer, additional storage tanks, an operations building, a fire protection building, new roadway access and a rail spur. The project includes a request for additional height, up to 90 feet in height for proposed structures/equipment onsite. All improvements will be located at 611 Peru Drive (Tahoe Reno Industrial Center), McCarran, Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-031-14.


1. Background & Analysis

A. Site Location and Characteristics. This property is located within the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center. In 2009, the Storey County Board of Commissioners, with concurrence from the Planning Commission, approved a Special Use Permit (2010-011) for the original development on this site which allowed for a fuels production facility. The existing plant previously received inbound diesel fuel by truck and then processed the diesel with heat, natural gas and catalytic plates that produced a cleaner diesel fuel that was then trucked out to buyers of the fuel. This use operated from 2011 to 2016, and closed due to economic reasons.

The project site is has been graded relatively flat and is located at a base of a hill which provides a visual barrier to properties to the west. Surrounding land uses include vacant land owned by Sierra Pacific and the decommissioned Naniwa Power Plant to the north, vacant land owned by the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center and Gopher Construction yard to the east, vacant land owned by the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center to the south and vacant land owned by Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center to the west.

Access to the site is from Peru Drive from the west. The pavement for Peru Drive ends at the Encore DEC driveway entrance. The portion of Peru Drive from Waltham Way to the applicant's property is a private road and the road is not maintained by Storey County at this time. It is possible that in the future this road may be dedicated to the County if it can be shown the roadway has been constructed and maintained to Storey County standards.


The applicant has also proposed to develop a rail spur from the property's northeast to the rail line located near Amsterdam Court. This was proposed with the original application but was never constructed. The rail spur will be constructed within an easement across private property and require the applicant to coordinate with adjacent property owners.



Vicinity map




Surrounding properties

B. Proposed Use. The existing facility will be modified to provide a new process of generating renewable diesel fuel than previously permitted at the site. The new process will receive corn oil, soybean oil, and other plant-based oil feedstock product by rail and other modes of transportation, and it will be processed through a hydrotreatment unit specifically designed to convert the renewable vegetable oils into a drop-in renewable diesel fuel. The fuel is then shipped to buyers by rail and truck. The process is estimated to generate 2,000 barrels per day. No hazardous waste will be generated and the vegetable oil feedstock products are biodegradable.

The project involves retrofitting the existing site. The middle building (shown on the "Existing Site" photograph above) will be removed and replaced with equipment. The front building will remain but will be renovated. Three new storage tanks will be added along with two new buildings that will house operations and fire protection activities. The site has existing electrical and natural gas utilities and the new project will add sewer and fire water connections. It is anticipated that some structures/equipment will reach 90 feet in height.

C. <u>Fire/Safety Issues.</u> The proposed process of converting vegetable oils to diesel fuel utilizes a different process than what was originally approved for this site. The new process converts methane to hydrogen gas. The hydrogen gas then is sent to reactors to remove olefins and metals from the corn or soybean oils, then remove oxygen molecules and then aid in chaining and stabilizing the diesel molecule (isomerization).

The hydrogen gas that is produced is utilized immediately in the process. The only storage of hydrogen will be the pipe area between the converter and the reactor. Methane is also used in the process, but the process does not allow for build up or storage; it is used as soon as it is produced and the only storage would be what is in a pipe going from the tank to the reactor, similar to the hydrogen. Redundant automated valves will be installed throughout the facility to isolate sections of the process from each other in case of the need for emergency shutdown.

The majority of the product produced at the site is of combustible hazard concern, as opposed to a hazardous materials concern. The storage of hydrogen and methane on site is a minimal amount in a pipe, versus combustible concerns with oils. The applicant has worked with the Storey County Fire Protection District to design a safety system applicable to this process. The project will include a fire suppression system that includes a fully automated fixed foam system, strategically situated foam and water cannons, enlarged containment areas and a separate fire response storage building onsite.

If necessary, the Quad-County (Carson City, Douglas County, Lyon County & Storey County) Response Team would respond to a request for assistance at this location for this type of use and process proposed.

D. Special Use Permit. This property is subject to the provisions of the 1999 Zoning Ordinance of Storey County. The property is zoned I-2, Heavy Industrial and as stated in Section 17.37.040, "Petroleum refining, storage fields and reclaiming plants" and "Buildings and structures constructed for uses listed in Sections 17.37.030 and .040 of this chapter that will exceed seventy-five (75) feet in height" are subject to a Special Use Permit.

Although a Special Use Permit was approved by the Board of County Commissioners for the original development, the proposed use is a different refining process with separate safety and planning concerns. In addition, new structures and equipment are proposed with additional height and placement, and as such, staff has determined that an Amended Special Use Permit is required.

E. <u>Hazardous Materials</u>. The project site will have hydrogen and methane gas onsite during the process of refining the oils to diesel fuel. Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) Section 278.147 regulates the use of explosive or highly hazardous substances. The type and quantity of substances determined to be highly hazardous are identified in NRS 459.3816, 459.3818 and 459.3833. Both methane and hydrogen are on the list of highly hazardous substances; however, the amount proposed for this process appears to be below the quantity threshold identified to be regulated by NRS 459.380 to 459.3874. The thresholds for both hydrogen and methane is 10,000 lbs. The applicant has stated

the maximum storage of methane and hydrogen will be 3,000 lbs. each. Nearly all of the methane and hydrogen produced on-site circulates through the site piping system until it is consumed or converted to non-hazardous substances. There is no tank or other storage of these materials on-site.

2. Compatibility and Compliance

A. <u>Compatibility with surrounding uses and zones</u>. The following table documents land uses, zoning classifications and master plan designations for the land at and surrounding the proposed project.

The proposed use, with the fire safety elements included, is not expected to have a permanent impact on adjacent properties. The structures will be set back 50-feet from the property line and basins will be installed to contain all materials onsite. In a worst-case scenario, a fire would have the potential to create smoke and have a temporary impact to air quality and visibility.

- B. Compliance with required height limitations. The 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance Section 17.37.080 states: "No building shall have a height greater than six (6) stories or seventy-five (75) feet, not including silos, stacks, or equipment." Based on the submitted drawings, it appears that some structures, along with equipment, may exceed the 75-feet in height. The applicant has indicated that the height of some of the structures and/or equipment may reach 90-feet in height. The additional height for all the structures/equipment, up to 90-feet in height, has been reviewed and included with the Amended Special Use Permit.
- Compliance with required setbacks. The 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance Section 17.37.080 states: No building shall be located closer than fifty (50) feet to any property line. It appears from the submitted plans the applicant is proposing a fire equipment building and storage tanks within the required 50-foot setback. As a condition of approval for this Special Use Permit, the applicant will be required to demonstrate upon

submittal of a building permit that all structures (buildings, equipment, storage tanks) meet the required 50 setback from the property line.

D. General use allowances and restrictions. The 1999 Storey County Code Section 17.62, Special Uses (which refers to Section 17.60) identifies the administration for the Board and Planning Commission for allowing special use permits. Approval of a Special Use Permit "may only be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without substantially impairing the intent and purpose of any ordinance or resolution and under such conditions as the board may deem necessary to assure that the general purpose and intent of this ordinance will be observed, public safety and welfare secured and substantial justice done." The approval, approval with conditions, or denial of the Special Use Permit must be based on findings of fact that the proposed use is appropriate or inappropriate in the location. The findings listed below are the minimum to be cited in an approval.

In addition to conformance with the 1999 Storey County Code, the proposed project shall comply with all regulations stated forth by the TRI-Storey Development Agreement; the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Park Architectural Review Committee; and all applicable Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&Rs).

E. Conformance with the 2016 Storey County Master Plan. This project is located within the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center which the Master Plan states "provides for light industrial, heavy industrial, commercial, and industrial commercial uses and zones pursuant to the Development Agreement between Storey County and the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center, LLC." The property and the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center are located in the McCarran Area Plan which the Master Plan states "depicts a homogenous planned industrial center located toward the north-central part of Storey County nine miles east of Lockwood. It is home to the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center and is dedicated solely to manufacturing, utility power production, warehousing and distribution, and other heavy- and light-industrial, and commercial uses. The industrial center has grown to become a major regional hub for distribution, alternative energy production, digital data management, and highly intensive and experimental industries." The proposed use is consistent with these statements.

3. Findings of Fact

- A. <u>Motion for approval</u>. The following Findings of Fact are evident with regard to the requested special use permit when the recommended conditions of approval in Section 4, Recommended Conditions of Approval, are applied.
 - (1) The applicant requests an Amended Special Use Permit to convert an existing diesel fuel production facility to a renewable plant-based oil feedstock diesel fuel production facility. Modifications to the existing facility include installation of hydrotreatment process unit, hydrogen reformer, additional storage tanks, an operations building, a fire protection building, new roadway access and a rail spur. The project includes a request for additional height, up to 90 feet in height for proposed structures/equipment onsite. All improvements will be located at 611 Peru Drive, McCarran, Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-031-14.

- (2) The Amended Special Use Permit conforms to the 2016 Storey County Master Plan for the McCarran planning area in which the subject property is located. A discussion supporting this finding for the Special Use Permit is provided in Section 2.E of this staff report and the contents thereof are cited in an approval of this Special Use Permit.
- (3) The subject property is located within an existing industrial neighborhood in the McCarran area of Storey County. The zoning is based on the 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance which identifies this property as I-2 Heavy Industrial. The proposed diesel fuel production facility requires an Amended Special Use Permit.
- (4) Granting of the Amended Special Use Permit, with the conditions of approval listed in Section 4 of this report, will not under the circumstances of the particular case adversely affect to a material degree the health or safety of persons/property in the neighborhood of the subject property. The project is expected to meet the safety and health requirements for the subject area. The use will also be subject to building and fire plan review in order to ensure compliance with federal, state and other codes.
- (5) The Special Use Permit will not impose substantial adverse impacts or safety hazards on the abutting properties or the surrounding area, and it will comply with all federal, state and county regulations.
- (6) The conditions under the Special Use Permit do not conflict with the minimum requirements in the 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance Sections 17.37 I-2 Heavy Industrial and 17.62 Special Uses.
- (7) Granting of the Special Use Permit will not, under the circumstances of the particular case, adversely affect to a material degree the health or safety of persons working in the neighborhood or area of the subject property and will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or materially injurious to property improvements in the neighborhood or area of the subject property.
- (8) This Amended Special Use Permit allows for additional height up to a maximum of 90 feet for proposed structures/equipment onsite.
- B. <u>Motion for denial</u>. Should a motion be made to deny the Special Use Permit request, the following findings with explanation why should be included in that motion.
 - (1) This denial is for the applicant's request for an Amended Special Use Permit to convert an existing diesel fuel production facility to a renewable plant-based oil feedstock diesel fuel production facility. Modifications to the existing facility include installation of hydrotreatment process unit, hydrogen reformer, additional storage tanks, an operations building, a fire protection building, new roadway access and a rail spur. The project includes a request for additional height, up to 90 feet in height for proposed structures/equipment onsite. All

- improvements will be located at 611 Peru Drive, McCarran, Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-031-14.
- (2) The conditions under the Special Use Permit conflict with the minimum requirements in the 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance Sections 17.37 I-2 Heavy Industrial, 17.62 Special Uses.
- (3) The conditions under the Special Use Permit do not adequately mitigate potential adverse impacts on surrounding uses or protect against potential safety hazards for surrounding use.

4. Recommended Conditions of Approval

- A. Amended Special Use Permit 2010-011-A1-2017 amends and replaces SUP No. 2010-011. The amended SUP shall be for the purpose to convert an existing diesel fuel production facility to a renewable plant-based oil feedstock diesel fuel production facility. Modifications to the existing facility include installation of hydrotreatment process unit, hydrogen reformer, additional storage tanks, an operations building, a fire protection building, new roadway access and a rail spur. The project includes a request for additional height, up to 90 feet in height for proposed structures/equipment onsite. All improvements will be located at 611 Peru Drive, McCarran, Storey County, Nevada, APN 005-031-14. The conditions of Special Use Permit No. 2010-011-A1-2017 supersede all listed conditions in preceding Special Use Permit No. 2010-011.
- B. Requirements. The Permit Holder shall apply for all required permits and licenses, including building and fire permits, for the project within 24 months from the date of final approval of this Amended Special Use Permit, and continuously maintain the validity of those permits/licenses, or this approval shall be null and void. This permit shall remain valid as long as the permit holder, its heirs, assigns, or successors remain in compliance with the terms of this permit and Storey County, Nevada State, and federal regulations.
- C. <u>Substances Limitations</u>. There shall be no storage of hydrogen or methane on the premises. Hydrogen and methane may be produced by and circulate throughout the processing system as described in the special use permit application.
- D. Petroleum Storage. The total amount of petroleum products stored onsite shall be considered as separate control locations(s) and not exceed 999,000 gallons per singular fire control center with appropriate fire safety separation. All storage areas shall have spill containment consistent with Condition BB of the Conditions of Approval.
- E. <u>Rail</u>. This Special Use Permit authorizes the use of a rail spur for loading/unloading of product. All loading/unloading areas shall have spill containment consistent with Condition BB of the Conditions of Approval. Storey County Building Department and Fire Protection District plan review is required for the construction of the proposed rail spur facilities.
- F. <u>Compliance</u>. The use on the subject property must comply with federal, state, and county codes and regulations and the submitted plans and reports, as approved. The

Permit Holder must provide the building department plans drawn to scale prior to obtaining a building permit. The Permit Holder shall be responsible for maintaining the premises and managing operations in accordance with all conditions and stipulations set forth by this Amended Special Use Permit and all other federal, Nevada State, and Storey County codes and regulations. Failure to comply with the requirements herein shall elicit a written warning to the Applicant by Storey County on the first and second offense. A third offense shall warrant Storey County to revoke the Amended Special Use Permit. Storey County shall reserve the right to conduct periodic reviews of the Permit Holder's compliance with all conditions and stipulations of the Amended Special Use Permit.

Storey County may refer this Special Use Permit to the Board of County Commissioners for show-cause hearing for revocation based on reasons listed in this section. The procedures for show-cause will be pursuant to Storey County Code (SCC) 17.03 (Administrative Provisions). The continuation of uses of a revoked SUP is a violation of SCC Title 17 (Zoning) and will be punishable as provided for therein or other applicable codes. The SUP may be referred to show-cause for the following reasons:

- Failure to comply with the SUP conditions, or federal, state, and county regulations, without appropriate remedy;
- Any misrepresentation made in the application for the SUP or in other official documents, or amendments thereof, submitted to a federal, state, or local agency;
- Failure to provide notice to the county on violations, disasters, notice of decisions, and other such correspondence from federal, state, and local agencies as required in this SUP.
- G. <u>Taxes</u>. Before obtaining a building permit, the Permit Holder must show the building department valid evidence that all property taxes on the land are paid-to-date.
- H. Emergency Management Plan. The Permit Holder must submit an emergency plan to the Storey County Fire Protection District for review and approval. At a minimum, the elements of the plan must include disaster management, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and First-Aid response, transportation, and environmental protection. Specific items to be included in the plan are as follows. The following list is not exhaustive; the County may impose additional requirements as necessary. Requirements of State and federal agencies which fulfill the following may suffice when documentation thereof is submitted to the Fire District.
 - Basic company, owner, site, and emergency contact information
 - Plot Plan (detailed drawings) of the site and access points
 - Site evacuation and emergency procedure
 - Emergency contact procedures, including for the NDEP, Dispatch 9-1-1, and Storey County Emergency Services
 - Facility shut-down and startup procedure

- Special training and identification of any payment for the Fire District and Emergency Management to address site specific hazards
- Wildland and structure fire prevention and suppression
- Emergency vehicle access, circulation, and staging
- Documenting and reporting of emergency situations, including spills and gas-off
- Post disaster management, cleanup, and material disposal
- Documenting and reporting of NDEP and other environmental permits and notices
- Stormwater drainage and detention
- Facility closure
- Transfer of Rights. This Amended Special Use Permit shall inure to the record owner of the Subject Property and to the Permit Holder and shall run with the land defined herein. This Amended Special Use Permit, subject to its terms and conditions, may be transferred by the permit holder, its successors, heirs or assigns. Any/all transfers of Special Use Permit 2010-011-A1-2017 shall be advised in writing to Storey County Planning Department 90 days prior to assignee taking over operation of facility. The operators of the facility must sign and accept all stipulations and requirements of the Amended Special Use Permit 2010-011-A1-2017.
- Abandonment. In the event that the use authorized by this Amended Special Use Permit is abandoned for a period of more than twenty-four (24) calendar months from the date of last producing operations, this permit shall become null and void and a new Special Use Permit shall be required. In the event of a force Majuro such as and not limited to a flood, damage or destruction of the access to the site, earthquake, or other events beyond the control of Storey County of the Permit Holder, the period of abandonment shall not be deemed to commence until such time as the permit holder may be found to once again have reasonable access to the site. In this connection, the permit holder shall reasonably attempt to establish access to the site.
- K. <u>Closure</u>. The Permit Holder shall be responsible for the cost for the closure of this facility as permitted under Special Use Permit 2010-011-A1-2017. Complete closure shall consist of providing reclamation that would eliminate any hazardous materials or environmental damage to the existing site or adjacent areas contaminated by operations.
- L. <u>Post-Closure Monitoring</u>. In the event that the permit lapses or the use is discontinued or abandoned, the Permit Holder, its heirs, assigns or successors shall remain responsible for environmental monitoring and post-closure maintenance. Under no circumstances shall Storey County, its officers, or representatives bare any cost or responsibility for the deconstruction, disassembly, or removal of equipment or environmental monitoring or clean-up.
- M. <u>Setbacks</u>. Any proposed buildings and storage tanks shall setback 50-feet from the property line as required by Section 17.37.060 of the 1999 Storey County Zoning Ordinance.

- N. <u>Nuisances.</u> As stated in Section 17.12.100(A), noise, smoke, odor, gases, or other noxious nuisances shall be controlled so as not to become objectionable, or adversely affect the properties in the vicinity, and shall not be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare.
- O. Separate Permits Required. This Amended Special Use Permit shall not be construed to be a permit for design or construction. A separate Storey County plan review, fire safety review, and building permit will be required. A Nevada Division of Environmental Protection air quality control permit must be obtained for the project. A copy of the NDEP air quality permit shall be forwarded to Storey County Planning Department for inclusion with Amended Special Use Permit. If there is a violation of NDEP permit, Storey County shall be notified of the violation, corrective action to be taken and date to be completed.
- P. <u>Legal Responsibility</u>. Issuance of this permit does not convey property rights of any sort or any exclusive privilege; nor does it authorize any injury to persons or property, any invasion of other private rights, or any infringement of state or local laws or regulations.
- Q. Plan Submittal. This permit incorporates by reference the standards, objectives, conditions, terms and requirements of the operating plan, safety plan, training plan, waste management plan, fire suppression plan, and closure plan, to be submitted separately from this permit. The requirements of all submitted plans become part of this Amended Special Use Permit as ongoing, updateable working documents.
- R. Indemnification. The Permit Holder warrants that the future use of land will conform to the requirements of the County of Storey, State of Nevada, and applicable federal regulatory and legal requirements for a fuels production and/or processing facility; further, the Permit Holder warrants that continued and future use of the land shall so conform. The Permit Holder, its assigns, heirs or successors, agrees to hold Storey County, its officers, and representatives harmless from the costs associated with any environmental damage, environmental liability, and any/all other claims now existing or which may occur as a result of this special use permit.
- S. <u>Liability Insurance</u>. The Permit Holder, as well as its assigns, heirs or successors, shall provide proof of insurance to Storey County and maintain a satisfactory liability insurance for all aspects of this operation under Amended Special Use Permit # 2010-011-A1-2017 for a <u>minimum</u> amount of \$5,000,000.00 (five million dollars).
- T. <u>Security/Screening</u>. An aesthetically acceptable security barrier/screening device of a minimum 6' fence (chain-link or vertical bars) topped with three strands of barbwire shall enclose all developed portions of the property.
- U. <u>Landscaping</u>. A landscaping plan consistent with, but not limited to, the minimum standards set forth in Subsection 4 of the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center's CC&R's and Architectural Committee, as well as Storey County approval, shall be implemented onsite.
- V. <u>Outdoor Lighting</u>. Lighting plan shall be designed to provide necessary operation, but not be over obtrusive to avoid safety hazard(s) for adjacent right-of-ways and/or light

pollution, and shall comply with Chapter 8.02 of the Storey County Code.

- W. Roadway Development. The Permit Holder shall be required to pave Peru Drive from the point beginning approximately 2,000 feet south of Waltham Way up to and through the facility's driveway approachment(s). The paved roadway shall be at least thirty (30) feet in total width and include a cul-de-sac near the facility's entrance, both of which shall be completed to the satisfaction of the Storey County Fire Protection District, Building, Planning and Public Works Departments at the applicant's expense. The permit holder shall be required to maintain said roadway (i.e., repair and resurface and remove snow and ice, etc.) until it is developed to the satisfaction of the Storey County Public Works Director, deeded to Storey County, and accepted as a public right-way by the Board of Storey County Commissioners. At that point, Storey County shall assume the responsibility of maintaining said roadway.
- X. Septic System. The Permit Holder may request a Variance from the Community Development Director to install a septic system and leach-field capable of serving an office of up to four employees. This system shall remain in use until the TRI General Improvement District (GID) installs a permanent sewer system near the facility. At point of completion of the sewer system, the permit holder shall be required to hook into the new system and abandon and remove the septic/leach field system at his/her expense.
- Y. <u>State/Federal Taxes</u>. Whenever Nevada law requires the payment of a sales and/or use tax, all materials and equipment purchased or rented for this project should be received in Storey County and the value reported as 'county-of-delivery' on the Nevada Dept. of Taxation form TXR-01.01 'Sales/Use Tax Return'. Proof of appropriate reporting is required prior to a 'Certificate of Occupancy' being issued. Additionally, when applicable, the permit holder shall be responsible for reporting and paying all Federal Motor Fuels and Lubricants taxes.
- Z. <u>Emergency Training</u>. The Permit Holder shall provide and/or pay for any and all special training for the Storey County Fire Protection District that is required due to the operation of the facility, including training to combat petroleum hydrocarbon fires, foam usage, and applicable chemical type fires.
- AA. <u>Fire/Safety</u>. The Permit Holder shall implement the Fire Protection methods identified in the RYZE Renewables Reno Plant Fire Protection Review document, prepared by Jensen Hughes, dated February 15, 2017 and revised May 26, 2017. In addition, the permit holder shall demonstrate the following fire/safety protection elements are included in the submitted development plans to Storey County:
 - (1) Emergency vehicle access shall be provided around all sides of the proposed new storage tanks.
 - (2) Fire flow calculations shall be provided for water needed for foam protection and fire suppression.
 - (3) An emergency response plan shall be provided which includes fire response,

hazardous materials response and plume modelling.

- BB. Fluid Containment. The Permit Holder shall construct containment systems in areas where fuels and other types of hazardous materials are being stored or processed to prevent spills, if any, from entering the environment. The containment system shall be designed and installed to the satisfaction of the Storey County Fire Protection District and Building and Planning Departments. The containment system shall be capable of holding at least 100 percent of the facility's liquid containers cumulatively, including fire suppression, cooling water and foam that may typically be applied during an emergency event as determined by the Storey County Fire Protection District. Before operations may commence, a plan containing detailed specifications on how the operation will adequately contain all hazardous materials from escaping the facility shall be submitted to the Storey County Fire Protection District. This plan must conform to NFPA Standards, Industry Best Management Practices, and International Fire Code. As required, the Storey County Fire Protection District may use a Licensed Fire Protection Engineer to consult, validate and review said plan. If this is done all costs shall be borne by the applicant.
- CC. <u>Water Connection</u>. The Permit Holder shall provide a 'Will Serve' letter from Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center G.I.D. to the Storey County Building Department for the necessary water to operate the facility.
- DD. <u>Environmental Monitoring</u>. Before operations commence, the permit holder shall submit to Storey County a copy of the environmental monitoring requirements applicable to the facility under the environmental permits issued for the facility. The Permit Holder shall include storm water management measures on its site plan which shall be submitted to Storey County Building Department for approval.
- EE. Air Emissions. Air emissions from the facility shall meet the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection permit requirements. Copies of the annual reports of environmental quality, necessary to comply with the requirements of the permit issued by the Bureau of Air Pollution Control, Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP) shall be submitted to Storey County Planning Department. In the event that there is an air discharge in excess of the standards approved by NDEP under the construction or operating permit, the permit holder shall provide Storey Community Planning Department a copy of any notice of the event or plan to remediate the event submitted to NDEP. If the Permit Holder is required by the Bureau of Air Pollution Control, Nevada Division of Environmental Protection to prepare a report on the event, the permit holder shall submit a copy of the report to Storey County Planning Development. There shall be no obnoxious odors released into the air that are a nuisance to abutting properties.
- FF. <u>Drainage Protection</u>. All process drains around each unit and site drainage shall be designed to prevent the discharge of oils to the sewer or septic system and or storm drain systems. All site drainage shall be designed as not to adversely impact surrounding property owners.

- gallons or more of any petroleum product (i.e., gasoline, diesel, and hydraulic fluid) or 3 or more cyds of contaminated material, or any presence of such material on or in ground/surface water shall be required to be reported immediately to Emergency Dispatch 9-1-1. Additionally, under Nevada State law, the incident shall be immediately reported to Storey County Building and Planning Departments and the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP). The Permit Holder shall comply with the NDEP's clean-up requirements and provide Storey County a copy of NDEP's completion of remediation. All hazardous materials incident clean-up and response costs shall be borne by the permit holder as part of the issuance of this special use permit. Incidents exceeding a standard first alarm fire will be billed to the company. If mutual aid is warranted to suppress an incident, those costs shall also be funded by the company.
- HH. <u>Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP)</u>. The Permit Holder shall demonstrate all required permits from the NDEP have been obtained prior to commencing the project.

5. Public Comment

As of June 6, 2017, Staff has not received any comments from the public.

6. Power of the Board

At the conclusion of the hearing, the Board of County Commissioners must take such action thereon as it deems warranted under the circumstances and announce and record its action by formal resolution, and such resolution must recite the findings of the Planning Commission upon which it bases its decision. The decision of the Planning Commission in the matter of granting the Special Use Permit is advisory only to the Board of County Commissioners and that governing body must consider the report and recommendation and must make such a decision thereon as it deems warranted.

7. Proposed Motions

This section contains two motions from which to choose. The motion for approval is recommended by staff and the Planning Commission in accordance with the Findings of Fact under Section 3.A of this report. Those findings should be made part of the approval motion. A motion for denial may be made and that motion should cite one or more of the findings shown in Section 3.B. Other findings of fact determined appropriate by the Planning Commission should be made part of either motion.

A. Recommended motion for approval
