  - Lockwood resident Christopher Berge passed away last Friday.

#### Jason Wierzbicki, Public Works Director:

• The Justice Court project is going well, on schedule and slightly under budget.

- The Depot project Request for Qualifications has been reissued for consideration of a design proposal for installation of a fire suppression system and related structural work. Additional submittals should be in at the end of this week.
- Close to finishing the new Dispatch Center.
- The Painted Rock drainage issues have been completed as far as can be. A section of guard rails and some washouts have been repaired.
- Currently working on major drainage repairs around town directing water away from homes and businesses that have had previous issues. When that is done, they will be getting back to the Mark Twain drainage project.

#### Erik Schoen, Community Chest Director:

- Update on the before and after school programs: Kids are adapting to the current school year and they are pretty resilient in general.
- The hope was to provide programs and support for them to stay on top of schoolwork. This is being done as best we can.
- However, children are being seen who seem to be stifled. They are "hard-wired" for social connection. Having to resist that social connection throughout the school year, by the time they get the program (after-school or "off days") they need a place to decompress. This needs to be done before getting to their educational needs. This has been a struggle.
- The schools are working on supporting students as well.
- Community Chest ended up with more money in the "food program" than normal. Partnering with the Senior Center, funding was provided for their food bank. Thank you to Stacey Gilbert for partnering. The Senior Center has the most successful food distribution in the County, so it made sense.
- Counseling and case management programs are still open with slots available. If there is a need, please call.
- The Virginia City "Haunted Ride Along" will be held October 23<sup>rd</sup>, 6PM to 9PM. Virginia City is turned into a "virtual haunted house" with characters placed throughout town. Rather than on the trolley, everyone will be in their own cars. An "app" will be available for participants to hear the narrative by the characters.
- This is the 30<sup>th</sup> year of Community Chest. A virtual "30<sup>th</sup>" bash will be held October 29<sup>th</sup> with a virtual concert being held at 7PM. More information to come.

#### James Deane, IT Director:

- The "Artic Wolf" software service security has been deployed on all County devices.
- The project to move power and equipment from the training building on C Street has been completed.
- The sewer tower Special Use and Historic Permits have been received. Construction is set to begin mid-November at the sewer treatment plant on 6 Mile.
- The "multi-factor authentication project" for the Clerk's Office has been completed. This increases election security.
- Work on the new dispatch office location is wrapping up and moving along smoothly.

#### Stacey York, Senior Center Director:

• Flu Shot Clinics: October 7<sup>th</sup> at the Virginia City Senior Center, 9-11 AM; October 8<sup>th</sup>, Lockwood Senior Center, 9-11 AM; and Virginia City Highlands, October 21<sup>st</sup> – 4:30 to 6:30 PM.

- The Veteran's Day Spaghetti Feed will be a little different this year. Participants in the car cruise can come to the Senior Center, drive-through, and pickup "to-go" spaghetti lunch.
- A meeting was held regarding a capital improvement project for the Lockwood Senior Community Center and the need for separate spaces and a commercial kitchen looking at different options and funding streams. More info to come.

#### Dave Ballard, IT Director:

• The building (new Communications office) is moving "full steam ahead". Desks should be in today – just waiting for equipment to come in. Hoping to be in by mid or end of November.

#### Deny Dotson, VCTC Director:

- VCTC regular meeting is set for this Thursday.
- Starting the process of refreshing the Strategic Plan will be on the agenda. This will include looking at marketing, diversity inclusion, events all of this with the restrictions of Covid.
- One thing that will help, the Governor has relaxed restrictions on occupancy to 250 or 50%. This will help at Pipers with plays, Hauntober activities, and Christmas.

#### Lara Mather, Community Relations Director:

• Introduced Honey Tapley, who has been working with the County - under CARES Act funding - on everything COVID related and has taken the lead on Small Business Grants for the County.

#### Honey Tapley:

- 13 businesses have applied for the small grants. Seven have been approved by the National Development Center so far the County has approved six of the seven.
- The deadline for applications has been extended to October 29th.
- There is a counselor at the Small Business Development Center who is willing to help businesses with everything regarding the application process. The contact is Kathy Harbardier at 775 720-4428. Community Relations can also be contacted at 847-0986, ext. 1.
- Businesses are encouraged to contact Community Relations with any concerns about the process.

Chairman McBride commented that several merchants were reluctant to participate when there was a smaller amount of money being offered for the amount of work it would take to apply. It looks like what (Community Relations) is doing will make it easier and more affordable for the participants.

Ms. Tapley: Ms. Harbardier also wanted everyone to know that businesses who are hesitant to provide all documentation needed, a confidentiality agreement is signed with her. Information will not get out publicly. Anything like tax documents, W-9, etc., remains confidential.

#### Mike Nevin, Water/Sewer Project Manager:

Hillside Tanks Project:

- Project is on schedule;
- Waterline from tank site to 342 is 90% complete. The tie-in was completed at the highway;
- Retaining wall for the first tank is complete;
- The contractor is working on the footing and foundation for the first tank.

Gold Hill Sewer Treatment Facility:

- After meeting with NDEP, language for the "draft discharge permit" has been agreed to.
- The draft package has been sent with notice of intent to issue the permit after the 30-day public comment period at the end of the month. Problems are not anticipated based on reading the fact-finding for the discharge permit.
- This is ready to bid and concurrence to do so has been requested from both funding agencies.
- The first concurrence has been received from the Office of Financial Assistance. Waiting for USDA concurrence -if received this week, this is set to go.
- The plant equipment is expected to ship out from manufacturer in the next couple of weeks and will be store until the site is ready.

#### Martin Azevedo, Community Development Director/Fire Marshal:

- Community Development has hired another nuisance officer.
- 201 new construction documents have been reviewed so far this year;
- 32 permits issued last month; 288 year-to-date;
- They are trying to keep up with the number of permits with the current staff. Especially with Tesla closing out a lot of them. Inspectors and everyone involved have stepped up to get a lot of permits closed. They have found permits dating back years that were never closed.
- 91 Business licenses have been issued year- to-date.
- There are 41 active nuisances.
- There was one small fire last month with minimal damage.
- The Sheriff's Office has been great to work with in regards to developing the "new tire program". Planning and Public Works will also be involved with this program.
- Next week, the International Code Committee and the National Fire Protection Association invited Mr. Azevedo to tour Tesla and Panasonic. Due to new technology and ways of doing things, codes do not reflect a lot of what is seen in TRI. He has been asked to be on their "code committees" basically a committee to write new codes and regulations for future code cycles.

#### Joe Curtis, Emergency Management Director:

- Currently the County has 0 Covid cases. One last week has since recovered. There has been a total of 11 cases. Storey and Esmeralda counties have been the two low counties. There were 9 new cases in the Quad-County, with 8 recoveries, and one death. The four counties are now at 1,361 cases 94 active; 1250 recovered; 17 deaths. Five of the 9 new cases have no connection to a priorly reported case.
- Hospitalizations for the entire State are currently at the same level as on July 1st. The peak number was in August.
- Yesterday there was good participation at the community testing site in the Highlands. 41 people were tested along with receiving flu shots.
- Testing and flu shots will be available in Lockwood on October 23rd, 3 to 5 pm.
- Air quality assessment today is in the moderate range. This is watched a lot due to the effect
  on the school system as well as on people with breathing problems especially with smoke in
  the area.

#### Kathy Canfield, Senior Planner:

- At the November 5<sup>th</sup> Planning Commission meeting, USGS will be giving the yearly update on the Highlands wells study. There will also be discussion about the resident's side.
- The meeting will be held via Zoom. USGS is presenting at 6PM.

#### Jeff Nevin, Fire Chief:

- Last Saturday there was a fire in a couple of sheds and a motorhome in Painted Rock. There was also a fire in Mark Twain caused by a bar-b-que or smoker, causing minimal damage to the structure.
- A brush engine is returning from a fire in Wyoming.
- Seasonal staff have been working on the slope behind the history center and the V&T Depot.
- The "Street Wise" program they are working on will be an automatic vehicle locater system, along with electronic pre-plan. This will help them have immediate access to plans and drawings of each business in the County to help with security problems that may arise. This will be in "real time" on the I-Pads in the engines.
- Chief Nevin said he has given the Commissioners his notice to retire December 31st. Serving as Fire Chief has been one of his goals and he appreciates the opportunity.

Chairman McBride acknowledged the terrific job done by Chief Nevin.

Vice Chairman Carmona said it has been a pleasure to work with the Chief.

#### Keith Loomis, Deputy District Attorney:

• Attorney Mary Lewis' case is proceeding. Stericycle has intervened in the case.

#### Austin Osborne, County Manager:

• After many years working on the Federal Lands Bill, there has been a quit claim deed from the Federal government to the County. The intention is for the County to work with property owners in Virginia City and Gold Hill to transfer those quit claim deeds to them. The goal is to remove clouded title on private properties with BLM. We are working with the District Attorney's office, the Assessor's office, the Recorder's office, and others, to get this straightened out. This will be presented to the Board on October 25th for action. Anyone with questions or concerns can call Mr. Osborne.

#### Vanessa Stephens, County Clerk:

- Thank you to James Deane, and team, for getting the Clerk set up for the election. The State has put in new security. The office has been very busy with the election the ballots went out in the mail on September 30<sup>th</sup> and are already coming back. The ballots can be mailed or dropped off.

Mr. Osborne presented this item. This request has been done in the past with Fulcrum Biofuels, the biorefinery. They also have a waste-separation facility at the Lockwood Regional Landfill. This action, taken each year, gives Fulcrum the ability/credibility to apply for bonds, federal financing, and other USDA backed federal financial assistance. This is not a County bond – this is a routine matter required by USDA.

Fulcrum representative, Claymore Hardman, explained this is like what was issued last year. Fulcrum will be coming back at the November 3<sup>rd</sup> Commission meeting for approval of the findings from the Governor's Office, if that will work.

Chairman McBride explained, due to the November 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting has been changed to November 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Mr. Osborne explained Storey County has a franchise agreement with Waste Management for trash pickup. Canyon GID has its own franchise agreement for Lockwood, therefore the County's agreement does not cover that area. The Canyon GID agreement does not include the 25% senior discount as does Storey County's agreement. The County has been working with Canyon GID to create an interlocal agreement for the parties to work together for the 25% senior discount of the County's franchise agreement to apply in the Lockwood community through the County's reimbursement agreement. Canyon GID has approved the interlocal agreement.

Commissioner Gilman: He is delighted with this agreement and that the Lockwood community will be able to take advantage of this.

**Mitch Andreni, Canyon GID Manager:** Thank you from everyone in Lockwood – this will be very popular and is very appreciated The Board and residents he speaks to are grateful and looking forward to this. We will work together to get this going as soon as possible.

Sheriff Antinoro explained the storage trailer obtained some time ago is no longer being used and it is leaking. The trailer is in the area where the animal shelter is going to be built. It has no value - they will see if a scrap company will come and haul it off. The old walk-in cooler was put in when the jail was constructed in the '80s. It was replaced this last year with a new one. There does not appear to be a market for a used one - it has no value whatsoever. Whoever wants it can take it.

Mr. Osborne explained the DEVNET system works mostly with the Assessor's office. It was found that DEVNET was not as effective for planning, building, and zoning departments, which have been moved over to the Tyler system with better programming. The request is to remove those departments from the contract – there will be a slight reduction in cost.

Assessor Seddon said DEVNET did not have what was necessary for the Community Development department, especially with the fire side of that department.

Commissioner Gilman thanked Ms. Seddon for the work put into this.

**16. DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION:** Update on Community Development Department Tyler systems project, and possible approval of additional CARES Act fund expenditures for the Community Development Department remote workforce and software conversion project.

Mr. Osborne: There is a CARES Act element to this item. This is an amendment to the Tyler contract for the building, planning, and business licensing element providing more ability for those working remotely as needed during the Covid situation. It also allows the public and others to work remotely with Community Development – such as payments, plan submittal, etc. The cost is \$7,000 – but approval is requested for "not to exceed" \$10,000 to allow room in case there are other elements that need to be added. The original annual cost was about \$14,200 – this will be reduced to about \$6,000 for the annual renewal cost.

Chairman McBride: Is this something that will be used going forward even after the pandemic?

Mr. Osborne: Yes. We are trying to provide more effective means for the public to pay bills and submit things on-line.

Mr. Azevedo: This system will streamline the inspection and plan review processes and will work in the future too. Technology will cut down on office and inspector's time – between 30 and 40%. A lot of work will be done on computer, on site. If the Covid situation continues, video inspections can be

done. Contractors can add photos to the inspection form and send it right out. It can automatically be up-loaded to the system. Mr. Azevedo has talked to several companies throughout the country who use this and say it is a great program. This will cut down inspectors' office time between 30 to 40%. A lot will be done on site on their computers. Video inspections and photos can be done – added to the inspection form and sent right out. There are thousands of departments throughout the country using this program. There will be a learning curve, but they will get through that.

Chief Nevin explained Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District advised him that they were surplusing two engines. Two engines were purchased in 1996. Chief Nevin, along with the County mechanic, have looked at these engines – they are older but both are in really great shape for their age. They can be purchased for \$50,000 – the cost of the engines is only \$20,000. New engines are over \$700,000 for one. These engines are pretty much bullet proof.

Chair McBride asked if any engines would be replaced.

Chief Nevin said this will provide a reserve at the north end of the County. Currently, if an engine goes down, a reserve has to be brought from the south end, switch equipment, and bring it to the shop for repair. This will hopefully cut down on excess time having to switch out engines.

Vice Chairman Carmona: He is glad to see this - hopefully the community will be a little safer.

Commissioner Gilman: Echoes Commissioner Carmona. With Covid, now is the time to take care of first responders. Thank you Chief Nevin for undertaking this.

Senior Planner Kathy Canfield: This is a request for abandonment of a public access easement for an undeveloped portion of A Street adjacent to County owned property at 800 South C Street. The land associated with the access easement abandonment will be consolidated with land owned by Storey County and will remain public property. Due to topography, construction in this area is very unlikely and the area is not used for access to any properties. The abandonment will allow for a small building addition that will encroach into the A Street access. NRS noticing requirements were followed. One phone call was received from an adjacent property owner questioning addressing. No changes are required for any access or address for surrounding properties. There are no utilities of record in this area. No public comment was received at the Planning Commission and the vote was 6-0 for approval, one absent. Staff recommends approval.

Ms. Canfield: This Special Use Permit application is for a new retail experience that includes live birds of prey in a building adjacent to the Visitor's Center. The SUP is required because of the live animals. The birds will be inside and will travel back and forth with the applicant – not living on the site. All licensing through the State has been received. There may be times when the animals are displayed outside. In that event, a special events permit would be required from the VCTC. No public comments were received at the Planning Commission meeting. The Planning Commission recommended that Storey County be listed as additional insured on (applicant's) general liability certificate. Applicant has already done this. Planning Commission voted 6-0 for approval. Staff recommends approval.

#### Public Comment:

Applicant Corey Dalton thanked the Board, and Ms. Canfield and Mr. Azevedo for their courtesy and assistance with this process.

Vice Chairman Carmona said this interactive activity on C Street is a welcome sight and nice addition to the shops.

Commissioner Gilman welcomed applicant aboard.

#### Ms. Canfield read the Findings of Fact:

This approval is to operate a retail establishment and exhibit within an existing building that includes live birds of prey at 80 South C Street, Virginia City, Storey County, Nevada, Assessor's Parcel Number (APN) 001-083-02. The birds will not reside at the site, but will be transported daily by the applicant. No outside display is proposed.

The proposed project complies with the general purpose, goals, objectives, and standards of the county master plan, this title, and any other plan, program, map, or ordinance adopted, or under consideration pursuant to official notice by the county.

The proposal location, size, height, operations, and other significant features will be compatible with and will not cause substantial negative impact on adjacent land uses, or will perform a function or provide a service that is essential to the surrounding land uses, community, and neighborhood.

The proposed project will result in no substantial or undue adverse effect on adjacent property, the character of the neighborhood, traffic conditions, parking, public improvements, public sites or right-of-way, or other matters affecting the public health, safety, and general welfare, either as they now exist or as they may in the future be developed as a result of the implementation of the provisions and policies of the county master plan, this title, and any other plans, program, map or ordinance adopted or under consideration pursuant to an official notice, by the county, or other governmental agency having jurisdiction to guide growth and development.

The proposed use in the proposed area will be adequately served by and will impose no undue burden on any of the improvements, facilities, utilities, or services provided by the county or other governmental agency having jurisdiction in the county.

The Special Use Permit conforms to the 2016 Storey County Master Plan for the Downtown District portion of Virginia City within the Comstock Area Plan in which the subject property is located. A discussion supporting this finding is provided in Section 2.D of this staff report and the contents thereof are cited in an approval of this Special Use Permit.

The conditions under the Special Use Permit do not conflict with the minimum requirements in Storey County Code Sections 17.03.150 - Special Use Permit, 17.12 - General Provisions, and Section 17.30 - CR Commercial Residential.

Chairman McBride questioned the Planning Commission's request for the County to be named as additional insured.

Mr. Loomis said he had been asked by Mr. Prater if this was a good idea or not. His answer was yes – it is a good idea to have an additional insurance source for the County. It is not required, but it was

posed as an addition and it is his recommendation. This provides an additional source of insurance coverage if something goes wrong.

Chair McBride: Is the County responsible for the activity of the business?

Mr. Loomis: No, but that doesn't mean the County cannot be sued for it.

Mr. Dalton: The actual certificate does cover any venue that we may be at. The plan is to also be part of events in Reno. This does not affect the policy on our end, and since the Planning Commission requested this, it has already been written in.

Tourism Director Deny Dotson asked if this Special Use Permit would allow applicant to be out on the boardwalk.

Ms. Canfield: The SUP is for the animals to be inside the building. It was discussed that for (outside) displays, VCTC would need to issue a special events permit – seeing the animals actually perform. This permit is for them to be inside.

Mr. Dotson: As mentioned, there have been attractions like this in the past. From the tourism side, this is welcomed as long as it is done safely. More attractions always help – and we look forward to Mr. Dalton setting up outside if he chooses to.

Ms. Canfield said the Planning Commission requested the motion include an additional statement regarding the County being added as an additional insured on the general liability insurance certificate.

It is the pleasure of the Board of Storey County Commissioners to provide this letter of support for this grant application submitted by the State Public Works Division (SPWD) of the Department of Administration to the new Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) mitigation grant program. The SPWD is seeking funds to enable critical improvements to the Marlette Lake Water System, which will ensure ongoing operations of the system. The funding will support the SPWD's efforts to transition away from reactive disaster spending and move toward research supported, proactive investment in community resilience for the safety of the public.

The Hobart Creek Reservoir Dam is part of the Marlette Lake Water System, which is a historically significant system dating back to the 1870s and purchased by the State of Nevada in 1963. Today, the system is comprised of two reservoirs—Marlette Lake and Hobart Reservoir (both supported by earthen dams)—a concrete diversion dam, water storage tanks, water catchments, approximately seven miles of high pressure inverted siphon, and 36 miles of water transmission lines. This system is considered as critical infrastructure as it provides water to both Storey County and Carson City residents and businesses, and is the only water source for Virginia City, Gold Hill, and Silver City. Additionally, Hobart Reservoir is within Nevada's state park system and functions as a fish hatchery and recreational fishery for Nevada's Department of Wildlife.

These funds will facilitate pre-disaster mitigation to promote improved resiliency for those who rely on the system for their water supply, safety for those who live downstream of the earthen dam, and an ongoing source of recreational opportunities for Nevada's residents and visitor. Storey County fully supports the efforts of the SPWD as it seeks funding to improve the system.

### STAFF SUMMARY

In 1999, EP Minerals subdivided its property adjacent to the TRI Center into two parcels. (see attached Doc. No. 85090) In that parcel map it identified a location for a possible future roadway across the two parcels for the purpose of providing access to what was anticipated to be the future alignment of USA Parkway. When USA Parkway was later dedicated and constructed, the location of USA Parkway and where the future roadway intersected with USA Parkway changed slightly, which changed the alignment of the future roadway across the EP Minerals parcel. The new alignment of the future roadway was identified in 2009 when EP Minerals dedicated the roadway section to Storey County by Dedication Map 110555. (A copy of the 2009 dedication map is attached). EP Minerals reports that the dedication map indicated that the intent at the time of dedication was that the old roadway location would be abandoned so that the original intended access would now be provided by what is now known as Electric Avenue. However, EP Minerals inadvertently failed to relocate the easement prior to the dedication so that it would merge into and be superseded by the roadway dedication to the County.

In order to achieve EP Minerals' original intent, EP Minerals is asking to relocate the 1999 roadway easement to coincide with and merge into the Electric Avenue roadway where it crosses EP Minerals property. EP Minerals is asking that since the County has accepted the 2009 dedication, (See attached Document No. 127579) EP Minerals would like to get the County 's consent to relocate this access easement to the Electric Avenue location, such that the access rights thereunder would simply be provided by the now public roadway. To achieve this goal, EP Minerals proposes recording the Correction Dedication Deed and Notice of easement relocation.

# CORRECTION DEDICATION DEED AND NOTICE OF RELOCATED EASEMENT

THIS CORRECTION DEDICATION DEED AND NOTICE OF RELOCATED EASEMENT is made this \_\_\_\_ day of November 2020, by EP MINERALS, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company ("EP Minerals") and is consented to by Storey County, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada ("Storey").

### RECITALS:

WHEREAS, Eagle Picher Minerals, Inc., a predecessor in interest to EP Minerals, as owner of both the benefitted and burdened parcels, recorded a parcel map on May 28, 1999 as File No. 85090 ("1999 Parcel Map") pursuant to which it subdivided certain property into two separate parcels and identified a location of a potential 80' future roadway across Parcel 99-10 ("Future Roadway Easement") intended to provide access to a future road bisecting the two parcels (which bisecting road was later named USA Parkway).

WHEREAS, the right of way for USA Parkway was dedicated by Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center LLC to Storey County by Quitclaim Deed of Dedication (USA Parkway) recorded September 17, 2007 as Document No. 107606 along a slightly different alignment than the boundary bisecting Parcel 99-10 and Parcel 99-9, and as a result the point of intersection and alignment of the 80' future roadway across Parcel 99-10 shifted slightly to the south.

WHEREAS, the alignment of the 80' future roadway was finally identified in December 2008 when EP Minerals offered a right of way for the roadway (now known as Electric Avenue) to Storey County, as later described in the Dedication Map recorded January 22, 2009 as File No. 110555 (the "Dedication Map") and the Quitclaim Deed of Dedication (Electric Avenue Segment) recorded April 17, 2018 as Document No. 127579 ("Dedication Deed"). The Dedication Map and Dedication Deed reflect EP Minerals' intent to abandon the original approximate location of the 80' future roadway identified in the 1999 Parcel Map as the original intended access would thereafter be provided across Electric Avenue; however, through inadvertent error EP Minerals did not relocate the Future Roadway Easement to coincide with right of way offered for dedication prior

to recording the Dedication Map and Dedication Deed such that the Future Roadway Easement would merge into and be superseded by the public right of way dedicated through the Dedication Map.

WHEREAS, to achieve the original intent, EP Minerals, as successor in interest to Eagle Picher Minerals, Inc., and owner of Parcel 99-10, and Storey County, as owner of the right of way dedicated through the Dedication Deed, hereby agree to relocate the Future Roadway Easement in its entirety to coincide with Electric Avenue such that the access intended by the Future Roadway Easement shall hereafter be provided across and through Electric Avenue and the Future Roadway Easement shall merge into and be superseded by the public right of way dedicated by the Dedication Deed.

NOW, THEREFORE, EP Minerals hereby relocates and Storey County consents to the relocation of the entire portion of the Future Roadway Easement described in the 1999 Parcel Map running across Parcel 99-10 to the location known as Electric Avenue, described in Exhibit "A" hereto and depicted as "Parcel 2008-39" on the map attached hereto as Exhibit "A-1". The relocation of the easement area is made for the purposes of relocating and perpetuating access across Parcel 99-10 through Electric Avenue as originally intended by the 1999 Parcel Map, such access rights identified in the 1999 Parcel Map being merged into and hereafter superseded by the public right of way described in the Dedication Deed, and such rights superseding and replacing the prior grant of easement in the 1999 Parcel Map, all right, title and interest in the Future Roadway Easement area being hereby terminated in its entirety.







### Bill No. 126

### ORDINANCE NO. 20-315

### TITLE:

AN ORDINANCE BY WHICH THE STOREY COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS SHALL BECOME THE EX OFFICIO BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TRI GENERAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT PURSUANT TO NEVADA REVISED STATUTES CHAPTER 318 AND PROVIDING OTHER MATTERS PROPERLY RELATING THERETO.

### Recitals

WHEREAS, the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center ("TRI Center") is an area of partially developed land planned by the Storey County Master Plan to be a large industrial business park located in the northern portion of the County, which requires water and sewer service.

WHEREAS, NRS Chapter 318 authorizes a county to form a general improvement district to supply water and sewer services (among other allowed basic powers) to customers.

WHEREAS, a general improvement district offers the most economical and functional method of providing water and sewer services to the service area encompassing TRI Center.

WHEREAS, pursuant to NRS 318.055, the Board of County Commissioners of Storey County ("BCC") formed the TRI General Improvement District ("TRIGID") on February 1, 2000, pursuant to Ordinance #164 and subsequently modified TRIGID's basic powers (Ordinance #171 on August 8, 2001 and Ordinance #176 on June 5, 2001) so that TRIGID now furnishes water and sewer service.

WHEREAS, pursuant to NRS 318.080, after adopting the formation ordinance, and prior to appointing the first Board of Trustees, the BCC constituted the ex officio Board of Trustees for the District and, in that role, established accounting practices and procedures, auditing practices and procedures, a budget and management standards for TRIGID.

WHEREAS, pursuant to NRS 318.080, the BCC appointed the first Board of Trustees (the "Trustees") for TRIGID, and since that time, the Trustees have governed TRIGID to provide water and sewer service.

WHEREAS, Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center, LLC, as the master developer of TRI Center ("Master Developer"), had the responsibility to construct and dedicate to TRIGID water and sewer utility facilities for the initial build out of TRI Center, which it has largely completed.

WHEREAS, until June 30, 2020, TRIGID contracted with a private company, TRI Water and Sewer Company, a Delaware corporation controlled by the Master Developer ("Operating Company"), to operate the water and sewer facilities within TRIGID's service territory and to provide water and sewer service to TRIGID's customers.

WHEREAS, TRIGID and Master Developer entered into an exit agreement, approved by the TRIGID Board of Trustee on August 24, 2020, that sets forth their respective rights and responsibilities as the Master Developer winds down its involvement in the construction and operation of TRIGID, and as of July 1, 2020, TRIGID has taken over all operations from the Operating Company.

WHEREAS, NRS 318.080 requires that each Trustee be a qualified elector of the district, which means they must be residents of the TRIGID service area.

WHEREAS, because there is a limited population residing within TRIGID's service area, the number of qualified residents of the TRIGID service area who are eligible for service as a TRIGID trustee is very limited.

WHEREAS, due to the limited residential population within TRIGID's service area, TRIGID currently has two vacancies on the current Board of Trustees, which it cannot fill.

WHEREAS, in the event that any one of the current Trustees cannot attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, a quorum does not exist, and TRIGID cannot take any action to complete the business of the District.

WHEREAS, this situation poses a serious vulnerability to the secure and sustainable operations of TRIGID.

WHEREAS, due to their employment and other relationships with the Master Developer, the current members of the Board of Trustees may have potential or actual conflicts of interest with regard to certain matters that the Board must consider, which is unduly burdensome on TRIGID's operations and policy decisions.

WHEREAS, pursuant to NRS 318.0953, the BCC may at any time resume its role as the ex officio Board of Trustees of TRIGID by adopting an ordinance to that effect.

WHEREAS, pursuant to NRS 318.0953, should the BCC adopt such an ordinance, it becomes the board of TRIGID thirty days after the effective date the ordinance is adopted.

WHEREAS, at its regular meeting held on August 27, 2020, after discussion, upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously approved, TRIGID's Trustees passed a resolution

requesting that the BCC serve as the Ex-Officio Board of Trustees for TRIGID commencing on or about January 1, 2021.

WHEREAS, at a hearing during its regularly scheduled meeting on September 15, 2020, the BCC approved a modified service plan for TRIGID.

WHEREAS, the BCC considered the Trustees' request for the BCC to serve as TRIGID's Ex-Officio Board of Trustees at a hearing during the BCC's regularly scheduled meeting on November 17, 2020, which was held by teleconference in accordance with the Governor's Directive 006 related to social distancing criteria during the COVID-19 pandemic. The meeting agenda was properly noticed as required by law. All interested persons and members of the public were given the opportunity to comment via teleconference, after which the Board discussed and deliberated on the issue of governance.

NOW THEREFORE THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF STOREY COUNTY, NEVADA, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

### **SECTION 1:**

Proceedings were properly initiated and held for the BCC to become the Ex-Officio Board of Trustees of TRIGID pursuant to Chapter 318 of the Nevada Revised Statutes. The BCC is authorized and empowered under NRS Chapter 318, in addition to powers elsewhere conferred upon the BCC, to hear the request of the TRIGID Trustees and for the BCC to ordain itself the ex officio Board of Trustees of TRIGID.

### **SECTION 2:**

The Board of County Commissioners of Storey County hereby ordains itself and shall be the Ex-Officio Board of Trustees of TRIGID according to NRS Chapter 318. Pursuant to NRS 318.0953, the effective date of the BCC becoming the ex officio Board of Trustees of TRIGID shall be thirty days from the date of approval of this ordinance.

### **SECTION 3:**

Within this statutory 30-day period, the county clerk shall promptly cause a copy of this ordinance to be:

- a. Filed in the county clerk's office;
- b. Transmitted to the secretary of TRIGID; and
- c. Filed in the Office of the Secretary of State without the payment of any fee and otherwise in the same manner as articles of incorporation are required to be filed under NRS Chapter 78.

### **SECTION 4:**

At its first regularly scheduled meeting after the effective date of the BCC becoming the ex officio board of TRIGID, the BCC shall designate the persons who will serve as President, Vice-President and Secretary/Treasurer of TRIGID according to the requirements of NRS 318.09533.

### **SECTION 5:**

As the ex officio Board of Trustees of TRIGID, the BCC will hold the regular meetings of TRIGID during the regularly scheduled BCC meetings on the second Tuesday of every month, or at such other times and as it may determine according to the requirements of law.

### **SECTION 6:**

TRIGID shall maintain staffing levels and necessary contracts to operate independently of the County, including separate counsel and engineering services. Other than the change in governance made herein, nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to alter the current operations of TRIGID. TRIGID shall continue to operate according to its existing rules, regulations, policies, contracts, resolutions and other directives and approvals of the TRIGID Board of Trustees.

### **SECTION 7:**

The District shall maintain appropriate rates and fees for water, sewer, and reuse utilities in order to operate without any additional cost to the County.

### **SECTION 8:**

The description of the current boundaries of TRIGID is contained in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by reference made a part hereof, comprising the area commonly known as the Tahoe-Reno Industrial Center

### **SECTION 9:**

This Ordinance is based upon the following findings of the BCC:

- a. If the BCC elects to serve as the ex-officio Board of Trustees for TRIGID, TRIGID would be afforded greater security, functionality, and sustainability.
- b. This security could provide more opportunity for economic development and growth within the TRI Center, creating potential for increase in property values and related increase for ad-valorem revenues, to the overall benefit of the residents of Storey County.
- c. Because TRIGID is required to operate independently of the County and collect appropriate rates and fees for the services it provides to its customers, the BCC serving as the ex officio board of TRIGID will not impose additional costs on County residents or an undue burden on County resources.

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SECTION 10: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as prescribed by NRS 244.100.

This is a turnkey quote and there are no other known requirements to complete this project.

### **Conclusion:**

This project represents a major increase in VHF radio coverage for Storey County directly affecting public safety for the entire region. ### **JOB SUMMARY**

Under administrative direction of the Storey County Board of Fire Commissioners (board), the incumbent serves as the Storey County Fire Protection District (district) Chief and performs the duties and responsibilities outlined within NRS 474 all-inclusive. In addition to those statutory responsibilities, the chief shall ensure that the district runs as a modern and progressive all-risk/hazard response system through the utilization of a combination staffing pattern.

### **DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS**

This position is appointed by the board and reports to and serves at the pleasure of the board in an at-will capacity. This position manages all activities of the district and is accountable for accomplishing district goals and objectives and for furthering the goals and objectives of the board within general policy guidelines.

The district, as a combination fire district, is comprised of volunteer, seasonal/intermittent wildland, and permanent full-time staff. All-risk responses include all aspects of fire suppression, fire prevention, fire investigation emergency medical services, hazardous materials responses, technical rescue, motor vehicle accidents and rescue, fire preplanning, mapping and all other response areas. Programs within the all-risk district may include, but are not limited to, public education, community CPR, community fire education, and First-Aid training and public fire prevention. The chief oversees the interlocal agreement for fire investigation, code adoption and enforcement.

The position is also a critical component of furthering the county's goals and efforts toward economic development and vitality.

### **EVALUATION OF JOB PERFORMANCE**

The fire chief will be given a yearly evaluation by the board on the chief's annual anniversary. The board may evaluate the chief at other times as deemed appropriate. The

board may consider an increase in salary, including a merit increase consistent with the amount given unclassified personnel, and a possible performance based bonus. The administrative officer and/or personnel director is responsible for placing the review on the board's agenda, providing any legal notice, and providing material for the agenda package including salary comparisons and any material requested by the board. In accordance with Storey County (district) personnel policy, if a performance evaluation is not completed within 30 days of the employee's anniversary date it shall be considered a satisfactory performance evaluation and the personnel director/administrative officer shall authorize a step advancement retroactive to the employee's anniversary date.

#### **EXAMPLES OF ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS**

The duties listed below are examples of the work typically performed by an employee in this position. Performance of these functions is the reason the job exists. An employee may not be assigned all duties listed and may be assigned duties which are not listed below. All duties as listed within NRS 474 are inherently part of the essential functions of this position.

- 1. Develops, coordinates, and oversees all standard operating procedures, rules and regulations, policies and procedures, and general guidelines involved with a modern and progressive full service fire district; develops and implements goals, objectives, policies, procedures, and work standards for the district.
- Develops and maintains the district budget; estimates costs and budget needs for maintenance operations, construction, purchases, and repairs; prepares funding justification requests; monitors expenditures for budget conformance; accounts for budget expenditures and variances; prepares and presents information in oral and written form to the board; state, county and agency officials; and the public. Special areas of concern include the planning for and the purchase of appropriate and sufficient equipment necessary, including redundant equipment, to combat a fire at any given structure, wildland, vehicle or hazardous materials fire and incidents including, but not limited to, fire hose, rolling stock, appropriate PPE, nozzles, and everything required by the Insurance Services Organization, local government, and by state and federal mandates.
- 3. Manages and directs the activities of district staff; coordinates, prioritizes, and assigns tasks and projects; tracks and reviews work progress and activities; develops effective work teams and motivates individuals to meet district goals, objectives, and policies; directs the recruitment and selection of staff; undertakes disciplinary action as required; conducts performance evaluations; ensures appropriate scheduling of staff to ensure proper operational coverage; trains staff and provides for their professional development.
- 4. Confers with the board, advisory boards and commissions, citizen groups, county manager, and departments and agencies to formulate policies and plans related to

- the districts functions, community development, facilities, and other areas where needed.
- 5. Directs the procurement of professional contract services; negotiates professional services contracts; reviews the performance of contract professionals; takes and recommends corrective action to the board as appropriate.
- 6. Represents the district in local, state, and national forums; makes presentations before various advisory committees, legislative, regulatory, and community groups; confers with departments and agencies regarding departmental or countywide operational matters; facilitates problem resolutions and coordinated policies.
- 7. Directs and develops analytical studies; reviews reports, findings, alternatives, and recommendations; directs the maintenance of accurate records and files; prepares and directs the preparation of a variety of written correspondence, reports, procedures, and other written materials.
- 8. Drafts changes to laws and ordinance; lobbies and assists in lobbying efforts at the Nevada State Legislature and other bodies, provides supporting testimony as required.
- 9. Provides advice and consultation to the board, county manager, other departments and agencies, and contractors in district program areas and otherwise as needed; investigates and resolves complaints and concerns regarding services and facilities; acts as liaison with other counties and regional, state, and federal agencies regarding district facilities and services.
- 10. Prepares requests for proposals and bid requests for a wide variety of projects, equipment, and other purchases and expenditures; administers projects and purchase agreements; monitors projects and purchases for conformance with specifications; authorizes payments.
- 11. Acts on behalf of the district in meetings with developers, general contractors, engineers, architects, planners, land surveyors, prospective private companies, local and state entities, and companies proposing to build or locate in Storey County; maintains active involvement and coordination with the county team attracting, enhancing, and improving private enterprise and private-public partnerships in the county; liaises with community groups, property and homeowners associations, general improvement districts, and other community groups.
- 12. Stays abreast of all local, state, and federal laws, guidelines, trends, regulations, and any external or internal county policies and procedures that may have a direct impact to the district; uses this information to meet the district goals and objectives as well as to protect the county and district against being non-compliant with any one of these external agencies laws.
- 13. Oversees and assures that appropriate training programs are developed, implemented, and managed to meet all standards, policies/procedures, standing

- orders, rules and regulations, county and district policy, county ordinances, local laws, state laws, and federal laws.
- 14. Develops, implements, and manages progressive training systems and quality assurance programs to meet the highest performance levels in accordance with district goals, objectives, and policies.
- 15. Determines staffing requirements, including number of required firefighters, paramedics, captains, battalion chiefs, division chiefs, and other personnel to assure the appropriate levels of response; considers public safety needs and economies in determining staffing levels.

#### Staff report

V&T Freight Depot – Fire sprinklers and related structural work.

PWP# ST-2020-355

Evaluation of design-build proposals for the installation of a fire suppression system and related structural work in the V&T Freight Depot in Virginia City.

#### **Background**

The need for a fire suppression system in the V&T Freight Depot in Virginia City (Depot) has been known since before the County purchased the building in 2019. The fire that destroyed the Dayton Carson and Colorado depot only heightened the urgency for a system to be in-place.

The previous owner has moved all private property from the interior of the building and is working on the few remaining items on the exterior. The building is ready and accessible for the required work.

Due to the condition of the building, structural work is needed to facilitate the installation of a fire suppression system. Even with engaging design professionals to investigate the building who then produce a 'comprehensive' scope of work, we would not have a definite scope of work to bid against. The unique nature of the building and its unknowns present a challenge to that procedure. Any contractor engaged in this work would need to address discovered conditions and provide engineered solutions on-the-fly. A design-build approach was deemed to be in the best interest of the project.

Staff drafted a request for qualifications to solicit design-build teams and initial proposals. This was publicized on the Storey County Website as well as the Comstock Chronicle and ran from June 22 to June 29. We received one response during that time. Staff re-ran the solicitation from October 5 to October 9 and one additional response was received.

The solicitation was for statements of qualifications to select the best possible design-build team to address the required work.

#### Responses

Statements of qualifications were received from Sierra Builders of Nevada as well as Group West Construction. Both companies are licensed in Nevada and have good track records of completed projects. Both utilized a Nevada licensed fire suppression company registered with the State Fire Marshall. Both utilized a Nevada licensed structural engineer. Both companies have submitted statements that show compliance with NRS sections that are required as part of a design-build proposal under NRS 338.

The published request for qualifications included a section called "Factors and Weights" which laid out a weighting system that emphasized experience in working with State Historical Preservation

Office and the Comstock Historic District. Another emphasis area was in working with fire suppression in high-risk buildings. One design-build team excelled in these areas with a track record of similar projects.

#### Conclusions

Staff met to review and evaluate the submitted proposals against the requirements as set forth in the request for qualifications. Sierra Builders of Nevada submitted the best proposal in the opinion of our reviewers. Sierra Builders has an extensive track record of successful projects under the jurisdiction of SHPO. They also have a good track record of projects in the Comstock Historic District. Sierra Builders also had the lowest bid at \$152,550.00.

#### **Recommendations**

Staff recommends that the Board of County Commissioners authorize the County Manager to accept the proposal from Sierra Builders and execute an agreement with them for the installation of a fire suppression system and the related structural work in the Depot.

# PARTIAL HISTORIC/FORENSIC ENGINEERING EXPERIENCE:

Mr. Ferrari has extensive historic/forensic engineering investigation experience. Historic renovation engineering and forensic engineering investigation are very similar; both require considerable investigation of existing conditions before the renovation/strengthening engineering can begin. A representative sample of Mr. Ferrari's structural engineering experience in the structural strengthening of historic structures for adaptive reuse is listed below.

- St. Mary in the Mountains Catholic Church Seismic Retrofit, Virginia City, Nevada. St. Mary of the Mountains is the first Catholic Church established in the State of Nevada. The church, built in 1875, is constructed of unreinforced brick masonry walls that are 30' high. A historic preservation plan was prepared for the United States Park Services, in compliance with a grant for the project. The seismic retrofit will strengthen the superstructure of the building by inserting concrete reinforced columns into the thickness of the existing brick walls, reinforcing the roof structure, and reconstructing the original choir loft which was removed in the 1950's. The seismic strengthening will insert a competent lateral load system into the building, with little disruption to the historic fabric, and no disruption to the exterior historic fabric of the building. The completed project returned the building to its historic architecture while providing an integral structural seismic capability to the structure. The project was recognized with a Historic Building Seismic Safety award.
- Piper's Opera House Historic Structures Report (HSR), Virginia City, Nevada.
   A 2020 report for the State of Nevada Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) compiling the history of structural engineering repairs, retrofits, strengthening that has been undertaken on the building. The report will also outline recommend needed structural repairs, as well as a future blueprint for the use of the building.

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- Piper's Opera House Front Façade Restoration/Strengthening, Virginia City, Nevada. The front façade of the Pipers Opera House consists of unreinforced brick masonry the original 1863 front wall, and the 1877 arched façade addition. This composite front wall has deteriorated to the point where it was in danger of a catastrophic collapse. The fact that the main entry/exit for the productions presents an immediate life/safety threat. The hodgepodge geometry of the front wall section added to the complexity of the project. Mr. Ferrari engineered a reinforced concrete frame that would be installed behind the historic fabric of the 1877 façade, by removing brick from the 1863 wall and replacing it with competent structure. - Piper's Opera House general seismic upgrade, Virginia City, Nevada. Engineering analysis design of a retrofitted lateral load (wind and seismic) system into the historic fabric of the existing building. The retrofit was performed without impacting any historic structural fabric. The retrofit provided a lateral load system for the existing building.
- Piper's Opera House main floor strengthening and basement retrofit, Virginia City, Nevada. The existing main floor of the building was supported and reinforced to reverse structural degradation. Also, new engineering was performed to extend the existing basement further into the existing building footprint.
- Fourth Ward School seismic retrofit and basement wall stabilization, Virginia City, Nevada. The structural engineering scope of work for this series of projects involved the stabilization, underpinning and strengthening of the basement walls and foundation of the building, especially the southeast corner of the building which was in danger of collapsing. The seismic retrofit involved the installation of lateral shearwall system into the existing wall framing of the four-story wood superstructure.
- Delta Saloon Virginia City, Nevada. Reconstruction, repair, and stabilization of an 1879 two story brick building on C Street in Virginia City from the effects of a large propane explosion. The structural engineering included re-attachment of the roof joists, construction of new bearing walls, and stabilization of the brick walls (with Sierra Builders of Nevada Contractors).
- Northern Nevada Railroad Engine House, Ely Nevada. This unreinforced masonry
  and stone structure was built in the early 1900's as part of the Nevada Northern
  Railroad. The walls are in excellent condition. Mr. Ferrari has performed a structural

engineering review of the building to stabilize the building for anticipated earthquake lateral load forces. The main consideration is to attach the existing roof diaphragm to the masonry bearing walls to prevent the walls from "pulling away" during a seismic event; loss of wall support could cause the roof to collapse.

- Northern Nevada Railroad coach shed, Ely Nevada. This large, long wood frame structure was built in the early 1900's as part of the Nevada Northern Railroad. The walls are composed of a large amount of glazing. Over the years, the structure fell into disuse, and began leaning, in response to a lack of a transverse structural system to resist wind loads. The building eventually leaned 26 degrees from vertical, and was close to collapsing. Mr. Ferrari designed emergency shoring to stabilize the building, and then devised a method of straightening and strengthening the building. New transverse structural steel tube frames were integrated into the walls, and tied into the roof trusses to provide a complete lateral load system.
- Northern Nevada Railroad, Ely Nevada, general structural engineering review. The purpose of this report is to provide an inventory and "roadmap" for the various structures of the Railroad. The scope of the report included the coach shed, the engine house, and the coaling tower. The report classified the structural condition of the structures and listed a structural "triage" of the buildings in most need of structural renovation.
- St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Virginia City, Nevada. Built in 1858, this wood structure was one of the first churches on the Comstock. A seismic/lateral load emergency retrofit was undertaken to stabilize the wood truss arches supporting the building. A further lateral strengthening of the building is planned.
- Riverside Hotel restoration, Reno, Nevada. A retrofit of a six-story unreinforced masonry building with concrete floors. This project presented a significant challenge with regard to seismic stability of a tall historic structure. The challenge was met by integrating a reinforced concrete shotcrete surface at the interior face of the unreinforced brick masonry walls. This concrete "splint" at the interior of the building not only provided a competent lateral load resisting system, but reinforced the walls for loads perpendicular to the wall. The structural shotcrete surface at the interior of the building was finished to provide an architectural finished surface. Original estimates for the structural reinforcing of the building ranged to \$2,000,000. Throughout structural ingenuity, Mr. Ferrari was able to structurally retrofit the building for less than \$600,000.
- Structural Strengthening of the 1870 Washoe County Courthouse, Reno, Nevada. This interesting project involved the emergency seismic strengthening of an unreinforced brick building constructed in 1870. The walls were deteriorating to the point where a small seismic event could cause a "pancaking" of the roof, ceiling, and second floor of the building. If the building collapsed, it would block the main east/west and north/south exit ways for the entire courthouse complex. The project was made more difficult by the fact that the building had a large amount of asbestos in its crawlspace, and had to remain open to the public. The asbestos in the

crawlspace eliminated the traditional post-and-beam approach to strengthen the floor system. In response to these criteria, Mr. Ferrari developed an innovative "suspension system" whereby a large structural steel truss was installed over the roof of the 1870 building, and supported on very large existing concrete columns that were intended for an expansion that will never occur. The 20' deep 80' span truss was hidden behind the structure and facade of the existing courthouse complex, and is unseen from street level. Tie rods were then dropped down into the structure of the 1870 building, where they tied into a new concrete beam cast into the brick walls. The roof, ceiling, and floor structures were tied into this beam. When completed, the suspension system provided vertical support to the wood roof, ceiling, and second floor framing of the existing 1870 building. Even if the walls of the 1870 building were completely destroyed, the suspension system would prevent the pancaking failure of the building. allowing exiting from the structure. The retrofit was installed for only \$600,000. (versus an original estimate of \$1,500,000 for the original post and beam concept) and was installed during the weekends and nights, so that the normal functioning of the courthouse complex was not adversely affected.

- Seismic retrofit/renovation of the Centennial Fine Arts Center/Children's Museum (Civic Auditorium), Carson City, Nevada. This project included the structural strengthening of the exterior unreinforced brick masonry walls that support the roof structure. This historic retrofit was accomplished within the historic fabric of the existing construction. The retrofit strengthened the walls from out-of-plane seismic forces, and tied the roof diaphragm into the walls so that they were properly supported and could continue to provide vertical support for the clear-span roof.
- Yerington Elementary School, Yerington, Nevada. This large, three-story brick building was constructed in 1912. Eventually the building was abandoned as a school use. The City Council obtained funding to transform the building into a municipal auditorium. Not only was the building to be seismically stabilized, but a portion of the second floor was to be removed for auditorium seating. Mr. Ferrari developed a structural steel framing system that was integrated into the inside surface of the brick walls. The framing system provided vertical and lateral load capabilities, as well as out-of-plane strengthening for the unreinforced brick walls.
- Historic renovation/flood control for the Virginia Street Bridge, Reno, Nevada. This on-going project includes the structural renovation of the oldest reinforced concrete arched bridge (1905) between Denver and San Francisco. The renovation study also included the need to remodel the bridge (without altering its historic character) so that it can safely pass the 100 year Truckee River flood flow through the Downtown Reno corridor. A structures report was prepared for the United States Army Corp of Engineers.
- Bently Corporation Headquarters Building Seismic Retrofit/Restoration/Strengthening, Minden, Nevada. The new Bently headquarters building was a complete seismic retrofit, and mezzanine, roof penthouse and photovoltaic array addition to an existing 1912 two story historic brick building. Significant structural strengthening of the existing floor and roof framing was

required, including integrating difficult existing construction conditions into the final structural system. An extensive amount of structural shoring was required to accomplish the new architectural configuration of the interior of the building. This project required a tremendous amount on-site "boots-on-the-ground" field destructive investigation, existing condition review, and immediate response to unknown field conditions.

The preceding examples of Mr. Ferrari's historic restoration experience are just a portion of the over thirty historic projects that he has engineered. This experience in a historic structural renovation integrates a competent structural retrofit into the parameters of the historic fabric of the building. The result is a structurally sound building that reflects the historic architecture of the building, not the structural retrofit. Mr. Ferrari has a long history of working with the State Historic Preservation Office and the Comstock Historic Society.

# Subject Scope of Work for structural roof repair/strengthening

Michael, Based on my field observation of the distress in the Shore and support the canopy roof framing structure of the V&T Freight Depot outlined in my March 13<sup>th</sup> memo to you, the following scope of work is necessary to safely facilitate the removal of the existing roof shingles and the installation of a new plywood sheathing:

# Interior structural repairs/strengthening:

- Jack-up and support the second roof truss from the north wall of the depot so that the diagonal framing member at the west wall (from the side of the west column to the bottom of the truss chord) slotted end can be reinstalled into the existing tab at the bottom chord of the truss. Also, when the truss is supported by shoring, the existing "scabbed" splice at the east end of the bottom chord can be removed and replaced by a properly engineered and constructed splice plate to reinforce the existing cracked bottom chord
- New Simpson H2.5 uplift clips should be installed to attach the existing roof and canopy overhang rafters to the wall framing to resist wind uplift forces. A special connection should be installed at the intermediate vertical "column" in the wall framing between the roof truss supporting columns. This connection from the column to the roof will reinforce the wall from wind loads.

# Roof framing repair/strengthening

- Repair/reconstruct the southeast and southwest canopy overhang corners that are currently sagging from cracked and disjointed structural members and connections.
- Shore and support the end of the roof canopy framing so that the sags in the canopy overhang are removed and a level eave line is achieved. New framing joists should be inserted into the sagged areas to that when the shoring is removed, the new joists will cancel the sag.

If you have any questions regarding this scope of work, please do not hesitate to contact me. The preceding scope of work is intended only to create a situation so that workers can safely remove the existing shingles and install new plywood roof sheathing so that new shingles can be installed.

#### **Business Impact Statement**

The following business impact statement was prepared pursuant to NRS 237.090 to address the proposed impact of the ordinance adopting the diesel tax.

1. The description of the manner in which comment was solicited from affected business, a summary of their responses and an explanation of the manner in which other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary:

The county manager's office mailed on November 16, 2020, or before, a copy of the business impact statement with attached exhibit A, Process to object to Rule Causing a Business Impact and a sample petition objecting to the adoption of a rule, to the following: Carson Valley Oil Co., Flyers Energy LLC, Golden State/S.E.T. Petroleum Partners of Nevada, and Inter-State Oil Co., and has copies available at the counter of the clerk's office and on the Storey County website.

The Board of County Commissioners on November 17, 2020, proposed an ordinance to impose a diesel fuel tax in the amount of 5 cents per gallon. The material presented include the draft business impact statement and the ordinance. The public hearing on the second reading of the ordinance on December 1, 2020 will consider any comments from potentially affected businesses.

2. The estimated economic effect of the proposed rule on businesses, which it is to regulate, without limitation, both adverse and beneficial; and both direct and indirect effects:

#### a. Adverse effects:

The approval of the diesel tax will increase the cost of purchasing diesel fuel in Story County by 5 cents per gallon.

#### b. Beneficial effects:

A portion of the diesel tax revenue will be used by the Nevada Department of Transportation to create highway truck parking areas in Storey County.

The rest of the diesel tax revenue will be used to maintain or improve roads within Storey County.

#### c. Direct effects:

The diesel tax will improve the roads and highway truck parking in Storey County.

#### d. Indirect effects:

None known at this time.

3. The description of the methods that the governing body of the local government or its designee considered to reduce the impact of the proposed rule on businesses and a statement regarding whether the governing body or its designee actually used any of the methods:

The county manager, on behalf of the board, concluded the ordinance adoption could not really be simplified but that that all businesses should be treated the same.

The county manager estimates no additional cost to enforce the diesel tax as it is similar to the enforcement of the existing gas tax

- 2. The Board of County Commissioners will accept such petitions for a period of thirty (30) days following approval of the subject Rule for one of the following reasons:
  - (a) The governing body failed to prepare a business impact statement as required pursuant to Chapter 237 of NRS; or
  - (b) The business impact statement prepared by the governing body did not consider or significantly underestimated the economic effect of the ordinance or rule on the business.
- 3. Upon receipt of the petition, the Clerk/Treasurer will forward a copy to the Storey County District Attorney, the department/agency/office that generated the Rule, and the Storey County Manager.
- 4. Staff will consider the merits of the petition and forward a recommendation to the Board of County Commissioners.
- 5. The Board of County Commissioners will determine if the petition has merit and direct staff accordingly.

#### Title

An ordinance amending Storey County Code chapter 3.76 Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax-Road Repair by imposing a tax on special fuel that consists of diesel fuel sold in Storey County and providing for other properly related matters.

The Board of County Commissioners of the County of Storey, State of Nevada, does ordain:

**SECTION I**: Chapter 3.76 is amended as follows:

#### Chapter 3.76 Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax-Road Repair

- 3.76.010 Tax imposed.
- 3.76.020 Proceeds use.
- 3.76.030 Date of imposition.
- 3.76.040 State provisions included.
- 3.76.050 Amendments to state provisions included

#### 3.76.010 Tax imposed.

<u>A.</u> Pursuant to the authority of Nevada Revised Statutes, section 365.192 et al., it is ordained that provision for the imposition and collection of a tax on motor fuel of one cent per gallon be made.

B. A five cent per gallon tax is imposed on diesel fuel sold in Storey County.

#### 3.76.015 Payment of tax.

Every dealer must:

A. Pay an excise tax of one cent on all motor vehicle fuel sold, distributed or used in the manner and within the time prescribed in Nevada Revised Statutes chapter 373.

B. Pay an excise tax of five cents per gallon on all diesel fuel sold, distributed or used in the manner and within the time prescribed in Nevada Revised Statutes chapter 373.

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#### 3.76.020 Proceeds use.

The tax proceeds may be used solely for the repair or restore existing paved roads, streets and alleys, other than those maintained by the federal government and this state by resurfacing, overlaying, resealing or such customary methods.

#### 3.76.030 Date of imposition.

<u>A.</u> The Storey County motor vehicle fuel tax shall <u>must</u> be imposed on the first day of the second calendar month following the approval of the ordinance codified in this chapter by the voters of Storey County.

B. The diesel tax imposed by this chapter becomes effective on the first day of the second calendar month following enactment following the enactment of the ordinance imposing or changing the diesel tax.

#### 3.76.040 State provisions included.

All applicable provisions of the Nevada Revised Statutes, Chapter 365, are made a part of this chapter.

#### 3.76.050 Amendments to state provisions included.

All amendments to chapter 365, Nevada Revised Statutes, which are not inconsistent with this chapter, shall automatically become part of this chapter as long as the amendments are enacted after the effective date of the subject ordinance.
