- 9. DISCUSSION ONLY (No Action No Public Comment): Committee/Staff Reports Erik Schoen, Community Chest Director:
 - The "holiday food program" is ramped up with a lot of donations.
 - The before and after school programs will be closed during the holidays, aligning with the school schedule.
 - The early childhood education center will be open except the week of Christmas.

James Deane, IT Director:

The fiber circuit at the new dispatch center is up and functioning.

Dave Ballard, Communications Director:

• Waiting for AT&T to install the new phone system at the Communications Center - everything will be live once that is done.

Deny Dotson, VCTC Director:

- The VCTC will continue a strong marketing campaign for the rest of December activities although a lot of special events had to be "curbed".
- People realize that Virginia City is a special place and is still "alive and well".
- Thanks to the Public Works team for putting up the lights across C Street.
- There was a "light" contest for the businesses which received a lot of comments from visitors.
- Many thanks to Tom Gray who invested a lot in the "train with lights". It made so many people happy and was a very special thing to do.
- Looking at the first quarter obviously they cannot do to much and are adjusting accordingly. Details will be made available the first week of January.
- Thank you Chairman McBride for your service . You have been a huge supporter of the VCTC.

Chairman McBride: Thank you for the advertising being done by (VCTC) staff under this Covid 19 pandemic. The ads, with videos, on television are terrific. There is a billboard in Reno advertising Virginia City as well. Following the Governor's guidelines - we still need people to know that we are open for business. You are doing a terrific job with this.

Lara Mather, Community Relations Director:

- Most of her time is being spent on Covid related matters.
- As part of Community Relations, she would like to reach out to County businesses and encourage them to contact her with any questions at all with regard to how the County can help with options that are available.

Mike Nevin, Water/Sewer Project Manager:

- Gold Hill Wastewater project:
 - o All required documentation has been received back from SNC Construction.
 - o Documents have been delivered to the USDA for final review and concurrence.
 - o Once approval is received, the notice to proceed can be issued to the contractor.
 - o With the holidays coming, the contractor wants to mobilize equipment to the site the first week of January to begin construction activities January 11th.
 - o The package plant has been delivered.
 - o There is a 120-day construction timeline for this project.
- Hillside Water Tanks project:
 - o Tank one is mostly constructed and is about ready for the coating process on the interior and exterior.
 - o There have been a few delays with previously mentioned damage taken care of.

Joe Curtis, Emergency Management Director:

- Current Covid case numbers for the County: 65 cases total 27 active; 35 recovered; and 2 deaths.
- The County's positivity rate is 3.3% the lowest in the State, next to Eureka County. The only two counties not "flagged" by the Governor as potential problematic areas.
- Covid testing site will be held tomorrow in Lockwood 12PM to 2PM. December 30 in Virginia City, 12 to 2PM.

- Flu shots are no longer available.
- Vaccinations have started arriving. The planning process on how to distribute vaccinations has begun. This may begin on December 30th at the testing location and will be for first response personnel.
- There are three tiers for vaccinations:
 - o Tier one primarily for "front line" personnel and long-term facilities;
 - o Tier two essential business workers. Who this is is still being determined. Some businesses in the industrial park are considered "essential" having to do with the food chain or delivery of essential materials.
 - o Tier three the general public. This will create major time demands for those setting up distribution sites.
 - o A lot of information is still "up in the air". Being part of the Quad-County coalition, anyone in the four counties can go to any site in the four counties.

Agenda Item #17 heard at this point.

Mr. Curtis continued:

- o It looks like Tier One will begin on the 30th, 9am to 11am "first responder" vaccinations.
- o Tier Two will likely be around the middle of January.
- o The County's paramedics have been trained to provide vaccinations throughout the County and possibly the Quad-Counties.
- o Things could change from time to time.
- o At this time, Walgreens and CVS are giving vaccinations to long-term care facilities only.
- o Community Chest is waiting for clearance to potentially provide vaccinations.
- o Go to <u>immunizeNevada.com</u> for additional information.

Chairman McBride asked if there is a process where the most vulnerable would be vaccinated first. If someone is currently infected, is it recommended that they recover before being vaccinated?

Mr. Curtis: Appointments for vaccinations have been discussed - this is a possibility with Tiers 2 and 3. Also, there may be only certain amounts available on site. When vaccinated you will have to sit somewhere or in your car for 15 minutes to insure there is no reaction. I believe a person will be able to be vaccinated if they had Covid previously. A lot of the process is still in "flux". He has not seen a specific plan for "age factor".

Lara Mather explained that vaccinations are the responsibility of Carson City Health & Human Services (CCH&HS). They will handle all coordination - reaching out to everyone, advising when vaccinations will be available to the general public. They are keeping (the County) "in the loop" with hour-to-hour changes. Anyone with questions on vaccinations is encouraged to reach out to CCH&HS.

Commissioner Gilman: As a County, he hopes we would have the flexibility to select who is vaccinated first. (The County) has such a large senior population, especially in Lockwood area. If there is flexibility, he proposes thinking about putting all seniors first.

Mr. Curtis: This is a good point that would need to be discussed with CCH&HS. We are probably a month or more away from that point.

Jeff Nevin, Fire Chief:

- About 1/3 of (Fire Department) employees are able to give vaccinations. They can help in anyway they can when vaccinations are available.
- Burning has started on the large vegetation pile in the Highlands.
- They have received 6 electro-static sprayers to de-contaminate ambulances and fire stations. Stations will be sprayed every 48 hours, and ambulances each time there is a suspected positive case.

Austin Osborne, County Manager:

- The Community Center, the Lockwood Senior Center, and the tower road projects are moving along. Public outreach will begin in the Lockwood Senior Center shortly.
- Mr. Northan reports that work on the Justice Center is looking really good. Carpet should be in the beginning of January.

10. BOARD COMMENT (No Action - No Public Comment)

Vice Chairman Carmona:

• Having fireworks the last two weekends was great for the Christmas season. Response on social media was outstanding - hopefully we can do this next year. Thank you to the VCTC for scheduling this.

Chairman McBride agreed - there were a lot of positive feedbacks, terrific job.

Chairman McBride:

- This is his last regular-scheduled meeting chairing this Board, after being on the Commission for the last 7 years. He really appreciates this job and loves Storey County.
- Chair McBride described how, when first elected, Storey County was just coming out of the recession. There was reduction of staff and closure of the fire station in TRI. The high school library had been closed. All due to lack of funding.
- A new library has been opened with the assistance of Community Chest.
- Staffing levels are back to normal, with public safety being the most important.
- New fire engines and ambulances have been purchased. And hopefully new patrol cars.
- Studies have been done on flood control and water, and the work behind (those studies) has been done.
- Massive road projects have been done throughout the County. Along with big infrastructure projects, including water and sewer projects "on the hill".
- We have come a long way in the last 8 years it's been a terrific ride.
- Over these years, he spoke at a Firemen Convention, an Assessor's conference, Eagles Convention, along with many others. When giving talks, he has had the opportunity to talk about Storey County. This county has the best elected officials, department heads, and staff of any government in the State of Nevada operating as a team and doing a terrific job.
- Chair McBride said he is proud of everyone who works for the County and those who have retired since he has been here.
- Going forward, tourism has to continue. It's been remarkable the last 8 years.
- Even though we're going through the pandemic now, we will recover especially now that there's a vaccine.

- The growth in the industrial park the last few years has been phenomenal. Continuing the growth in the park gives (the County) the tax base needed to in order to afford the services and supplies provided to its residents. There's a small tax base in Virginia City, but the industrial park is where it's at.
- He is confident, going forward, the County will continue to work with new businesses coming
 in. It is important for Storey County to maintain its economy by being a county, a
 government, and having its own school district. Funds from a stable tax base will keep (the
 County) where it's at. And, not to be absorbed by a larger county.
- Being born, raised and living in Virginia City he is not going anywhere. Chair McBride said he will continue to operate the family business that's been in his family for 90 years. He will be available for any assistance needed.
- **11. DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION:** Review and possible approval of Storey County Audited Financial Statements for the year ended June 30, 2020 completed by DiPietro and Thornton.

Note: There is difficulty understanding Mr. Costanza via his zoom connection.

Joe Costanza of DiPietro and Thornton, reviewed the County's audited financial statements prepared by his firm. Revenues exceeded expenses by \$5,602,00 at the end of the fiscal year. There was a decline in revenues in 2019 and 2020 - the main factor being bond proceeds. County-wide, departments reduced expenses by \$5,156,00 in 2019/2020.

Mr. Costanza commented that there was nothing really "out of whack" with this year's financial statements. Revenues are down quite a bit which are affected by projects, such as the water/sewer projects. There is also a (revenue) decrease due to not having special events.

Revenues are up even though they are down quite a bit. Grants were also down.

Having everything digital has helped his job as well as the Comptroller's Office.

Mr. Costanza reviewed the sewer department (difficult to hear) as well as other departments.

- Mr. Costanza also discussed three suggestions for improvement (which are given each) year:
 - Recommend the County put in procedures to close the books each month on a timely basis;
 - Recommend County staff continue to obtain training in the preparation of financial statements and related financial statement disclosures in order to gain the knowledge needed to prepare the financial statements and related financial statement disclosures in all material respects;
 - o Recommend the County review the Accounts Receivables from ambulance service monthly and check for accuracy and collectability.

Comptroller Jennifer McCain said she agrees with the comments. (Difficult to understand). She is thankful to Mr. Costanza for the help with the changeover in the Comptroller's Office.

County Manager Osborne also thanked Mr. Costanza who has been great to work with.

Commissioner Gilman: He is so pleased and takes this report as very positive for the County. He is glad that Ms. McCain is there and that she is working with Mr. Costanza, and believes this is a very positive report. Thank you.

Vice Chairman Carmona: Feels very confident in the Comptroller's Office.

Chairman McBride: Storey County had been with an auditor for years - after changing to Mr. Costanza's firm, this is the first time in his 8 years an audit has come in on time. In Mr. Costanza's audit every year, there will be notes to improve the County's reporting. This will always be there because improvements always need to be done. He is very happy with Mr. Costanza's firm and how well they work with the County. Thank you to Mr. Costanza and his team for everything they do for Storey County.

Ms. Mather: He is not - however they have had a conversation about the contract.

The proposed plan contains items that meet specific NRS qualifications and we feel that these items - including the new Justice Center, further upgrades to the water system, road projects in several areas of the County, and community development projects - money would be widespread across the county.

Special Counsel Robert Morris presented this item. Based on the hearing of the business impact statement and the first reading of the Ordinance - it is clear what (the amendments) set out to do. Mr. Morris encouraged the Board to adopt the second reading.

Commissioner Gilman - stated his position at the last Commission meeting, being 100% in favor. With TRI expanding and the amount of truck traffic, this will potentially be a significant revenue stream for the County.

Vice Chairman Carmona: He would like to see the diesel tax decided by the voters during the next election process. In Carson City he did speak in favor about the opportunity to have this tax and that he would like to see this go out to voters for a final decision.

Chairman McBride said he respects Commissioner Carmona's decision. Chair McBride spoke at the last two legislative sessions in favor of a motor fuel tax for the 15 rural counties left out of collection. It was approved at the second run through the Legislature. County staff has previously done "legwork" on this issue. The County has never increased the gasoline tax - now there is opportunity to increase the diesel fuel tax. He agrees residents should have the opportunity to vote on a lot of items - unless (the County) was "maxed out" on property tax (we're not) - going to the voters to increase their own taxes they're going to say no. This diesel tax will have a small impact on Storey County residents - there are not many registered diesel fuel vehicles in the county. Most of the impact will be in the industrial park where trucks are constantly in and out. Those trucks are damaging the roads which need to repaired by County taxpayers. That is why he is in favor of this tax.

30. PUBLIC COMMENT (No Action)

Chair McBride: For those who follow State government, the Legislature will convene in February. The Governor's Economic Board who puts together forecasting revenues for the State, has come back to him - saying they can expect a reduction of at least 5% tax revenues. The economic forum is always extremely positive - but normally wrong. There are huge discrepancies in sales tax, use tax, gaming tax, room tax, and modified business tax. They are asking their departments to come in with a budget of less than 12% from the last bi-inium - even after the spring adjustment for the shortfall out of the "rainy-day" fund. The State is looking at very serious revenue shortfalls going forward - when the State runs out of money, they start looking at the Counties to re-allocate funds. Department heads and elected officials need to be very strict and stringent on their budgets going forward next year. There is no way around revenue shortfall - most of the businesses in the State have been running at 50% capacity, now reduced to 25%. We'll see a significant drop in tax revenues. That's what we have to look forward to this (next) year. Rebound may take a year or two. Merry Christmas, stay safe, wash hands and social distance.

Meeting was called to order by Commissioner McBride at 10:00 A.M.

3. DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION: Approval of Special Meeting Agenda for December 30, 2020.

Motion: I make a motion to approve the Agenda for December 30, 2020, **Action:** Approve, **Moved by:** Vice Chairman Carmona, **Seconded by:** Commissioner Gilman, **Vote:** Motion carried by unanimous vote, (**Summary:** Yes=3)

- **5. DISCUSSION ONLY (No Action-No Public Comment):** Committee/Staff Reports No committee or staff reports.
- 6. BOARD COMMENT (No Action No Public Comment): No Board comments.

7. DISCUSSION/POSSIBLE ACTION: Discussion and possible approval for District Attorney's Office to commence such action as that office sees fit to determine the status of all or part of Long Valley Road and to name as defendants/respondents in such suit such person(s) as the District Attorney's office may choose.

District Attorney Anne Langer explained this is request for authorization to potentially file a lawsuit to determine the nature of Long Valley Road. There has been dispute for some time as to whether or this is a public or private road. In a lawsuit where the County is a party, the District Attorney's Office has to request authorization and support. This is the first time in six years where the District Attorney is requesting authorization to file a lawsuit on behalf of the County. This is based on, despite numerous attempts, determination needs to be made on whether Long Valley Road is a 2477 road. Clarification is needed from a Court of law.

Commissioner Carmona: To clarify, will this go before a Judge for a decision?

Ms. Langer: If suit is filed, a determination will be made by a court of law.

Commissioner Carmona asked if the Judge will make the final call on ownership.

Ms. Langer: Yes.

Sheriff Antinoro commented he is in support of getting clarification.

Public Comment:

Nicole Barde, Storey County resident: Who will be (named) in the lawsuit?

District Attorney Langer: A determination on the actual caption has not yet been made - the question cannot be answered at this time.

Chairman McBride: There's been controversy regarding Long Valley Road for many years, including people closing that road. He agrees with the District Attorney there is need to get final resolution on ownership of the road. We've been advised that tensions have escalated in that neighborhood. It's prudent for this Board to go forward and work with the District Attorney in getting final resolution.

Guy Necoche: Why is (the County) trying to determine whether his road is private or public?

Chair McBride: If it's a public road - it's open to anyone who wants to use it at any time. If privately owned, a person has the right to close it off.

District Attorney Langer: There has been a lot of controversy over this road the last couple of years. After looking at various remedies, (the County) is asking a Court of Law to intervene to determine whether (the road) is a public (2477) road or a private road.

Mr. Necoche: Still, no one has said why this is being done.

Chair McBride: As said earlier, tensions have escalated in that neighborhood, bringing us to this decision to decide whether to take legal action necessary to determine whether it's privately or publicly held.

Mr. Necoche: What is the purpose of it being public or private? The people who live there, own property there - correct?

Chair McBride: The first question has been answered. If it's public property - a private individual has no right to limit access to that road.

Mr. Necoche: There is no limited access on that road right now. There has been no problem driving up to his property. What is "behind the scenes" that (the County) needs this determination?

Ms. Langer: It's not anything behind the scenes - it' simply to determine whether it's public and people can have public access. There are varying decisions from different people in the County-at this point it will go forward to have a Court make the determination. Then there will be no question.

Mr. Necoche: He has heard that (the County) wants to use Long Valley Road as a road to the business park. Is that correct?

Chair McBride: That's not what we're to discuss. But, in answer: No, the County does not have intentions to improve this road to Lockwood or to TRI. This is simply to determine if this is a privately or publicly owned road - that is only being thing being talked about.

Joseph Bowman: Is this putting the "cart before the horse" with a lawsuit without doing historical research. Why hasn't the County hired a firm to do the research on the roads as they are?

Chair McBride: Someone has been hired to do that and we believe we have the information necessary to go forward with this action.

Mr. Bowman said he has done a lot of research on roadways in the area - from the summary (with this action), it is inaccurate. But we'll wait for the Court.

Mr. Necoche: If it is determined this is public - what are the consequences?

Chair McBride: It simply means that no one would be able to restrict access to that road - unless the County had to close it for any reason. Otherwise, the road would stay open - unobstructed. If that is how the Court decides.

Gary Mack: Based on the last comment, there are no consequences - he understands the idea of a public road - that access couldn't be restricted. Those who do have property in this area and who want to maintain that road for access - if it is a public road, will we be forbidden to maintain it?

Chairman McBride: The roads in the Highlands, outside of Lousetown and Cartwright - are all privately owned by the homeowners associations. The homeowners can do whatever they want to the roads.

Mr. Mack: The property owners need to maintain this road - is there going to be any concern if (homeowners) do continue to plow, add gravel, or maintain Long Valley Road?

Chair McBride said that's a good question - he is not prepared to answer it at this time. For individuals to maintain a publicly-owned road, he is not sure what the rules or consequences could be - if any. People have maintained parts of the road for access to their own property. Around Virginia City as well, when there were limited resources to move snow, private owners of snowplows did so. This has not been an issue in the past, he does not foresee this being an issue in the future.

This would be something to ask after resolution from the Court on ownership of the road is received.

STOREY COUNTY INVESTEMENT POLICY

Philosophy

It is the philosophy of the Storey County Treasurer to invest with safety, liquidity and yield, in that order of priority, to take advantage of safe investment opportunities. All investments made by this office are strictly governed by written policy and are in accordance with Nevada Revised Statutes 355.170 and 355.171.

Investment of funds is made with the judgment and care under current prevailing circumstances that persons of prudence, discretion, and intelligence would exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of capital, as well as probable income to be derived, and optimum liquidity required for operation.

Investment Planning

- A. Payment of County Obligations
 - 1. The foremost consideration of the investment plan is to ensure that adequate funds are available to meet the County's financial obligations as they become due.
- B. Term of Investment
 - 1. The length of investment is generally dictated by the number of the County's obligations and the time at which they will come due.
 - 2. Maximum maturity of investments is 5 years (except for mortgages which will be bought with a maximum average life of 3 years)

Delegation of Authority

Under authority delegated by the Board of County Commissioners, in accordance with NRS 355.175, the investment of County funds is the responsibility of the County Treasurer. This responsibility includes the authority to open accounts with financial institutions and broker/dealers, to arrange for the custody of securities and to execute such documents as may be necessary to carry out this responsibility.

Permitted Investments and Utilization

- A. The State of Nevada Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP) managed by the office of the State Treasurer
- B. U.S. Treasury obligations which carry the full faith and credit guarantee of the United States government (State Law allows maturity up to 10 years).
- C. U.S. government agency and instrumentality obligations that have a liquid market with a readily determinable market value (State Law allows maturity up to 10 years);
- D. Certificates of deposit and other evidences of deposit which are issued by commercial

- banks or insured savings and loan associations rated in the highest tier by a nationally recognized rating agency. Maturities of any CD cannot exceed 5 years from the date of purchase.
- E. Commercial paper, rated in the highest tier (e.g., A-1, P-1, F-1, or D-1 or higher) by a nationally recognized rating agency and may not exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of the Investment Portfolio and no more than 5 percent of the total par value of the portfolio may be invested in one corporate issuer.
- F. Investment-grade obligations of state, provincial and local governments and public authorities;
- G. Repurchase agreements whose underlying purchased securities consist of the aforementioned instruments;
- H. Money market mutual funds regulated by the Securities and Exchange Commission and are rated by a nationally recognized rating service as "AAA" or its equivalent and only in securities issued by the Federal Government or agencies of the Federal Government or in repurchase agreements fully collateralized by such securities.
- I. Bonds, notes or other obligations issued or unconditionally guaranteed by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the International Finance Corporation or the InterAmerican Development Bank that Is denominated in United States dollars; Is a senior unsecured unsubordinated obligation; At the time of purchase has a remaining term to maturity of 5 years or less; and Is rated by a nationally recognized rating service as "AA" or its equivalent, or better, may not, in aggregate value, exceed 15 percent of the total par value of the portfolio as determined at the time of purchase.
- J. Bonds, notes or other obligations publicly issued in the United States by a foreign financial institution, corporation or government that: Is denominated in United States dollars; Is a senior unsecured unsubordinated obligation; Is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission in accordance with the provisions of the Securities Act of 1933, §§ 77a et seq., as amended; Is publicly traded; Is purchased from a registered broker-dealer; At the time of purchase has a remaining term to maturity of 5 years or less; and is rated by a nationally recognized rating service as "AA" or its equivalent, or better, except that investments pursuant to this paragraph may not, in aggregate value, exceed 10 percent of the total par value of the portfolio as determined at the time of purchase.

The following investment are allowed under NRS 355.171 through an investment advisor who is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission and approved by the State Board of Finance.

- K. Corporate Bonds that are rated by a nationally recognized rating service at "A" (or its equivalent) or better and may not exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of the Investment Portfolio and no more than 5 percent of the total par value of the portfolio may be invested in one corporate issuer.
- L. Collateralized mortgage obligations that are rated by a nationally recognized rating service as "AAA" or its equivalent.
- M. Asset-backed securities that are rated by a nationally recognized raring service as "AAA" or its equivalent.

Collateralized mortgage obligations and Asset-backed securities in aggregate value must not exceed 20 percent of the total portfolio as determined on the date of purchase.

** For corporate bonds and commercial paper, if the rating is reduced below the rating requirements above, the investment advisor must, as soon as possible, report the reduction in the rating to the governing body of the local government that purchased the investment.

Utilization of Financial Institutions, Local Governments and Investment Advisors

- A. It is the policy of the Storey County Treasurer to utilize the services of in-state financial institutions whenever possible, but is not limited to those institutions.
- B. The County Treasurer is authorized to hire an investment manager and delegate investment discretionary authority to a third party or investment manager. The investment manager is to make investments for Storey County only in investments as allowed by Nevada Revised Statutes and also under the guidelines of the current investment policy. The purpose of this authority is to enhance yields using longer term U.S. Treasury and Agency securities through a professional broker-manager.

Other Considerations

- A. Financial Institution Limitations and Restrictions
 - 1. It is the policy of the Storey County Treasurer to reserve the right to place a limit on the amount of investments placed with any one financial institution. Each situation must and will be considered individually.
- B. Delivery of Collateral
 - 1. In the interest of adequate protection of public funds, it is the policy of this office to require delivery of all securities on all deposits made by the County.
- C. Apportionment of Interest
 - 1. It is the policy of the Storey County Treasurer that interest shall be apportioned to the following funds based on the ending fund balance each quarter: Water (090), Sewer (130), Roads (020), Equipment Acquisition (060), Technology (165) Park (190), Fire (250) Fire Capital Projects (280) and County (001).



SUBJECT: Rates of Pay

- PURPOSE: To establish a policy on rates of pay
- 2. POLICY:

2.1 Compensation Plan

Each regular position will be assigned to a class and pay grade in the compensation plan. Assignment to a pay grade will be based on the relative level and complexity of the duties, responsibilities, and authority of the job. The HR Director shall determine the salary ranges based on these considerations

- a. Rates paid by the employer for comparable work;
- b. Internal relationships of other job classes in the same or similar occupation;
- c. Rates paid by other employers for comparable work;
- d. Other financial commitments of the employer, and
- e. Funds available to the employer for salaries.

The HR Director, subject to approval of the County Commission and to the terms of any applicable collective bargaining agreement, may adjust the minimum and maximum for each salary range periodically as changes in any of the factors listed above occur or to recruit and retain qualified employees for each job.

2.2 Hiring Rate of Pay

The normal hiring rate for new employees is the first step of the pay range for the position's classification. The HR Director may authorize advanced step appointments in accordance with Section 2.3.

2.3 Advanced Step Hire

Fairness and equity in the administration of the compensation plan will be maintained when making advanced step hires for new employees. The HR Director, with concurrence from the County Manager and when funds are determined to be available by the Comptroller, may authorize advanced step appointments when all of the following circumstances exist:

- The applicant's qualifications indicate that s/he will perform at a level commensurate with the requested step;
- Other applicants with similar qualifications not requiring an advanced level salary are unavailable; and

- c. Funds are available in the hiring department's budget to pay the higher rate.
- d. Advanced hire rate will not exceed the step commonsurate with current employees of comparable education, experience, and skill levels.

2.4 Flat Rate Salaries


Certain job classes may be assigned to flat rates of pay in the compensation plan. Employees in classes assigned to a flat rate of pay are not eligible for step increases.

2.5 Casual (Intermittent Part-Time) Worker Rate of Pay

The employer will pay casual workers as appropriate for the type of work performed. Students receiving school credit for work may be paid at a rate established by the HR Director for student interns. The HR Director may adjust the rate of pay consistent with the procedures for inerit rate of pay increases as provided in Policy 507.

2.6 Salary on Promotion, Transfer, Demotion, Reclassification, and Reallocation

- a. Except as may otherwise be provided by a collective hargaining agreement, a regular employee who is promoted to a new classification will move to that step in the range for the new class which provides no less than 5 percent pay increase from the employee's current regular rate of pay, not to exceed the top step in the range for the new class. A promoted employee's salary shall not be less than the starting pay of the salary range for the new position. A promoted employee's adjusted pay shall be effective on the date so indicated in the offer letter and accepted by the employee.

An employee who is at a Y-rate which is between the steps of the range for the new (lower) class shall continue to receive the Y-rate until a change in the rate of pay for the employee causes the rate for the step in the range to which the employee is entitled to exceed his/her current rate of pay.

Employees who are Y-Rated will be eligible to receive approved cost of living adjustments for the class they hold.

2.8 Discussion of Wages

NRS 613.330 states it is unlawful to d'scriminate against an employee for inquiring about, discussing, or voluntarily disclosing information about wages. This does not apply to any employee who has access to or information about the wages of other employees as part of their essential job functions and discloses that information to a person who does not have access to that information unless the disclosure is ordered by the Labor Commissioner or court.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR REVIEW: The HR Director will review this policy every 5 years or sooner as necessary.

SUBJECT: Definition of Terms

1. Definition of Terms

POLICY: The terms used in these policies shall have the meanings defined below:

Alcohol: The intoxicating agent in beverage alcohol, ethyl alcohol, or other low molecular weight alcohol including methyl and isopropyl alcohol.

Alcohol Use: The drinking or swallowing of any beverage, liquid mixture, or preparation (including any medication) containing alcohol.

Allocation The assignment of a single position to its proper classification on the basis of the duties performed and responsibility assigned.

Administrative Leave: Authorized leave for administrative purposes, such as for conducting an investigation which may be with or without pay, at the option of the employer

Adulterated Specimens: A specimen is considered adulterated if it contains a substance that is not a normal constituent or contains an endogenous substance at a concentration that is not a normal physiological concentration

Anniversary Date: The date on which the employee starts work as indicated in-writing in an offer of employment, is reclassified or promoted to a new job classification, or a less than parttime or regular part-time employee becomes a full-time employee. The date on which an employee is demoted to a lower pay range, reassigned, or transferred to alternative positions where their talents or skills maybe best utilized to their own or the organization's benefit, or where they are better able to perform the job in accordance with required standards, is not an Anniversary Date.

Applicant A person, including a current employee, who is applying for any position with the employer. May also be referred to as the candidate.

At-will: Employment status wherein the employee may be terminated at any time, with or without cause. An employee in an at-will status has neither a property right nor an expectation of continued employment with the employer and is not covered by the provisions of the discipline, layoff, or dispute resolution sections of these personnel policies.

Authentication: For the purposes of FMLA, providing the health care provider with a copy of the medical certification and requesting verification that the information contained on the

certification form was completed and/or authorized by the health care provider who signed the document; no additional medical information may be requested.

Base Rate of Pay. The amount of pay the employee is designated to receive within the pay range for the employee's classification, excluding pay such as overtime, bonuses, longevity, shift-differential, and incentives.

Board: The governing body of Storey County

Casual Worker: A person hired at the pleasure of the employer to work in an intermittent partime position with less than an average of twenty (20) hours per week over a fiscal year period

Child: (Son or daughter) For purposes of LMLA, a biological, adopted, or foster child, a stepchild, a legal ward, or a child of a person standing In Loco Parentis, who is either under age 18, or age 18 or older and "incapable of self-care because of a mental or physical disability."

Clarification. For purposes of FMLA, contacting the health care provider to understand the handwriting on the medical certification or to understand the meaning of a response

Class: A group of like positions assigned to the same title and pay grade based on similar duties and responsibilities and minimum qualifications. Positions are allocated to the same class when they have a similar job title (e.g., a group of Administrative Assistant I positions), qualifications, pre-employment testing, and similar pay for instance, five Administrative Assistant I positions in four different departments are all in the same class, "Administrative Assistant I"

Classification: The analysis, development, and placement of positions within the classification plan

Class Series: Two or more classes which are similar as to the fundamental type of work, but which differ as to degree of responsibility and difficulty, and which have been arrayed in a progression of level of responsibility and complexity of duties. The series of Administrative Assistant 1, 1., and III is an example of a class series, while each position by itself is a class

Confidential Employee: An employee occupying a position which by the nature of its duties has access to decisions of management affecting employee relations and has been designated confidential by the HR Director with concurrence of the County Manager. In addition, it includes any employee occupying the County Manager's Office and Human Resources. Confidential employees are not covered by this Agreement.

Contraband: Any item such as illegal drugs, drug paraphernalia, or other related items whose possession is prohibited by this policy. This term includes marijuana and related products deemed illegal by fuderal law.

Conflicting Employment: Outside employment that interferes with the employee's ability to perform his/her assigned job.

Conviction: A finding of guilt, including a plea of no contest or imposition of sentence or both, by any judicial body charged with the responsibility to determine violations of the federal or state criminal drug or alcohol statutes.

County: Storey County.

Date of Hire/Hire Date: The actual date an employee first renders paid service in a regular position.

Day. Calendar days unless work days are specified.

Demotion

Involuntary Demotion - Movement of an employee from one job classification to another job classification having a lower grade level, or lower maximum base rate of pay, as a result of disciplinary action or not successfully completing the probationary period related to a promotion.

Department Head/Department Manager: An elected official who is directly responsible to the citizens of Storey County, or an appointed officer who is directly responsible to the County Manager or to the Board of Storey County Commissioners, or who is directly responsible to a board created by the Board of Storey County Commissioners, for the overall administration of an office or department of the employer Storey County.

Diluted Specimens: Diluted specimens have creatinine and specific gravity values that are lower than expected for human urine. The HHS has determined that specimens with creatinine levels greater than or equal to 2.0 mg/dl, and have a specific gravity greater than 1,0010 but less than 1,0030 are dilute. Individuals with creatinine levels greater than or equal to 2.0 mg/dl, but less than 5.0 mg/dl, are required to be retested under direct observation.

Disability-Related Inquiry A question (or series of questions) that is likely to elicit information about a disability

Discharge: Termination, separation, dismissal, or removal from employment for cause.

Discipline: A suspension (generally without pay), involuntary demotion, reduction in pay, discharge, or written reprimand or verbal warning.

Discrimination. Employment decisions or actions which are inappropriately taken because of the applicant's or employee's race, color, religion, age, gender, sexual orientation, national origin, ancestry, veteran status, disability, or union activity.

Dispute—Unresolved work-related problems identified by an employee or group of employees pertaining to work-related issues. Disputes may not be related to disciplinary action.

Domestic Partner: Persons who are registered as domestic partners with the state of Nevada per Senate Bill 283 of the 2009 Nevada Legislation.

Drug Fest: A ternalysis (urine) test that includes specimen collection and testing by a Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS)-certified laboratory. Both a screening test and a confirmation test must be used to establish a positive test result.

Eligible List. A list of names of persons who have satisfactorily completed an examination for a position and have qualified; also includes Reinstatement List (see below). A list of names of persons who have been laid off and are available for reinstatement.

Employee: A person employed in a budgeted position on a full- or part-time basis. For purposes of those sections of these policies covering discipline, layoff, and dispute resolution, the term employee excludes elected officials, department heads and casual workers.

Regular Full-time Employee: A person who has successfully completed an initial introductory period in a regular budgeted position and whose regular workweek consists of at least forty (40) hours.

Regular Part-Time Employee: A person who has successfully completed an initial introductory period in a regular budgeted position which requires at least twenty (20) average hours per week over a fiscal year period, but less than full-time employment.

Introductory Employee: A person who serves in an at-will status for a specified period of time during which s/he is evaluated by the employer to ensure that s/he has demonstrated fitness for a position by actually performing the duties of the position.

Exempt Employee: An employee who is exempt from the overtime provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act. (Such determination is made on the basis of duties and responsibilities performed and the method of pay computation and rate of pay.)

Non-Exempt Employee: An employee who is subject to the overtime provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Employer Premises: All employer property and facilities, the surrounding grounds and parking lots, leased space, employer motor-driven equipment/vehicles, offices, desks, cabinets, closets, etc.

Equal Employment Opportunity (FEO) Officer: The staff member assigned the responsibility and authority to receive, investigate, and resolve complaints of alleged discrimination/harassment. This individual also has the responsibility to provide training to the employer and assure appropriate notices are posted.

Essential Function. A fundamental job duty of the position held or desired. A function is essential if the job exists to perform that function, a limited number of other employees are available to perform the function, or the function requires special skill or expertise.

Examination/Lest. Any measure, combination of measures, or procedures used as a basis for any employment decision. Examinations include the full range of assessment techniques from traditional paper and pencil tests, performance tests, assessment centers, introductory periods, and evaluation of physical, educational, and work experience qualifications through informal interviews and scored application forms. Open examinations are open to all applicants, internal and external. Promotional examinations are open only to selected categories of employees of the employer.

Full-Time Work which requires hours of work as established by the employer as full-time. A full-time employee is regularly scheduled to work a normal work week of forty (40) hours. Note: For the purpose of determining eligibility for benefits and layoff, collective bargaining agreements may provide alternate definitions of full-time.

Grade: The designation of a salary range for job classifications of same or similar worth.

Hlegal Drugs: Any controlled substance or drug which is illegal to sell, possess, cultivate, transfer, use, purchase, or distribute. Illegal drugs include prescription drugs not legally obtained and/or prescription drugs not being used in the manner, combination, or quantity prescribed, or by the individual for whom prescribed. Illegal drugs also include marijuana and related products that are deemed illegal by federal law.

Incomplete or Insufficient Certification: For purposes of FMLA, a medical certification is considered incomplete if the employer receives a certification, but one or more of the applicable

entries have not been completed. A medical certification is considered insufficient if the employer receives a complete certification, but the information provided is vague, ambiguous, or non-responsive.

In Loco Parentis A relationship in which a person has put him/herself in the situation of a parent by assuming and discharging the obligations of a parent to a child, with whom he or she has no legal or biological connection, including day-to-day responsibilities to care for or financially support a child.

Invalid Specimens. An invalid specimen is one that contains an unidentified adulterant, contains an unidentified interfering substance, has an abnormal physical characteristic, or has an endogenous substance at an abnormal concentration that prevents the laboratory from completing testing or obtaining a valid drug test result.

Job Competencies: The knowledge, skills, and abilities (KSAs) and other personal characteristics that work together to produce outstanding performance in a given area of responsibility

Job Description. A written description of a job which includes information regarding the general nature of the work to be performed, specific responsibilities and duties, and the employee characteristics required to perform the job.

Job Specifications: The specific qualifications necessary to be able to perform the job.

Key Employee: A salaried FMLA-eligible employee who is among the highest paid 10 percent of all the employees employed by the employer within 75 miles of the employee's worksite.

Layoff. A separation from the employer's service because of a shortage of funds, lack of work, abolishment of a position, reorganization, or for other reasons not reflecting discredit on an employee and for reasons outside of the employee's control.

Leave Without Pay: Authorized leave in a non-paid status.

Legal Drugs: Prescription drugs and over-the-counter drugs that have been legally obtained and are being used in the manner, combination, and quantity for which they were prescribed or manufactured. This term does not include marijuana or related substances that are deemed illegal by federal law

Medical Examination: A procedure or test usually given by a health care professional or in a medical setting that seeks information about an individual's physical or mental impairments or health.

Next of Kin: For purposes of FMLA, the nearest blood relative other than the covered servicemember's spouse, parent, son, or daughter, in the following order of priority: blood relatives who have been granted legal custody of the covered servicemember by court decree or statutory provisions, brothers and sisters, grandparents, aunts and uncles, and first cousins, unless the covered servicemember has specifically designated in writing another blood relative as his or her nearest blood relative for purposes of military caregiver leave under the FMLA. When no such designation is made, and there are multiple family members with the same level of relationship to the covered servicemember, all such family members shall be considered the covered servicemember's next of kin and may take FMLA leave to provide care to the covered servicemember, either consecutively or simultaneously. When such designation has been made, the designated individual shall be deemed to be the covered servicemember's only next of kin.

Probationary Orientation Period: A trial or working test period which is an integral part of the examination and selection process during which an employee serves in an at-will status and is required to demonstrate fitness for the position for which s/he was hired by actually performing the duties of the position. The employee in the promotion period may also be referred to as a Probationary Employee.

Personnel Action. Any action taken with reference to appointment, compensation, promotion, transfer, layoff, dismissal, or any other action a feeting an employee's employment status.

Position: A group of duties and responsibilities requiring the ongoing services of one or more employees, which is listed in the authorized position list contained in the currently approved employer's budget or established by formal action by the County Manager.

Positive Drug or Alcohol Test: Any detectable level of drugs or its metabolite (in excess of trace amounts attributable to secondary exposure) in an employee's urine or blood. With respect to alcohol, a blood alcohol concentration of 0.02 or higher constitutes a positive test

Probationary Employee: An employee who is undergoing a working evaluation period during which s/he is required to demonstrate his/her ability to carry out the duties of the position to which hired and during which s/he is employee "at-will" and may be laid-off or discharged from employment for any reason with or without cause.

Promotion. The movement of an employee from one job classification to another job classification having a higher grade level, or maximum base rate of pay, usually as a result of some type of recruitment or reclassification, but not as a result of reallocation of a class.

Rate of Pay: An employee's salary or wages as shown in the employer's compensation plan.

Reallocation. A change of an entire class to a higher or lower pay grade.

Reelassification: The process of madveing and redevelopment each time, responsibilities, and name and qualifications of an containing most on a moving a to accordance within the glassification plan.

Reasonable Accommodation:

- a modification or adjustment to a job application process that enables a qualified applicant with a disability to be considered for the position such qualified applicant desires, or
- a modification or adjustment to the work environment, or to the manner or circumstances
 under which the position held or desired is customarily performed, that enable a quantied
 individual with a disability to perform the essential functions of that position; or
- a modification or adjustment that enables a covered employee, with a disability, to enjoy
 equal henefits and privileges of employment as are enjoyed by other similarly situated
 employees without disabilities

Reassignment: Transferring individua, employees to alternative position classes where their talents or skills may be best utilized to their own or the organization's benefit or where they are better able to perform the job in accordance with required standards.

Reclassification: The change of a position to a different job class which results from changes in duties and responsibilities.

Reduction in Pay. Disciplinity action by an employer moving an employee in a lower pay level to one and class and some μ α α add.

Regular Position. An authorized position which appears in the authorized position list contained in the employer's budget documents or its amendments approved by the County Commissioners. (Normally a regular position consists of duties which must be performed at least twenty [20] hours per week on a regular, year-round basis.)

Regular Rate of Pay. The employee's base rate of pay plus other additional pay for which the employee's specific assignment may entitle him/her.

Regularly Scheduled Shift. The shift created by the department that is the same schedule for at least 30 days.

Reinstatement. The restoration of a laid-off employee or an employee rejected during a promotional introductory period to a position in a class in which the employee formerly served as a regular employee.

Reinstatement List. A list of names of persons who have been laid off and are available for reinstatement (rehire without examination).

Reprimand: A written notice to an employee stating specific performance and/or behavioral deficiencies and the improvements in behavior and/or performance which the employee must make, and that further disciplinary action will follow if the employee does not make the required improvements. (A performance evaluation form shall not be considered a reprimand.)

Resignation: A notice by an employee that s/he intends to separate from the employer's service. The employer may require that resignations be in writing.

Salary Range. The minimum and maximum salary set for each classification, grade, or level as designated by the position compensation plans. (Also see Grade.)

Son or Daughter of a Covered Servicemember: For purposes of FMLA, a biological, adepted, or foster child, stepciald, legal ward, or a child for whom the covered servicemember stood in Loco Parentis, and who is of any age.

Son or Daughter on Covered Active Duty or Call to Covered Active Duty Status: For purposes of FMLA, employee's biological, adopted, or foster child, stepchild, legal ward, or a child for whom the employee stood In Loco Parentis who is on covered active duty or call to covered active duty status, and who is of any age.

Spouse: A husband or wife as defined or recognized under State law for purposes of marriage.

Step: A specific rate of pay within the salary range established for a class. (Also see Rate of Pay.)

Substance Abuse Professional (SAP). A licensed physician, or a licensed or certified psychologist, social worker, employee assistance professional, or addiction counselor (certified by the National Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors Certification Commission) with knowledge of and clinical experience in the diagnosis and treatment of drugand alcohol-related disorders.

Substituted Specimens: Substituted specimens have creatinine and specific gravity values that are so diminished or so divergent that they are not consistent with normal human urine. The HHS has determined that specimens with creatinine levels of less than 2.0 mg/dl are substituted.

Supervisor: An elected of ficial or an employee who has been authorized to select, train, schedule, and evaluate the work of other employees, and to make decisions or effectively

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recommend actions related to the hiring, evaluation, and discipline of assigned employees. This person may also serve as the department head.

Suspension: The temporary separation from service, with or without pay, of an employee for disciplinary reasons or pending investigation of an employee's conduct.

Temporary Employee: A casual worker in a temporary position with a specified ending term date.

Transfer: Movement of an employee from one position or job classification to another position or job classification at the same grade level, or with the same (or comparable) maximum base rate of pay

Warning: Verbal notice or counseling of an employee specifying required changes in work performance or on-the-job behavior.

Work Week: 7 consecutive periods of 24 hours which may begin on any day and at any hour of the day.

Work Day: A period of 24 consecutive hours which begins when the employee begins work.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR REVIEW: The HR Director will review this policy every 5 years or sooner as necessary.

A resolution providing for in-county general, liquor, cabaret, brothel, and gaming business license fee reimbursement generally equivalent to the amount paid for two quarters of fees by businesses principally impacted by use restriction or closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic and related Declaration of Emergency Directives issued by the Governor.

Whereas, the existing business license fees as well as liquor, cabaret, gaming licenses for Storey County are currently set out in chapter 5.04 of the Storey County Code.

Whereas, the Storey County Board of County Commissioners (the Board) has the authority pursuant to Storey County Code sections 5.04.190 to increase or decrease license fees established in the chapter 5.04 by resolution of the Board.

Whereas, the Board has the authority pursuant to Storey County Code sections 5.16.040 and 5.16.130 to set brothel license fees by resolution. Further, section 5.16.130 requires that the brothel fees must be considered at two board meetings before becoming effective.

Whereas, the Board has recognized that the requirement to pay license fees while being directed to restrict the use of establishments or to remain closed for business by the COVID-19 pandemic or Declaration of Emergency Directives by the governor may not be equitable.

Whereas, the Board has determined that the existing businesses in Storey County have paid quarterly licensing fees for the first and second quarter of fiscal year 2020-2021 while their operations may have been restricted or shut down by the governor's directives and the Board has determined that it would be appropriate to reimburse fees generally equivalent to the amount paid for these two quarters but not to exceed the following amounts, but where a business meeting two or more categories may receive cumulative reimbursement amounts:

1. All "in-county" licensed businesses-2. In-county businesses with "on-site" consumption liquor-\$250.00

3. In-county businesses with gaming-

4. In-county businesses with cabaret- \$75.00

Whereas, the Board has determined that the existing Storey County licensed brothel has paid monthly licensing fees for the first and second quarter of fiscal year 2020-2021 while their operations have been shut down by the governor's directives and the Board has determined that it would be appropriate to reimburse fees in the amount of \$41,250.00 or not more than the amount paid for these two quarters.

Whereas, the Board has determined that business license fees for escort services are set pursuant to Storey County Code section 5.04.200 and that there should be no refund because escort services operation have not been closed by Declaration of Emergency Directives.

Whereas, this resolution is for the refund of the fees and is not considered a rule and is exempt from the NRS 237 requirement of a business impact statement.

Therefore, the Board resolves to reimburse the license fees paid for the first and second quarter of fiscal year 2020-21 in the amounts set out above but not to exceed the paid.

Resolution 2021-602

A resolution expressing impacts on businesses by COVID-19 mitigation restrictions, the need and right for equitable treatment of all businesses, and the honor to protect the health, safety, and well-being of residents and visitors in Storey County.

WHEREAS the Storey County Commissioners have sworn to support, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States and State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS Nevada Governor Steve Sisolak has sworn to support, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States and State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS the Board of Storey County Commissioners take seriously its obligation to defend the civil liberties, health, safety, and well-being of its residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS Storey County and its businesses have in good-faith operated in conformance with COVID-mitigation guidelines to protect the health, safety, and well-being of residents and visitors, and

WHEREAS, Storey County has consistently exhibited the lowest or near-lowest rate of COVID-19 cases and deaths in the region and State; and

WHEREAS Storey County is coordinated with the Quad-County Health Coalition (Storey, Carson, Lyon, and Douglas) in responding to the full-range of COVID-19 related issues, testing, data collection, remedies, and vaccinations; and

WHEREAS Storey County is administering COVID-19 vaccinations in coordination with the Quad-County Health Coalition; and

WHEREAS Storey County has cooperated with the Governor's COVID-19 mitigation directives including maintaining reduced building capacities, closing certain businesses, requiring facemask and social distancing, canceling special events, curtailing tourism, submitting reopening plans, and other COVID-19 prevention practices; and

WHEREAS State restrictions tailored to conditions existing in Clark and Washoe counties fail to reflect the consistently low COVID-19 caseloads or accommodate the diverse and essential needs unique to rural Storey County; and

WHEREAS Virginia City is composed entirely of small family-owned businesses, is geographically isolated from urban and suburban areas, is solely dependent on tourism, and situated at 6,200 feet elevation endures an economy subject to seasonal volatility; and

WHEREAS many Virginia City businesses since the nineteenth century double as the primary residence of their owners and provide affordable housing for their tenants, and *failure of these principal businesses may result in homelessness for these families;* and

WHEREAS the Governor has restricted statewide all restaurants, bars, gyms and fitness centers, and gaming establishments to 25 percent occupancy; and

WHEREAS the Governor has restricted statewide remaining public serving business to 50 percent occupancy; and

WHEREAS no projected end to business closures, or 25 percent and 50 percent occupancy restrictions has been announced by the State, from which financial planning by affected businesses may occur; and

WHEREAS the Board of Storey County Commissioners and county officials have on April 27, May 04, May 14, August 05, and September 17, 2020, submitted written requests to the Governor and the COVID-19 Mitigation and Management Task Force to consider the county's position on certain busines restrictions and to be placed on a Task-Force meeting agenda to discuss impacts and arrive at safe and reasonable resolutions; and

WHEREAS Storey County has received no response to its written and verbal requests; and

WHEREAS the Board of Storey County Commissioners granted approximately 40 percent of its CARES Act funds to its small businesses for the purpose of COVID-19 economic relief; and

WHEREAS granting CARES Act funds to small business provided significant economic relief to businesses restricted to 50 percent occupancy, but substantially more was needed to assist businesses subject to 25 percent occupancy limits and other more severe restrictions; and

WHEREAS CARES Act and other federal and state financial relief programs have been exhausted or are impossible to access, and reversing closures and relaxing 25 percent occupancy limits on businesses may enable them to survive the remainder of the pandemic; and

WHEREAS all gaming establishments in Storey County are small businesses, have small physical floor space and can facilitate social distancing only by turning off half or more of their gaming machines; however, the businesses must currently continue to pay gaming license fees on every machine, even when they are decommissioned to comply with these mandates; and

WHEREAS State financial relief has not been provided to Storey County gaming establishments for fees and taxes on machines which are turned off or decommissioned to comply with State-imposed social distancing mandates; and

WHEREAS Storey County business can operate successfully during the pandemic with social distancing, facemask, sanitation, and other sensible COVID-19 mitigation practices; and

WHEREAS extended closures and 25 percent occupancy restrictions make it impossible for many small businesses to generate sufficient revenues to survive; and

WHEREAS "Phase I" and other lockdown policies cause devastating short- and long-term public health crises including substance abuse, domestic violence, suicide, social isolation of vouth and seniors, and delayed education: and

WHEREAS valid evidence does not conclude that lockdowns, business closures, and other extreme restrictions on businesses has significantly mitigated the proliferation of COVID-19.

ISSUES TO BE RESOLVED that the Board of Storey County Commissioners hereby asserts to the Governor and the COVID-19 Mitigation and Management Task Force to be placed on a <u>Task-Force public meeting agenda within 3 weeks of this Resolution</u> to address the following:

- 1. To discuss economic and social impacts caused by closures and heavy restrictions of businesses in Storey County; and
- 2. To review plans and resolutions to safely relax certain restrictions on businesses in Storey County; and
- 3. To cause restaurants, bars, gyms and fitness centers, gaming establishments, and other such businesses to be treated equitably with less restricted business sectors; and
- 4. To request small gaming establishments to be relieved of fees and taxes on gaming machines decommissioned to comply with State-mandated social distancing requirements; and
- 5. To insist OSHA officers be directed by the State to focus investigation and enforcement action on habitual non-compliant businesses so that businesses operating responsibly within COVID-19 prevention guidelines may enjoy freedom to remain open in a safe and profitable manner and not be subject to "blanket" shutdowns and restrictions; and
- 6. To urge the Governor to aggressively endorse in the 2021 legislative session proposals or existing Nevada Revised Statues facilitating responsible and safe business operation during pandemics and to oppose arbitrary, devastating, and unnecessary restrictions on businesses and residents; and
- 7. To urge the Governor to recognize and respect the local autonomy of Storey County in regulating its businesses in accordance with local COVID-19 caseload and hospitalization demands, essential business needs, and unique characteristics and challenges to the area; and

Request:

Second Reading of Bill 125, Ordinance 20-314, an ordinance amending provisions of Storey County Code Title 17 to establish the minimum square footage for residences in the Estate, Natural Resources and Forestry zones and modifying setback requirements in the Public zone and providing for other matters properly related thereto.

Background & Analysis:

Discussions during the recent Title 17 updates this past summer and fall of 2020 identified a desire to review the minimum residence sizes allowed in Storey County. A committee of Storey County staff and Planning Commissioner Pellett met to discuss the concerns and existing regulations related to residence size. Based on that meeting and further research, staff arrived at a proposal for language changes that was presented to the Planning Commission at their November 5, 2020 meeting. Upon conclusion of the discussion of the item, staff summarized the consensus of the discussion and advised the Planning Commission that staff would bring back modified code language for review and an action for a recommendation to forward to the Board of County Commissioners. It should be noted that though the discussion process appeared to reach a consensus on a path forward, no formal action vote occurred and the language being proposed is staff's interpretation of the discussion.

The second portion of the proposed modification is to the setbacks in the Public zoning district. As part of the Title 17 update completed in the fall of 2020, modifications to setbacks in several zoning districts occurred. The Public zone identifies each of these zoning districts and follows the setbacks of the abutting zoning district. This proposed change reflects the modifications previously made to setbacks in other zoning districts.

The Planning Commission reviewed the formal revised code language at their December 17, 2020, meeting. No additional comments to the language were received and the Planning Commission voted 4-0 (three absent) to recommend approval of the revised code language.

The Board of County Commissioners reviewed the First Reading of Bill 125, Ordinance 20-314 at their January 19, 2021 meeting. One additional modification was made to the Estates zoning chapter which modified the chart on page 4 of 4 associated with the E-40 row. The minimum floor area should match the E-40-VR row, allowing for a minimum floor area of 401 square feet for the 1 bedroom, 2, bedroom and 3 bedroom columns. The Board approved these changes with the First Reading motion and the changes are now documented in Bill 125, Ordinance 20-314 for the Second Reading.

Bill No. 125

Ordinance No. 20-314

Summary

An ordinance amending provisions of Storey County Code Title 17 to establish the minimum square footage for residences in the natural resources, estate and forestry zones and modifying setback requirements in the public zone.

<u>Title</u>

An ordinance amending provisions of the Storey County Code Title 17 establishing 401 square feet as the minimum residence size in the natural resources zone; the estates zone and the forestry zone and also changing some of the setback requirements in the public zone and providing other matters properly related thereto.

The Board of County Commissioners of the County of Storey, State of Nevada, does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. There is hereby added a new section to Chapter 17.76 (Natural Resources zone) of the Storey County Code to provide as follows:

17.76.090 Minimum Floor Area for Residences

Ordinance No. 20-314

Summary

An ordinance amending provisions of Storey County Code Title 17 to establish the minimum square footage for residences in the natural resources, estate and forestry zones and modifying setback requirements in the public zone.

<u>Title</u>

An ordinance amending provisions of the Storey County Code Title 17 establishing 401 square feet as the minimum residence size in the natural resources zone; the estates zone and the forestry zone and also changing some of the setback requirements in the public zone and providing other matters properly related thereto.

The Board of County Commissioners of the County of Storey, State of Nevada, does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. There is hereby added a new section to Chapter 17.76 (Natural Resources zone) of the Storey County Code to provide as follows:

17.76.090 Minimum Floor Area for Residences

A single family residence must have a minimum floor area of 401 square feet, have a minimum width dimension of 12-feet on any side, have a permanent foundation, and comply with all building code regulations. If the residence is not constructed onsite and meets the definition of a manufactured home, it must also comply with all state requirements for construction.

SECTION 2. Section 17.40.050 of Chapter 17.40 (Estates zone) of the Storey County Code is hereby amended to provide as follows:

17.40.050 Setback and Minimum Floor Area Requirements

Unless stated otherwise in this section, the minimum square feet for a residence, and the distance between the principal building and the property line must be as shown in the following table. Setback requirements for accessory buildings must comply with section 17.12.045. Setbacks are from the property line except when an encroaching easement exists for the purpose of providing a public or private road, but not driveway (see section 17.12.090 for explanation and illustration).


